

A 256,000 kilowatt unit, 'it is scheduled to be in service for the summer of 1974. The first Jones Station generator, also a 256,000 kilowatt unit, went into service earlier this year.

The generating unit planned for 1976 operation is slated to be the company's first 350,000 kilowatt machine. However, company has "reserved" three capabilities - 250,000. 350,000 and 450,000 - with the manufacturer, and the final decision will be made after all growth factors have been
