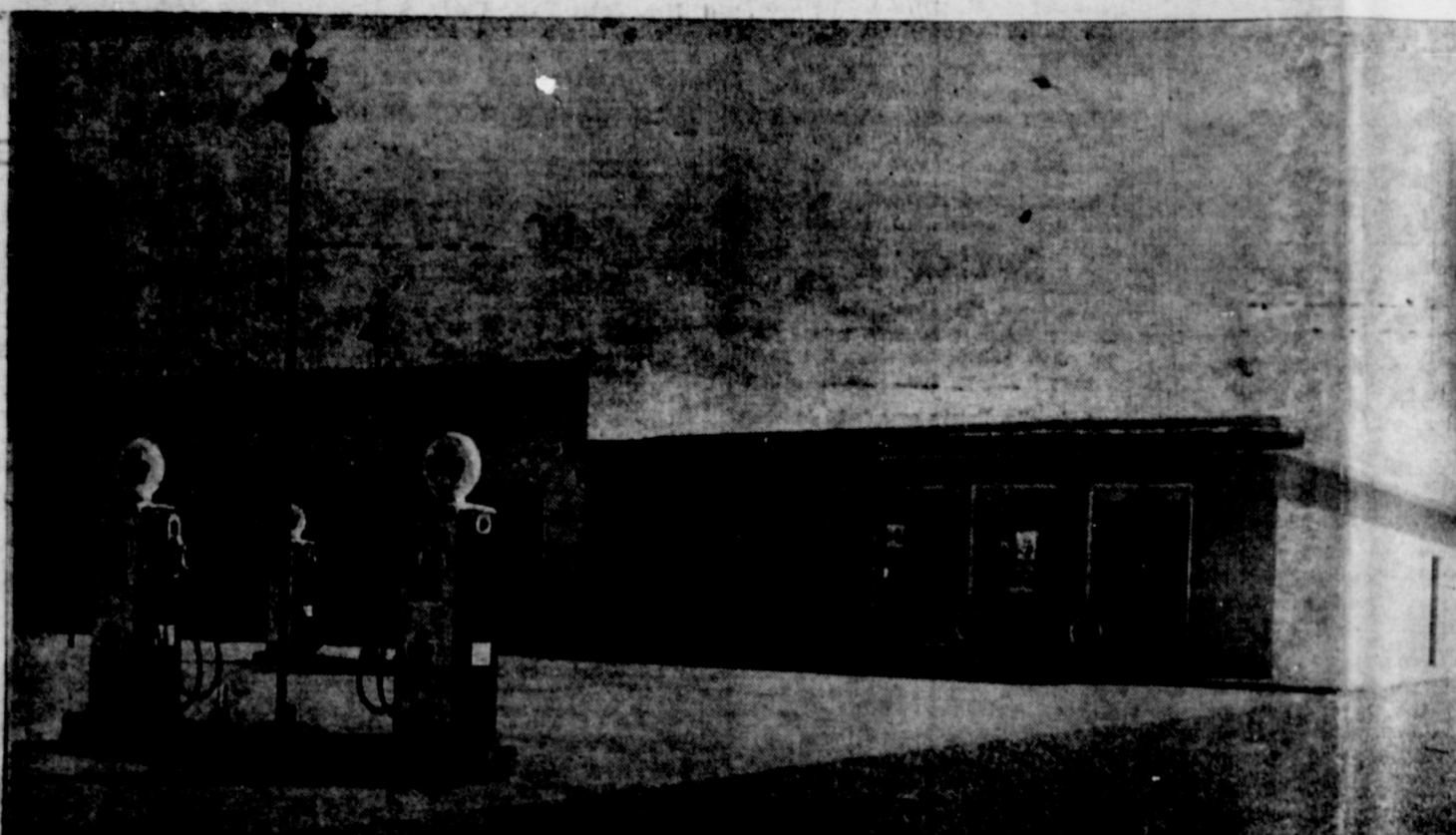

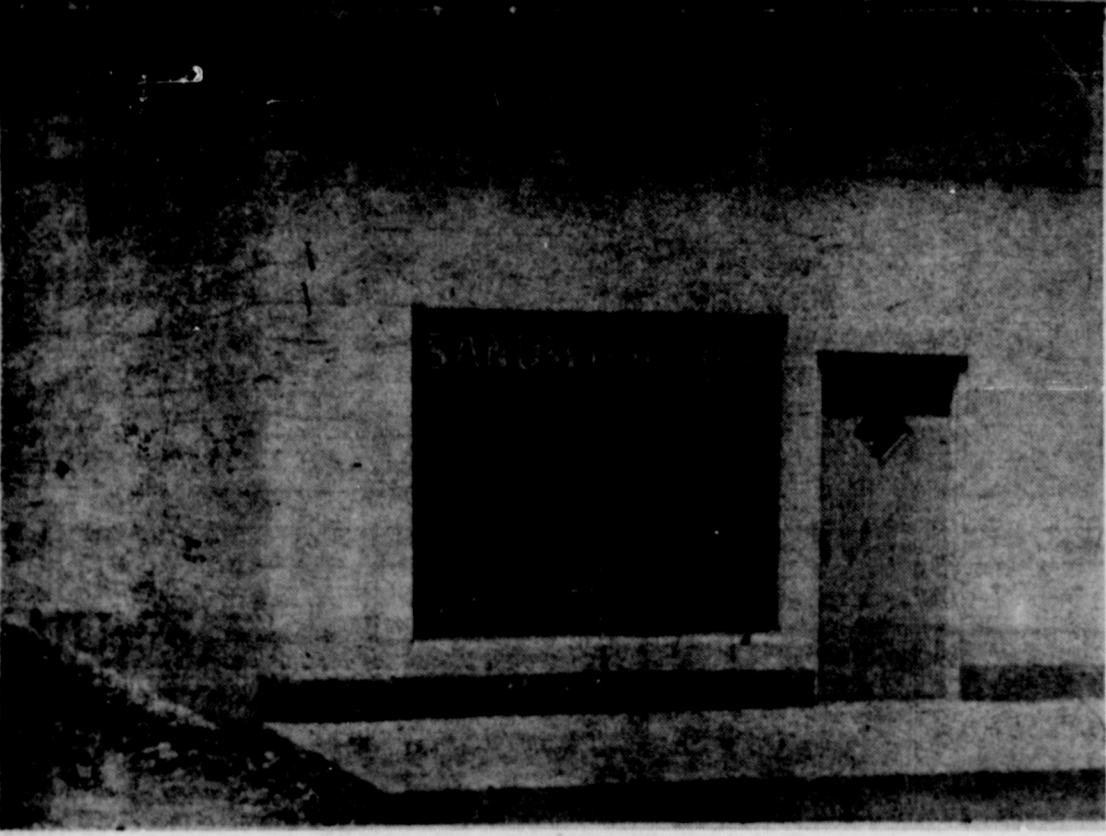

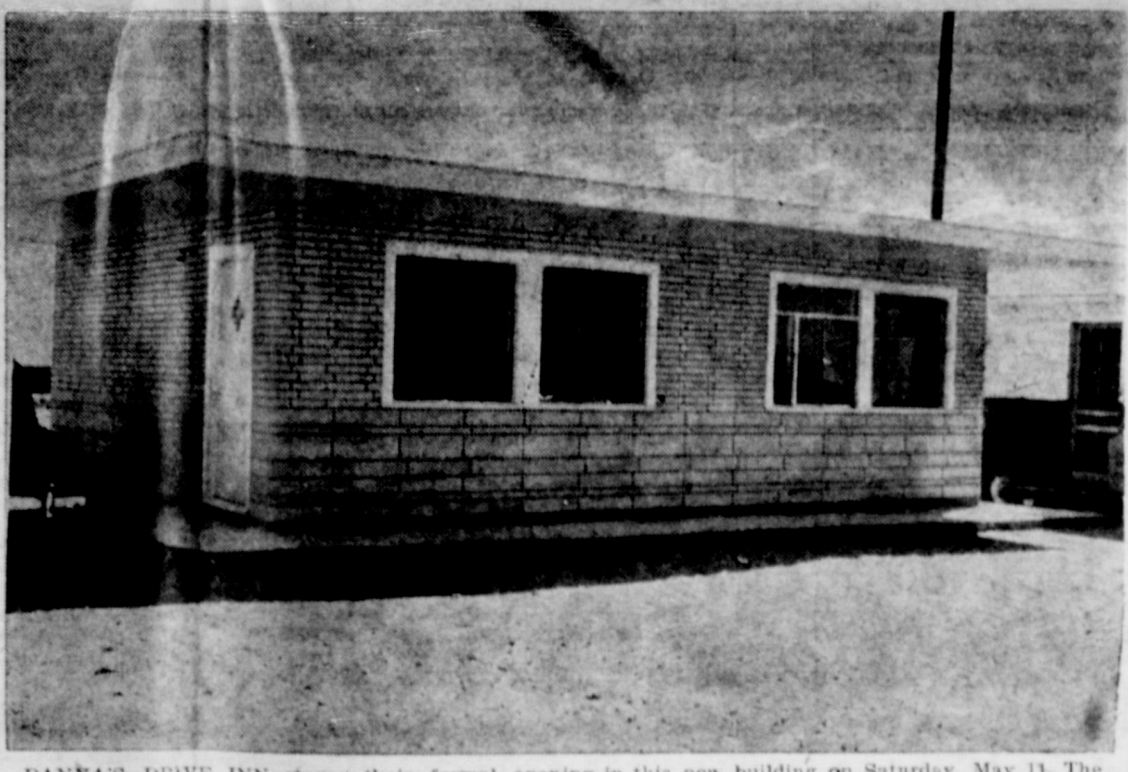

## Events and Accomplishments Of Past Year Are Interesting

As 1957 fades into history and we begin to embark upon a new year, we cannot refrain from looking backward in a brief review of some of the events and the accomplishments which occurred in our area throughout the year.

Several new businesses have begun operation in Earth during the year, along with the formal opening of the Faust Clinic on January 13, which now provides medical facilities and service for our community and the surrounding area.

Also holding formal openings in January was the Rainbow of Beauty and Earth Power and Gift Shop.

In early February the City Commission passed a dog ordinance requiring that all dogs be registered and inoculated, as a precaution against rabies.

March was an outstanding month in our schools. Public School Week was observed March 4-8. A band concert, attended by approximately 400, a recognition program for teachers and past school board members, and a date school visitation by parents and other interested persons, were highlights of the week.

The free Salk vaccine was given to approximately 275 students in the local school on March 22.

1957 was a year of unusual weather conditions. A severe blizzard, with drifting snow came on the weekend of March 23. Drifts blocked highways and rural roads, bringing traffic to an almost complete standstill.

On April 9, the Earth Chamber of Commerce held its second annual banquet, with Jack Lacey as guest speaker. 145 persons were present. The previous year only 36 attended the occasion. This gives an indication of the growth and strength of the organization.

Early in the year Springlake began an effort to get rural telephone service for that area. On Sept. 5, an ordinance offered by General Telephone Co. for a dial exchange system was approved; the system to be installed in 30 months.

Tornadoes were prevalent throughout the year, with terrific damage occurring on April 22 in the Weathered, Littlefield, Lubbock area, and on May 24 in the vicinity of Olson.

The Sandwich Shop and Dana's Drive Inn held their formal openings in their new buildings in May.

Springlake installed its City Water System and the first meter readings began on June 20.

An outstanding recreational program was sponsored by the Earth Recreation Association and the Earth C. of C. in 1957. Over 115 boys, ages 8-14, participated in the Little League Baseball program, with the Yankees winning the local championship. An added recreation feature, was the semi-weekly swims at the Muleshoe Swimming Pool. Children were transported back and forth on a school bus, under supervision of adults. Fuel was contributed by local merchants and businessmen.

On July 11, 12, 13 the 13th Annual Earth Rodeo and Barbecue was held.

The community of Sunnyside was named as the recipient of a special recognition award for community improvement.

The B. and C. Pump and Machine Works opened in Earth on Monday, August 5.

The largest Shamrock Station in the world, the Earth Tire and Supply Co., formally opened in Earth on October 18 and 19. It has 5460 sq. ft. of floor space.

On Oct. 29, the Springlake School was the scene of the 14th District P. T. A. Annual Workshop, with guests attending from 13 counties on the South Plains.

Construction was completed on the 28'x30' frame steel building which contains the Firemen's recreation room and water department workshop in Earth. The City Hall was also remodeled and redecorated throughout.

The Earth Radiator Shop began operation in November. Also, on November 21, between 2 and 3 inches of snow fell in the area. The snow and cold temperatures along with October rains and September hail damage materially affected the crop conditions in the vicinity.

December, a good weather month, was a very busy time for farmers and area gins, which were swamped with cotton.

Throughout the year some businesses exchanged ownership or management, or were remodeled. Several new homes were built, and many other events took place.

But with the year 1957 only a memory now, we join with our friends and fellow citizens, in looking forward to a New Year — 1958.

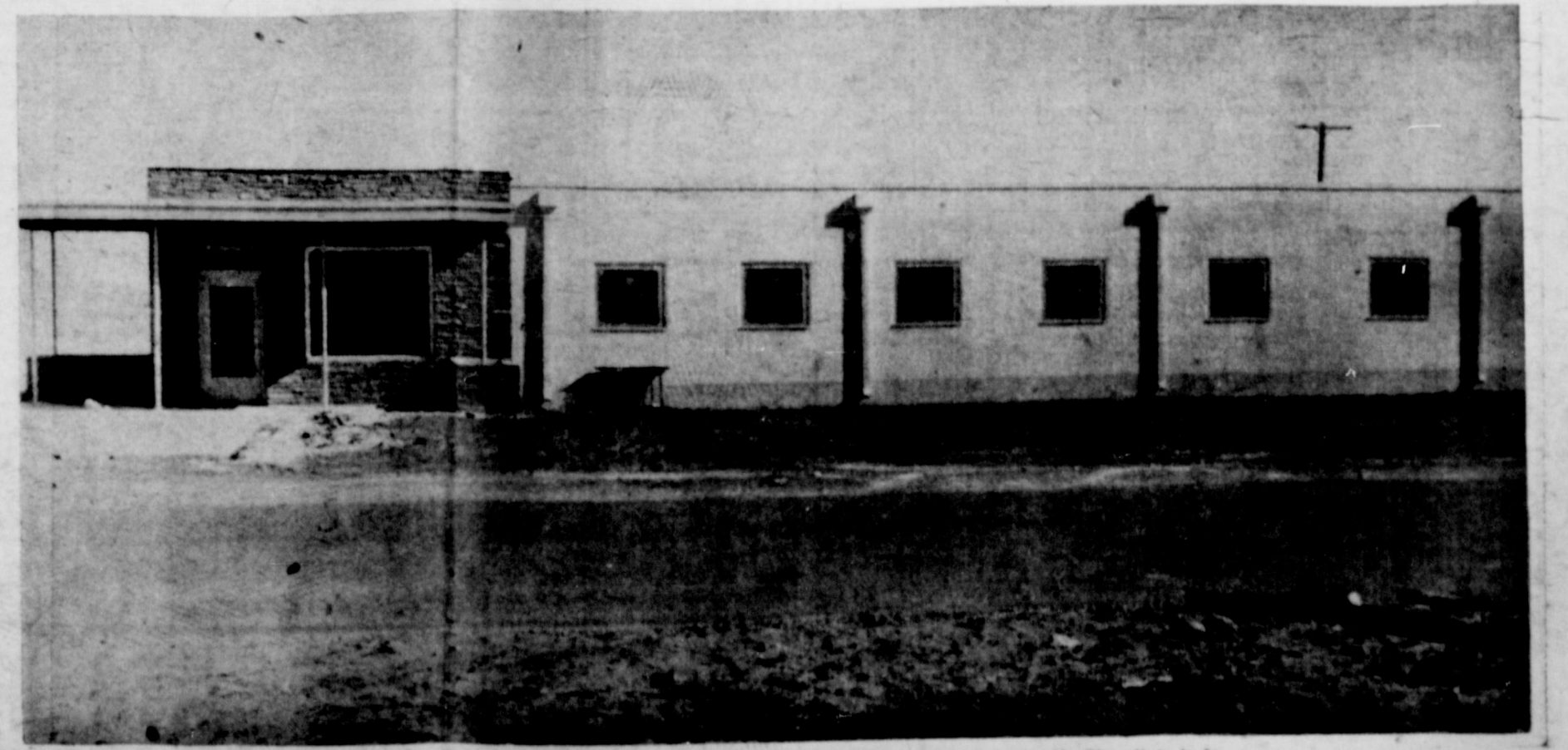

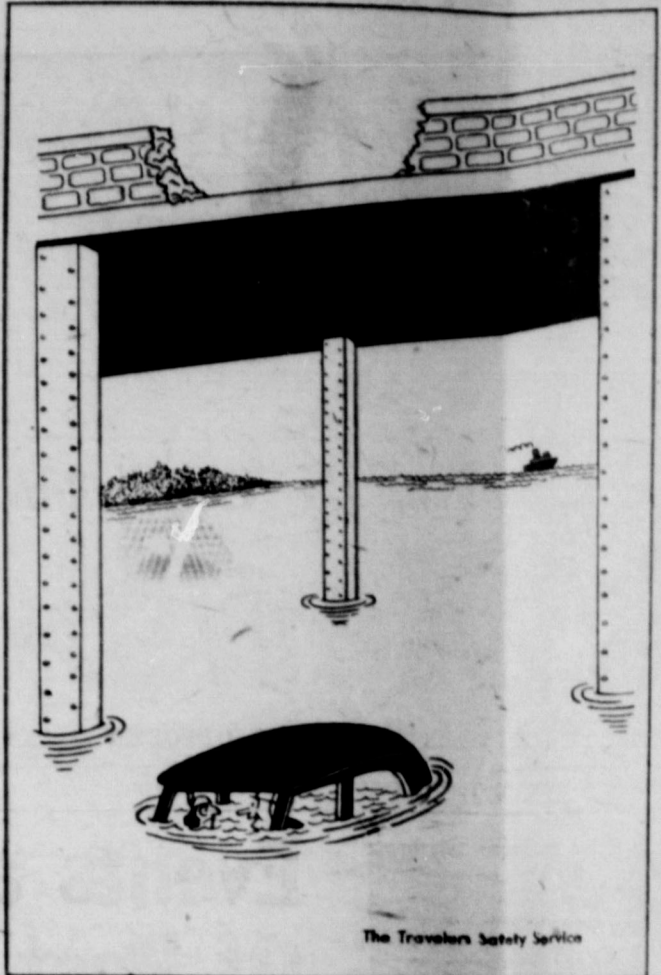

About ten years ago on this typewriter I penned a piece for my outdoors column about the passing of the Pacemaker. In it I shed a tear, along with thousands of others, for the discontinuance of the hand gun that helped to carve civilization out of a rugged west.

The Colt factory had decided that the market for its famous old single action Frontier model revolver was gone. Instead, they were selling ACPs and double action 38 Specials and snub nose guns.

The price of used single action Colt revolvers jumped. Many of them that once cost about \$16 were sold for as high as \$100. Collectors began gathering them. Classified ads pages of gun publications offered to buy or sell these valuable keepsake revolvers.

It was natural that some other manufacturers came along with facemiles. They ranged in price well above the last retail selling price of the Colt.

Then came TV. Quick triggered gunmen gave so much publicity to long barrel Colt pistols that they made a comeback.

But here is the big news. Colt has just announced a new 22 caliber version of the world famous Single Action Army Colt. It will sell at a price below \$50 - brand new.

early memories of these wonderful guns. There was something about them, their feel, their appearance, and the way they hung the hip, that we can never forget.

To our way of thinking there has been no advance in hand-gun manufacture in recent years, greater than the return of the Colt Single Action.

### CHECK YOUR GUNSIGHTS

Speaking of guns, on a trip through West Texas recently we were talking with a party of hunters. One of them had shot at his buck seven times before he finally connected.

"I checked my sight AFTER I came in and found it was two feet off," the hunter said. "The shot that finally got the buck was purely an accident."

The rancher where these men were hunting then told how one time he had walked up on two bucks standing just below the rim between Marfa and the Rio Grande. "I shot at them 14 times with my saddle 30-30 and never touched a hair," he said. "When I finally got around to checking my sights I found the front sight had been accidentally knocked over and I was missing these bucks by 37 inches at 100 yards."

Most hunters know they should zero their guns before taking a trip. But it is a little hard now to find a place for sighting in.

About the best way is to join a goat club that has a shooting range. If your home town has none, then how about organizing one?

### BUILDING BRUSH SHELTERS

We often hear someone talk about building brush shelters in fishing water, especially in known crappie waters. Some very intensive research work has been done by a number of biologists to determine whether brush cover in water really is beneficial both to fish and fishermen.

A test run on a Virginia lake revealed a definite increase in angler success for black crappie. Overall fishing pressure in this particular lake increased 15 per cent between 1955 and 1956. But the harvest of black crappies increased 40 per cent in 1956 after installation of the shelters. Although only 22 per cent of the fishermen used the shelter areas, they harvested 52 per cent.

If you plan to build one of these shelters, talk with your game warden, area biologist of the Game and Fish Commission, or your county agent. They can give you some good advice.
