First Milo Load Received Monday At Springlake

Oran Parish, Springlake farmer, delivered the first load of milo to the Springlake Elevator about 4:45 p.m. Monday.

The load of milo weighed 13,180 lbs., tested out 16.10 per cent moisture and was harvested from 2½ acres of irrigated land.

Parish planted the DeKalb E-56 seed in late April and has approximately 30 acres ready for combining.

The first open cotton bolls reported to the Earth News-Sun was reported by Mr. Parish September 1.

Sabin Vaccine To Be Given Sunday

The all-important Sabin Oral vaccine program will get underway here Sunday at the Springlake School. Everyone in the Earth-Springlake area are urged to be present to take the vaccine which will prevent persons from being a carrier of the dreaded disease.

The vaccine will be available from 7:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. and from 1:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Even though you have received the series of Salk inoculations, you are advised to take the oral doses. A series of three doses, each for a specific type of virus, will be necessary. October 23 and December 9 are the dates for the 3rd and 2nd doses.

The vaccine is free and no charge will be asked, however a jar will be placed in the school hallway for those wishing to make donations. This money will be used to help the Lions Clubs to cover the cost of the vaccine.

Registration forms for each family were available at churches, last Sunday and the announcement of the vaccine program was made.

Forms are available now at some of the business houses, school and churches in Earth and Springlake.

It is most important that these forms be filled out before coming to the school. This will save valuable time on the part of the workers who will be assisting and by having the filled out form ready, each person will be able to take the vaccine in a minute and a half and will then be free to leave. However, those who do not receive the forms are advised to come on out and fill the forms out there.

Infants will be given the vaccine by dropping 3 drops in the mouth. The vaccine will be taken to the homes of invalids who cannot move about.

Beginning at 8 a.m. buses will be available in Earth at the City Drug and Ralph Rudd's Texaco Station in Springlake. A bus will leave for the school each hour during the vaccine program. Elderly persons not wishing to ride the school buses may call 257-4321 and a private car will be sent to take them to the school and return them home.

The SOS (Sabin Oral Sunday) program is being sponsored by the Earth-Springlake Lions Clubs.

Remember, all persons, regardless of race, age or color are invited to come out to the school Sunday. Fight Polio and protect our children.

The milo, planted in April with Martin variety seed is on irrigated land, consisting of 320 acres.

Blackwell remarked that the area farmers are growing exceptionally good crops this year and proof of this is seen by visiting other areas. The difference in growth and maturity is remarkable. He reported that he expects the milo season to be in full swing about the first or second week in October.

Jerry Jones Wins Trip To Kansas City Convention

Jerry Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joel Jones, was recently awarded an expense paid trip to the National FFA convention in Kansas City, Mo. The convention will be held in October.

This award is given annually to about 17 boys from the State of Texas by the Santa Fe Railway Co.

Three boys from Area I were recipients of this year's award. They are Jerry Jones, Earth, who was elected Area I Star Lone Star Farmer; Larry Combest, Panhandle, Area I president and Curtis Dickson, Area I state officer.

Area I consists of the area from Childress to the New Mexico line and from Spur to the Oklahoma Panhandle.

The award is based on school grades, leadership activities in FFA and Project programs.

Jerry is enrolling at Texas Tech this fall on a \$300 Sears-Roebuck scholarship which is awarded annually to ten outstanding boys enrolling in agriculture. The top boy of the ten is awarded a \$600 scholarship for the sophomore year.

Jerry now has 12 registered Hampshire sows and two boars. He also has cotton and grain sorghum acreage.

Jerry is not only interested in swine, but is also the owner of four registered Hereford cows.

Jerry exhibited the reserve grand champion barrow in 1961 at San Antonio, grand champion barrow over - all breeds in 1962 at the Lubbock Junior Fat Stock Show. He won first place in the State Leadership team of 1960.

Jerry is the first in the history of the Springlake School to win this outstanding honor. Past president of the 1961-62 National Honor Society, he will be majoring in agriculture at Tech. He has also served as treasurer, reporter and secretary of the local chapter and as treasurer of Area I, FFA.

The Springlake School board of trustees have called for a bond election in the amount of \$195,000 to be held Saturday, September 15 at the Springlake School library.

A petition was presented to the board, asking for need improvements at the school.

Phil Raught will serve as election judge. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m. on election day.

Absentee began August 27 and ended September 11. A report from the County Clerks office Wednesday stated that 7 absentee ballots had been cast.

Voters will find two propositions appearing on the ballots. Both must pass in order for the bond election to carry, one cannot be valid without the other. Proposition no. 1 will call for the bond issue of \$195,000.

Proposition no. II will call for the passing of a maintenance tax. The maintenance tax, Public Law, Article 2784E-1 is a bill authorizing money to be obtained by raising tax rates instead of raising tax values.

The bond will raise taxes about 12 percent according to school trustees.

If the bond carries the money will be used for three much needed projects.

1. To build a new lunchroom.
2. To build 7 additional classrooms and library to the elementary building.
3. Repair the old junior high building.

By voting in the maintenance tax instead of raising values, the school district will save about \$48,000 over a period of fifteen years. Also by the passing of the tax proposition, the state will bear a larger share of additional money that is required to operate the school in the future years.

A sizable amount will have to be spent on the existing lunchroom if it is maintained as such, and also on the present junior high school building. To raise this money without the maintenance tax, it would require higher property values, resulting in less state aid.

Every eligible voter is urged to use their voting rights and vote Saturday in this vital election.

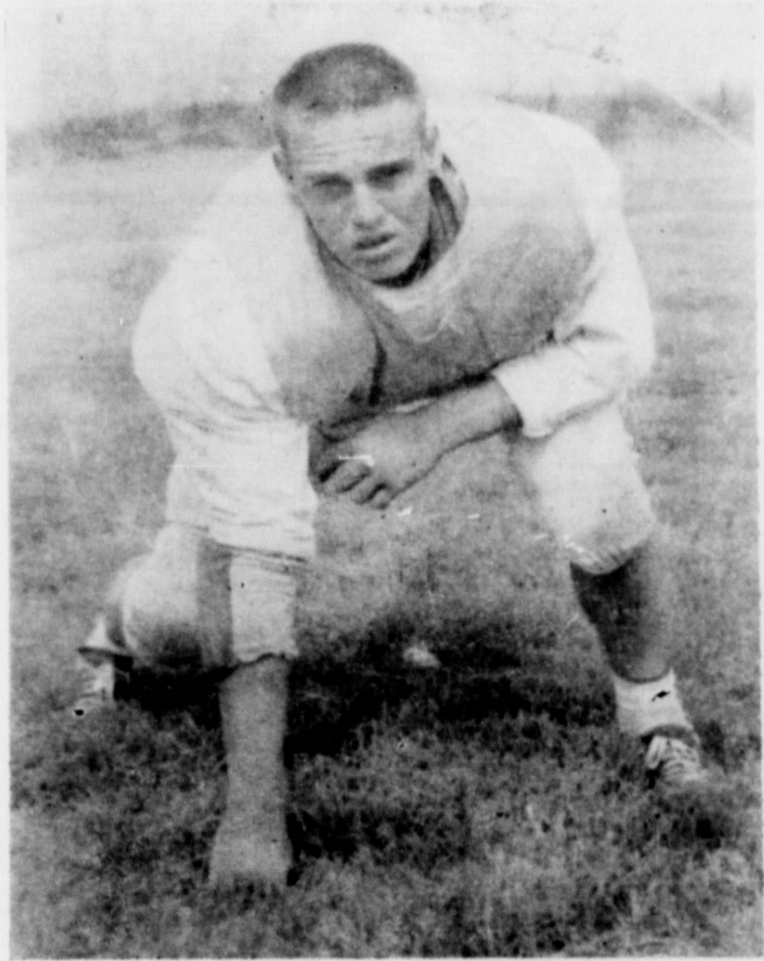

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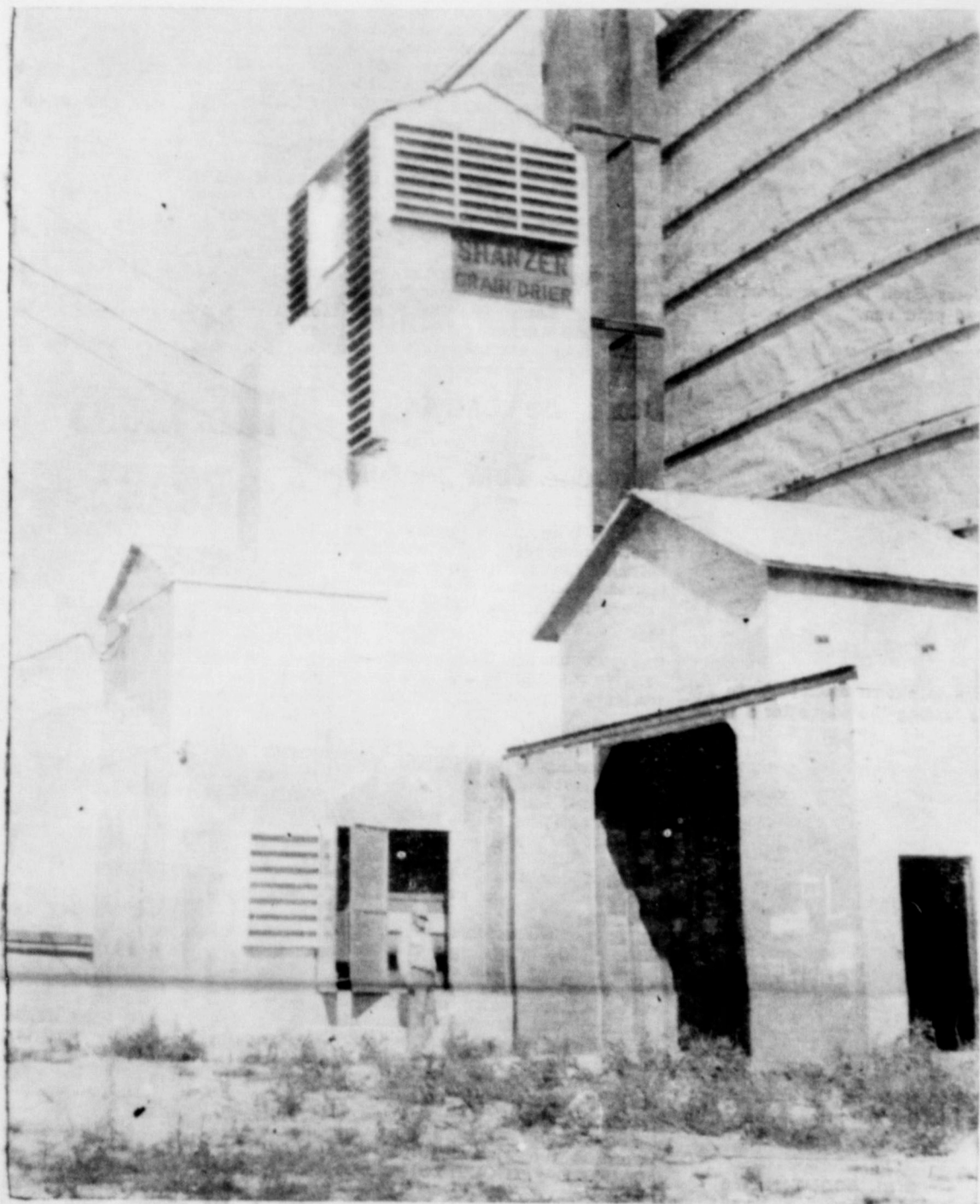

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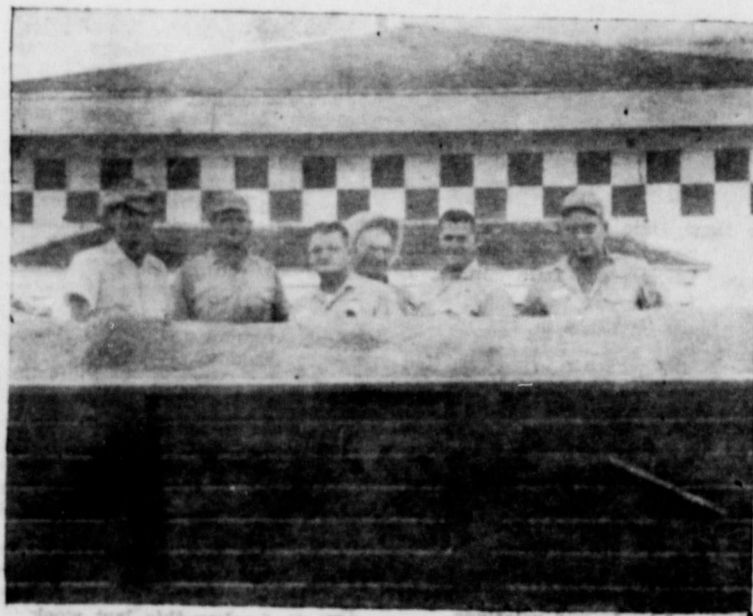

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Damages Run High In Two Accidents, Only One Injured

A smashing three vehicle collision at the intersection of US Highway 70 and the Springlake school road Friday night shortly after the Bovina-Springlake football game resulted in total loss to one car and a pickup. One person was hospitalized.

The collision occurred as David Sadler of the Sunnyside community, driving a 1960 International pickup was attempting to pull a car, belonging to Roy Gover, from a mudhole on the south side of the highway. A 1958 Chevrolet, driven by a Mr. Sims of Hale Center and going east, struck the pickup in a head-on collision which resulted in head injuries to Emert Rose, who was attempting to tie a tow chain from the pickup to the Gover car.

Mr. Rose was knocked to the ground by the impact. Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith, Jr. who was already at the scene helping with the stalled Gover car, saw the approaching Sims car and before he could move out of the way, with his hands braced on the pickup, the force of impact sent him vaulting across the Rose car which was parked on the east side of the Sadler pickup.

The Sims car then careened across the intersection to the east corner of the farm road where it tore down a fence post and shortly caught fire.

The Earth Volunteer Fire Department arrived and the blaze was extinguished.

Damage to the Rose car was light. It was bumped by the pickup during the collision.

Mr. Rose was taken to a Muleshoe hospital and kept overnight. He was treated for a severely lacerated ear.

V. L. Smith, Jr., Earth deputy and the Texas Highway Patrol investigated the accident.

A second accident occurred Tuesday at 12:15 p.m. when a 1959 Ford station wagon, driven by E. C. Hudson suffered rear end damage when hit by a 1958 Ford, driven by Randy Ward.

Total damage was estimated at \$400. Deputy V. L. Smith, Jr. investigated the accident.

The accident scene was one mile east of Earth.

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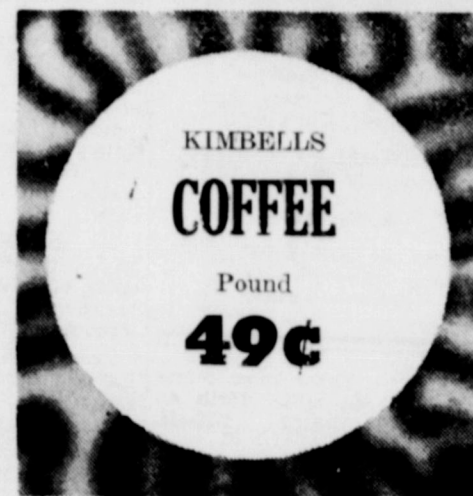

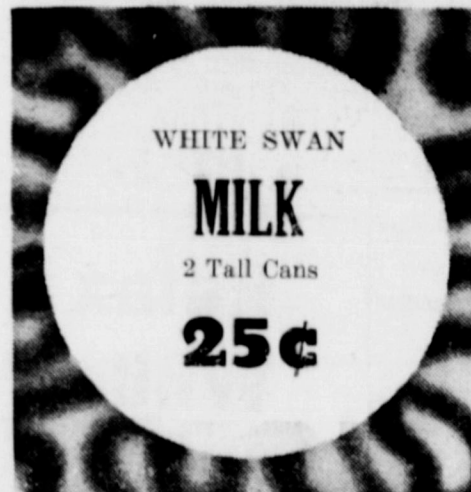
