



They were almost afraid to tell that for the truth, but really it happened.



now until the seedbed is prepared Residues on dryland soil should be left on the surface until about April 1. Adequate residues will give maximum protection against wind erasion.

When inadequate residues are produced emergency tillage should be practicede leaving the soil as cloduy eas possible to

break up the wind action. Some tillage may be helpfuel or necessary to prevent some of the loose

residue from blowing away. Residues not only protect the land from blowing, but also help conserve valuable moisture by cutting down on evaporation and holding snow.

When present crop residues are nadequate to give protection other residues such as cotton burs may be applied to reduce soil osses from wind erosion.

Increased water infiltration may also be expected from the pplication of cotton burs.
