Following the Springlake - Kress game, ex-students are invited to return to the cafeteria for doughnuts and coffee.

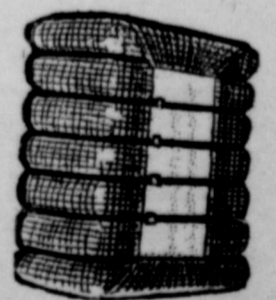
Ordination Services To Be Held Sunday

What kind of driver has the most accidents? The rank beginner? The skilled but too-daring youngster? The older, over-cautious driver? If you picked any of these, you're wrong.

The fact is that the so-called



"average driver" has most of the accidents. As one of this country's top traffic safety experts said recently, "The real key to traffic safety is the fellow who sits behind the wheel, the fellow who decides whether his car shall travel 60 or 80 miles an hour; whether to halt at a stop sign or barge through; whether his car will blend itself sensibly and safely into the traffic stream or create turmoil, confusion, and danger."

He goes on to say that although we like to think there is a special class of "careless driver" flouting laws and enjoying discourteous actions, this is not so. Actually, there are few habitually careless drivers; eliminating them wouldn't start to solve the whole problem. What to do? First of all—realize YOU are the average driver, and practice safe driving YOURSELF, all the time. Remember that you are "the other fellow" to "the other fellow."

Some safe driving tips: Avoid over-confidence, emotional disturbances, hypnotic, unattentive driving, poor mechanical condition of car, distractions while motoring. Don't be an average driver. It's not good enough by far.

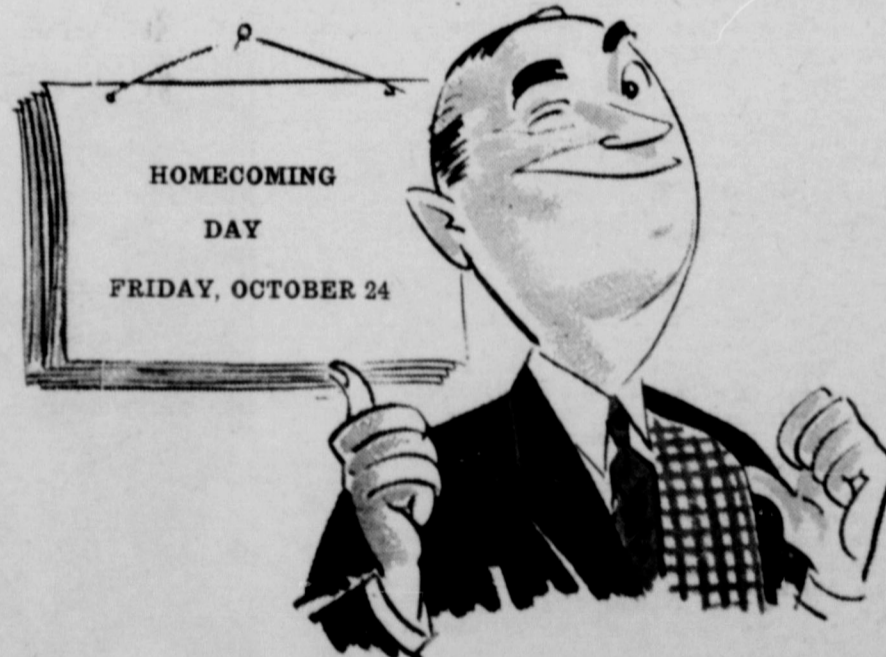

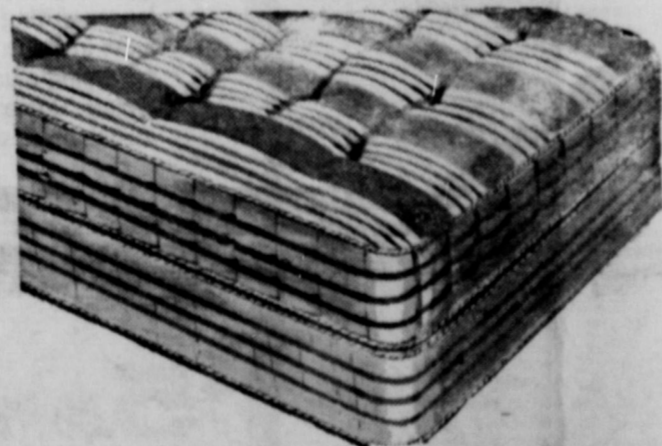

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Springlake Edged By Sudan

The Springlake Wolverines were dropped by the Sudan Hornets in the opening 3-A district contest for both teams 18 to 14 Friday night on Sudan's field. Sudan, which had an identical season record of two wins and four losses with Springlake, possibly won the game in the first quarter, when the Hornets played ball control by taking the opening kickoff and marching 60 yards in 15 plays for the opening score. The conversion failed. Springlake couldn't move the ball after receiving the kickoff and had to punt on fourth down. Sudan started another drive that went to Springlake's one yard line where the Wolverines held on downs as the quarter ended. Springlake ran just four plays in the quarter.

As the second quarter started Springlake had the ball on their one, and after three plays had to punt. Sudan took the ball on Springlake's 32 and in six plays scored again with Macky Ballard going the final yard. The extra points try was no good. Ballard also scored Sudan's first touchdown on an 8 yard run. Springlake got its first score of the evening when they took the kickoff and marched 65 yards in 7 plays. The drive was sparked by halfback Gene Stephens who first ran the kickoff back 15 yards. Then on the second play from scrimmage he broke through for 25 yards. After three more plays had netted ten yards and a first down on Sudan's 27, halfback Hal Hudson threw a mighty pretty pass to quarterback Joe Neal Ellis for the touchdown. The extra points try with a pass failed.

In the second half Springlake's defenses stiffened, and except for an intercepted pass in the third quarter which set up Sudan's last score, the Wolverines dominated play. Springlake received the kickoff opening the second half, and on third down threw a pass which was intercepted by Sudan's Ballard who ran it back to Springlake's 25. From that point the Hornets scored in six plays. John Humphreys going the final four yards. The conversion failed again for the third straight time.

In the fourth quarter Springlake received a punt which Gene Stephens ran back 11 yards to Sudan's 40, from which the final drive to a score was started. The Wolverines

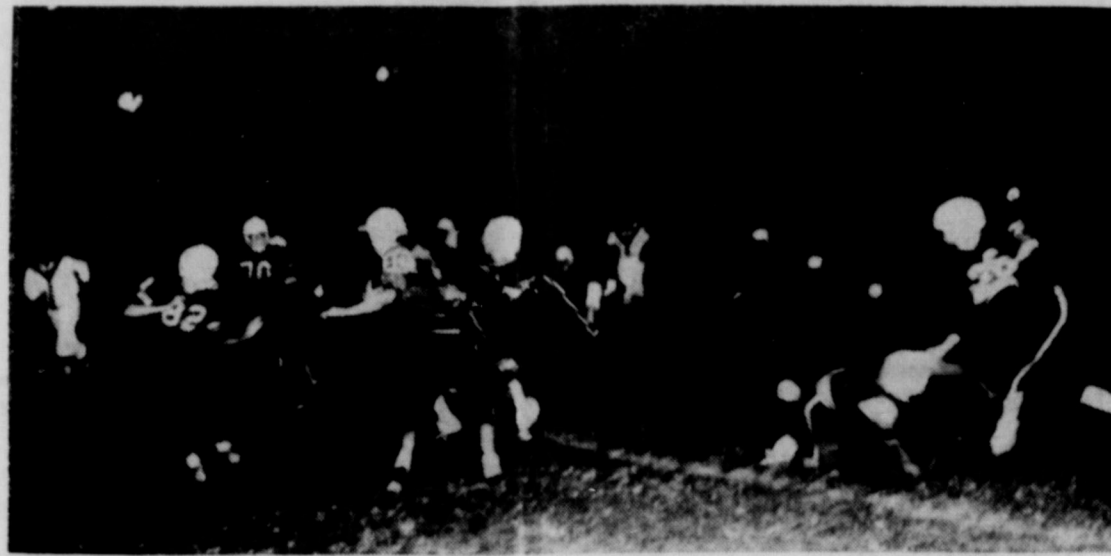
es marched the 40 yards in six plays, the touchdown coming on a pass from Hal Hudson to end Dick Evans in the end zone. Evans made a beautiful, jumping catch of the ball while surrounded by defenders. Dean Jones plunged three yards for the extra points, putting the Wolverines within striking distance of the Hornets. However, Sudan took the kickoff and ate up the remaining time, and had the ball on Springlake's 15 yard line as the game ended.

It was a good ball game to watch, and Springlake did well after adjusting their defenses which allowed the Hornets to keep the ball all the first quarter. Springlake gained more yards passing than they did rushing, 124 to 105. Our pass defense looked better with Sudan gaining only 32 yards through the air lanes on three completions out of seven tries. Though the Wolverines gained well in the air, they had two of their throws intercepted, one which hurt real bad.

This Friday night Springlake takes on Kress in another district 3-A battle. Kress has shown good strength throughout the year, in fact, better than anticipated. The game will be played at Wolverine Stadium at 8 p.m. It will also be "homecoming" night for Springlake. Let's all be on hand to root our Wolverines to victory.

Fudge Marshmallow Brownies

(Makes one 9 by 9 by 2 inch square)

- 1 package brownie mix or your favorite recipe
 - 1 1/2 cups (1 15-oz. can) Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk
 - 1 tablespoon water
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 squares (2-oz.) unsweetened chocolate
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - 1/2 cup marshmallows cut in small pieces
- Make brownies by your own recipe or according to directions on brownie mix package. While they are cooling, combine sweetened condensed milk, water, salt and chocolate in top of double boiler. Cook over hot water about 10 minutes or until mixture thickens. Cool. Add vanilla. Fold in marshmallow pieces. Spread on top of cooled brownies. Cut into small squares.

Halloween Cat Faces

- 1 cup nuts*
 - 1 package (8 squares) candy-making chocolate
 - Candy corn
 - Tender-thin flaked coconut
- Line bottom of 9x9x3-inch loaf pan with waxed paper, letting paper extend in 2-inch tabs at each end. Arrange or sprinkle nuts evenly over bottom of the pan.
- Heat chocolate over hot water until partly melted. Then remove from hot water and stir rapidly until entirely melted. Reserve 1 tablespoon of melted chocolate. Pour chocolate evenly over nuts in pan, using fork to distribute chocolate throughout. Tap pan several times to settle chocolate. Let stand in cool place to harden. Run a sharp knife around sides of pan and lift out candy with paper tabs. Cut in halves crosswise; then cut each half diagonally twice, making 4 triangles. Use candy corn for making nose and

eyes and long shreds of tender thin flaked coconut for the whiskers, fastening in place with a dot or two of the reserved chocolate. Melted again. Makes 8 cat faces.

*Use halved salted cashews, broken pecans, roasted peanuts, toasted blanched almonds, coarsely cut Brazil nuts, or broken walnuts.

Hot Lemonade Punch

- 4 to 7 whole cloves
 - 1 stick cinnamon
 - 2 cups bottled cranberry juice
 - 3/4 cups water
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1 can (6 ounces) Birds Eye concentrated lemonade
- Mix spices, cranberry juice, and water in saucepan. Bring to a rolling boil. Cover, remove from heat, and let stand about 5 minutes. Strain and discard spices. Add sugar and stir until dissolved. Add concentrated lemonade. Mix well. Serve hot. If desired, garnish each serving with half an orange slice and a sprig of mint or a green cherry. Makes about 6 cups, or 12 four-ounce servings.

Halloween Peach Special

- 1 package lemon-flavored gelatin
 - 1 package lime-flavored gelatin
 - 2 cups hot water
 - 2 cups cold water
 - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1 No. 2 1/2 can spiced peach halves*
 - 1 cup diced celery, seasoned with 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - Cottage cheese
- Dissolve the gelatin in hot water. Add cold water and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Reserve 6 peach halves for garnish. Pour half of thickened gelatin in bottom of a 2-quart ring mold. Chill until almost firm. Dice remaining peaches (about 1 cup). Fold peaches and salted celery into remaining gelatin. Pour into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp greens. Fill center of ring with cottage cheese. Decorate peach halves to resemble faces, using rounded side for face. Cut a small X for eyes and mouth; press a raisin into each X, and use a clove for the nose, if desired. Arrange peaches, face side up, on cottage cheese in center of ring. Makes 10 to 12 servings.
- *If desired, plain canned peaches may be used instead of the spiced peaches.

Joe Salem Says Christianity Is Answer To World Peace

"World Peace" was the subject of Joe Salem, Sudan businessman and civic leader's lecture as he spoke to a crowd who were gathered at the First Methodist Church, Tuesday night.

Mr. Salem along with 13 others, represented the United States in a recent "Good Will" tour behind the Iron Curtain in Russia.

The group's first stop was in London, England; later they planned for Finland and Russia.

Mr. Salem's comparison of prices there and here in the United States proved to be quite interesting to the listening audience of people. First Salem mentioned coffee selling for \$10.00 per pound and one cup 30 cents, an extra cup 70 cents. Clothing was much higher, housing cheaper, phone bills 50 cents a month, cars \$4000, haircuts 25 cents and shoe shines 8 cents. Most people rode in cars and wagons and very few cars were seen.

Salem told how he and his group waited from 4 p.m. to 11 p.m. awaiting instructions from Moscow before they were allowed to enter a

hotel to spend the night or eat. Also seeing they believed in God and handing over their passports to be checked at the hotel helped speed up their registering at the hotel.

Salem said they were unable to get anything to eat at that late hour and all had to go to bed without supper. He also told of how the Russian people as a whole trusted the Americans much more than they trusted the Russians.

Salem being the only Texan in his group, told of entering a hotel to eat when a flag was placed by each group, signifying the country from which they came, eight countries were represented, and the band playing "The Yellow Rose of Texas." Salem said he arose and took a bow.

Salem commented on how high the morals of the people were and how awful hard it was to obtain a divorce in Russia.

Also the crime rate being far lower than our own country, which was surprising to the crowd.

They later visited the Kremlin grounds and viewed the tombs, seeing the tomb of Stalin and other great rulers of the country, though religious paintings and communion cups remained in the Cathedral near the grounds, these rulers had tried to stamp out religion.

Salem expressed his feeling as he looked upon Stalin's tomb and remembering the different feeling within him when he visited the home of George Washington, Stalin the dictator and Washington, the Father of Our Country.

Highlighting the trip, was the desire of the people as a whole for religion in Moscow. Salem attended a Baptist Church service and noted how the church was filled to capacity, the building seating 1800 people and people lined the aisles, archways and doorways. Also how attentive the people stood through the two and three quarter hour sermon. Other Protestant churches held services in the same building at different hours of the day.

Thousands of people waited to greet the group as they left the church and his group sang American hymns for the people on the

steps of the church. The people also ran along beside the bus as they drove away to shake their hands. Salem said, he believed a candle of Christianity was still burning in the Soviet Union and not as we had previously thought.

He estimated two thirds of the people to be hungry, ill and half the people without freedom of life and two thirds illiterate in the world today.

Salem spoke of the economical field and how the country as a whole were progressing rapidly. The women were building roads, digging ditches, pouring tar and how they will be up with our country in a few years and supercede us because of their knowledge for hard work and nothing else.

Salem had the privilege of visiting where his son was a deacon in the Methodist Church in Paris, France. While there, the 100th anniversary of the church was observed.

Salem told of the feeling of freedom he felt as he saw Old Glory floating in the air as they entered New York City and seeing a cross in the far distance, his thoughts were of Freedom and Democracy and the picture to be put into the minds of the people is to show mercy, forgiveness, sacrifice, love and put religion into action for the real peace maker for the world.

When questioned about what the men of Russia did, Salem said, most all the men were in military service. Also the three types of farming are very different to our type of farming. Only one individual is allowed six and one fourth acres to farm on his own. Land can be farmed on a cooperative enterprise of one third to one half part, and all machinery must be purchased from the government, sharing a part of the profits with the laborers. All is State owned and all profits go to the State.

A film of Mr. Salem's trip is scheduled at the High School Assembly the first week in December.

The regular monthly meeting of the Springlake PTA was held Thursday night in the school auditorium.

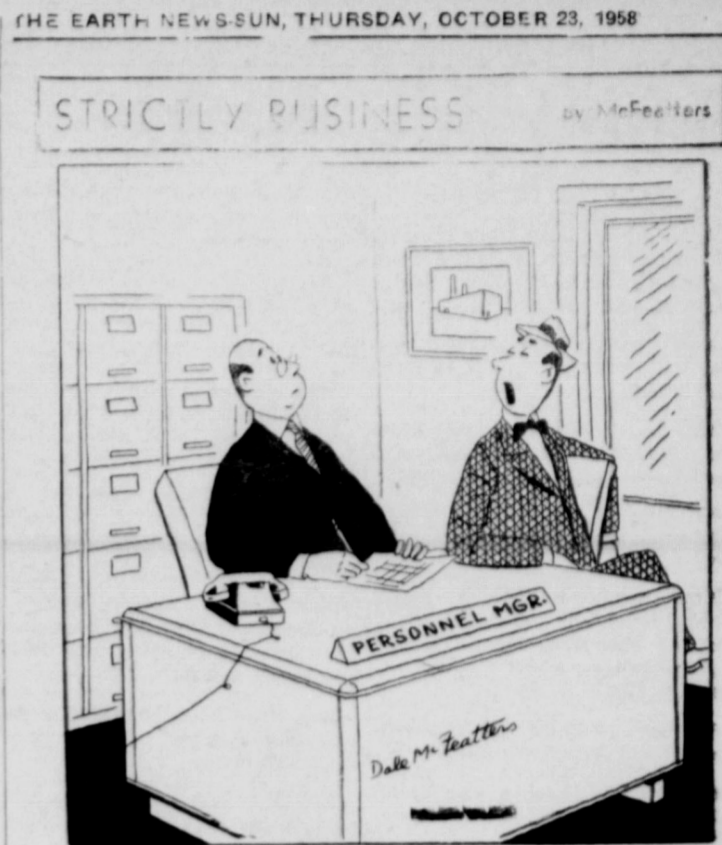
A business meeting was presided over by the president, Jarvis Anzeley. Reports were given by the committees.

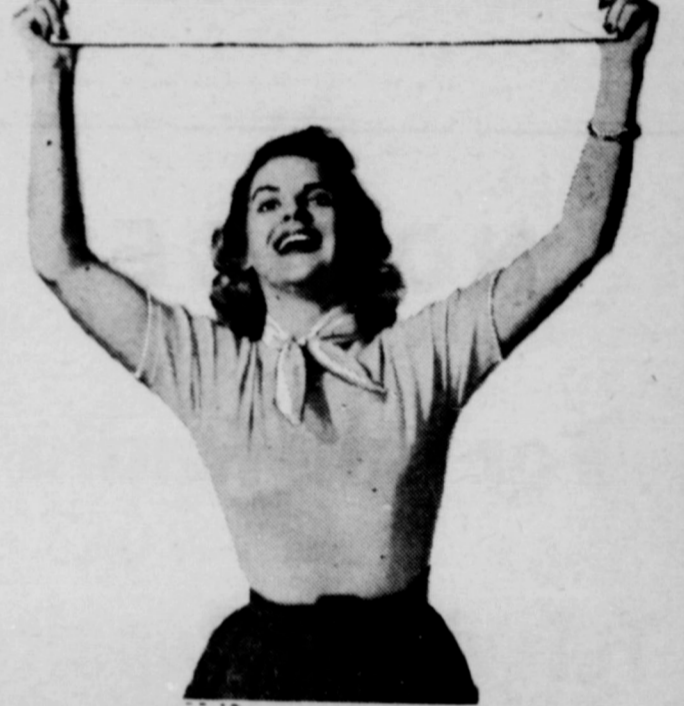

The problem of having to replant their fields after heavy rains and severe winds has long plagued cotton farmers. This repeat process has regularly cut into the yields and profits of the business particularly in cotton growing areas of Texas and Oklahoma, where rainfall is often of a hard, dashing

nature and can place a crust over seed rows which impairs emergence. Moreover, wind and blowing soil also take their toll.

In a bid to eliminate or sharply reduce this difficulty, Cline Industries, Rush Springs, Okla., is offering their Plateau Profile Planter attachment, which creates a new type of seedbed.

Originally designed and perfected by J. G. Porterfield and associates at Oklahoma State University, the attachment creates a plat-

eau for the seed about two inches below the original ground level, with furrows on each side of the plateau which run about five inches below the original ground level, providing a trap for water which could impair the cotton's emergence if it were placed in a deep or shallow furrow, as is common. In addition, the attachment places earth several inches above the original ground level between each row to block winds from damaging the young crop.

Although basically designed for use in cotton planting, field tests have shown the attachment to work equally well with other crops planting in lister furrows, such as grain sorghum, peanuts, soybeans, corn and castor beans.

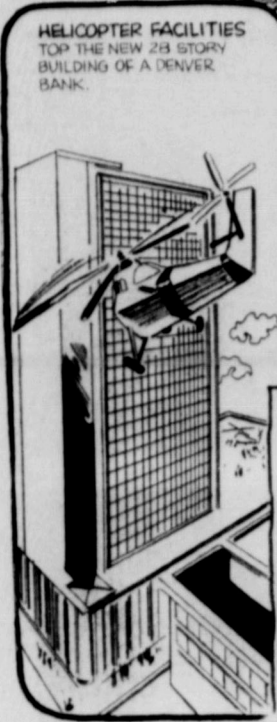

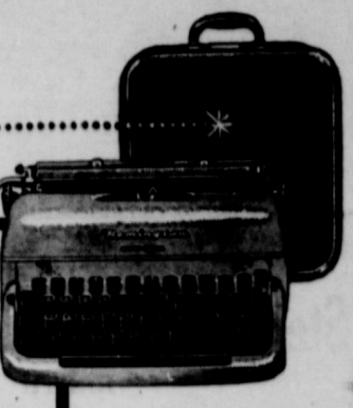

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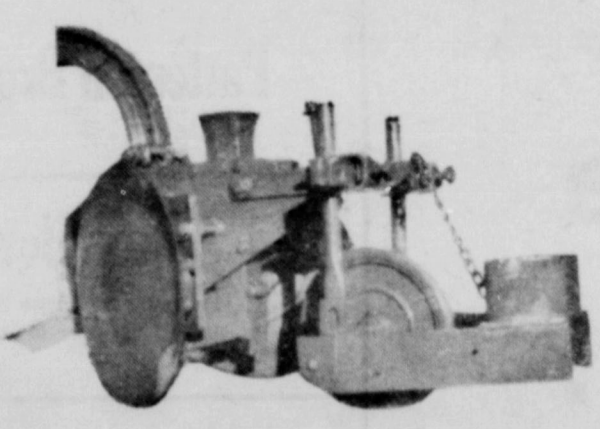
