Lions Speaker Explains Cotton Trailer Laws

Springlake.

When the Earth Lions Club met for their weekly luncheon Tuesday, guest speaker C. A. Dempsy, a safety officer with the Texas Department of Public Safety office in Lubbock, spoke to the club on new laws pertaining to lights and brakes on cotton trailers.

The new law which goes into effect January 1, 1972 will require all trailers which are 80 inches or more in overall wid - a.m. that day and will be held th to have two amber clear-

ance lamps, one on each side, on the front of the trailer. On each of the two sides of the trailer there will have to be an amber side marker lamp and an amber reflector at the front and at the back there will have to be a red side marker and a red reflector.

The law requires that on the back of the trailer there should be three red identification lamps in the center of the trailer and two red clearance lamps on each side. Also on each of the two sides of the rear portion of the trailer there should be a red tail lamp, a red stop lamp, and a red reflector. The lamps and/or reflectors may be incorporated.



shall be equipped with electirc turn signal lamps, except that passenger cars and trucks less than 80 inches in width, manufactured or assembled prior to model year 1960, need not be equipped with electric turn signal lamps, unless the body or load of the vehicle extends to the side more than 24 inches from the center of the top of of the steering wheel post, or the rear limit of the body or load exceeds more than 14 feet from the center of the top of the steering wheel post.

Dempsey also stated that all trailers, semi-trailers, or pole trailers 80 inches or more in in overall width or 30 feet or more in overall height would be required to be equipped with bazard warning lamps. He said that the use of a flasher switch causing the turn signal lamps to flash simulaneously may be used to comply with this regulation.

Every vehicle shall be equipped with brakes acting on all wheels except trailers, semi-trailers, or pole trailers of a gross weight not exceeding 3,000 pounds provided that total weight of the trailer or trailers does not exceed 40 per cent of the gross weight of the towing vehicle when connected to the trailer or trailers. The safety officer said that

the farm traffers up to 4,000 pounds, grain trailers up to 10,000 pounds, and cotton trailers up to 15,000 pounds that do not travel above a speed of 30 miles per hour are exempt from the brake and registration law. He pointed out that anyone could obtain further information concerning the new laws from their Texas Department of Public Safety offices.

Many families of relatively modest income may end up owing \$600 or \$800 next April in taxes, Mrs. Myers says.

The Low Income Allowance provided in the 1969 Tax Reform Act applies to married couples only if they file a joint return, the specialist points out. According to the law, the couple has one allowance. But the tax withholding tables, which tell employers how much tax to deduct from paychecks, are calculated on the basis of one Low Income Allowance for every employee. If both husband and wife, then get the benefit of the allowance, not enough tax is being withheld throughout the year, Mrs. Myers explains. The difference may be astonishing.

For example. If a husband earns \$400 a week and a wife

\$200, the couple may discover they owe \$2, 191 next April 15, she says. A couple with two children, with the husband earning \$220 and the wife \$95. will owe \$374.

Recognizing the problem, the Treasury has sent posters to employers, advising them, married employee withholdings should be adjusted if necessary. But millions of taxpayers still won't see or hear the warnings, she adds.

As a result of this misunder standing of tax law, Mrs. Myers says big tax payments will bite into the consumer buying power next spring, just when the government hopes to see a major recovery.

The House-approved tax bill would decrease payments somewhat by increasing each personal exemption for 1971 retroactively to \$675 Instead of COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 4 \$650. The Senate may increase exemptions to \$700. But even these Increases would be only a small cushion for

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


