





tharral area several years. He was a member of the United Pentecostal Church of Levelland.



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# Give Your Child a Thirst for Knowledge

The four-year-old has a whole year before he gets to kindergarten. Parents can teach the child at this stage many skills which will make learning easier and kindergarten a pleasure for him.

Parents would do well to make sure a child knows how to dress and undress himself by five. He should be able to work everything except tricky fastenings . back buttons and tying shoes. Some children will be able to do them all.



Tuberculinskin tests are given by private physicians, at school and in Health Department clinics. Approximately 48 hours after being given, the tests are "read" to identify reactors. Finding reactors is important, for a positive test indicates they have been exposed to someone with TB and have the TB germ in their bodies. Without treatment, these reactors could have unknown cases of TB or develop active disease at some future date.

While the child testing program isn't primarily for case finding, but to find children who need protection against tuberculosis, every reactor is followed up to see if an active case exists. A reactor is urged to contact his family physician for an x-ray, or to attend a Health Department clinic. During the last school year the number of new reactors, 2160, was relatively small, attesting to the reduction in tuberculosis in Texas.




