## 'B' Choice Program Means Additional Cotton Acreage

LUBBOCK — Cotton producers on the Texas High Plains by virtue of the 'B' choice program for 1959 will have 130,293 additional acres to plant this year giving them a total allotted acreage of 2,265,044.

While participation in the 'B' choice program was much lighter than expected by most agricultural observers across the nation, the High Plains area had about 15.2 percent participation while the national participation was 15.7 percent.

Lamb County acreage increase rose 17,961 acres with a total county allotment of 202,931 acres. Bailey County increased 11,917 acres with an allotment of 102,582 and Castro showed a 4,383 acres increase and county allotment of 58,209 acres.

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. members in the 23 counties will have more acreage available to plant this year than was available for planting in 1958. However total allotments last year were greater, 2,279,436 acres against 2,265,044 acres for 1959, but last year farmers put 145,778 acres in the soil bank and there will be no soil bank this year. Also farmers for 1959 took approximately a 6 percent acreage cut. However the additional 130,293 acres received by farmers who selected the 'B' program pushes the total acreage available for planting higher than that acreage last year.

In Texas farmers who selected the 'B' choice will receive an additional 428,121 acres and this pushes the total state acreage available for planting from 6,846,757 to 7,274,878 acres.

Nation-wide farmers who selected 'B' received additional acres and upped the total cotton acreage from 16,310,000 acres to 17,333,529 acres.

## In-Furrow Fungicides Aid In Controlling Cotton Seed Disease

College Station — Use of in-furrow fungicides at planting time may be an effective aid for controlling cotton seedling disease in some areas, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Cotton seedling disease is one of the major diseases attacking cotton in Texas, Smith pointed out. Last year it cost Texas farmers a little over four and one half million dollars.

Information concerning use of in-furrow fungicides at planting time, a relatively new seedling disease control practice, was first published by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in January of 1958. About 400 Texas producers used the practice on a total of 26,523 acres last year.

Most of the treated acreage was centered in the High Plains and Lower Rio Grande Valley, Smith explained. However, there were small tests in several other areas. A Wharton county grower tried it on 50 acres and obtained quite favorable results.

For general use a mixture of Captan, Zineb and PCNB applied as a spray or dust is recommended. As a spray, 5 pounds of a formulation containing 15 percent active Captan, 22.5 percent active PCNB and 26 percent active ZINEB applied in water at the rate of 7 gallons per acre is suggested.

As a dust, 10 pounds of a formulation containing 7.5 percent active Captan, 11.5 percent active PCNB and 12.0 percent active Zineb per acre is effective. Nabam applied as a spray at the rate of 1 gallon per acre should give good results in soils with pH below 7.3.

### Fertilizer Tests Proves To Be Very Profitable

Fertilizer tests on cotton at the High Plains Station at Halfway in 1958 indicated that with favorable weather for cotton production applications of fertilizer can be very profitable. In these 1958 trials two fertilizer treatments returned \$100 per acre above fertilizer cost, these were 120-40-0 and 120-80-0. Yields were increased as much as 418 pounds of lint per acre.

No response was obtained to phosphate alone and there was no consistent response to phosphate along with nitrogen. Although there was little evidence of increase in yield or quality from phosphate in 1958, there was more indication of this in 1957. It is believed that phosphate can assist in producing earlier maturity in a season like 1957.

Lint samples were obtained from each fertilizer treatment, the results indicate that the kind or amount of fertilizer applied had no measurable effect on any fiber quality.

Based on the results obtained under the two extremes of weather conditions in 1957 and 1958, the following nitrogen fertilizer program can be suggested: If planted before May 1, 100 to 120 pounds N, May 1 to May 10, 70 to 100 pounds N, May 10 to 20, 40 to 70 pounds N, May 20 to May 31, 20 to 40 pounds N, after June 1, no N. Forty to 80 pounds of phosphate is suggested regardless of planting time.

Experiments showed that similar yield increases were obtained if all nitrogen was applied before planting, all sidedressed, or in split applications. Because of this it is suggested that the nitrogen along with the required phosphate. If the cotton is planted early additional nitrogen can be sidedressed any time up to the first irrigation.

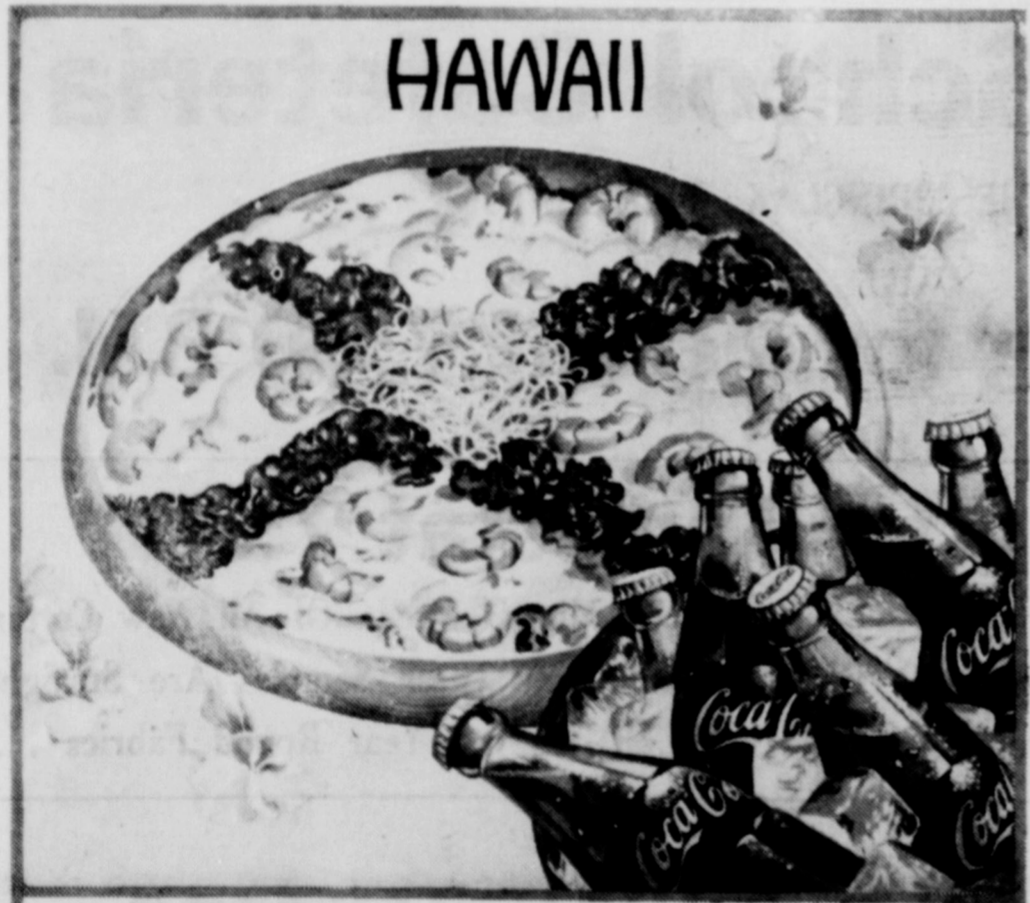

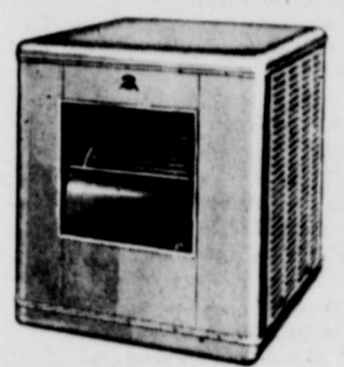

## Clergymen Must Make Certain Steps for Benefits

The Social Security Administration reminds clergymen that some of them will never be able to have their earnings from the ministry count toward old-age, survivors, or disability benefits if they fail to take certain steps within the next few weeks. John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock social security office, declares.

Clergymen may have their earnings from the ministry counted toward old-age, survivors, and disability insurance protection if they formally indicate within a specified time their desire to have these earnings counted. When a clergyman comes under social security he reports his earnings as self-employment income even though these earnings may be salary paid him by the congregation or religious order which he serves. He must pay the social security self-employment tax on his earnings. The church or religious order which he serves does not become involved in any way.

Any clergyman who has not yet elected to be covered under the social security law must file a waiver certificate with the District Director of Internal Revenue on or before the due date of his income tax return for his second taxable year after 1956. For many clergy-

men who file income tax returns on a calendar year basis, this deadline is April 15, 1959.

If a waiver certificate is not filed within the time limit specified in the law, it cannot be filed at all. In this case, the clergyman's earnings from the ministry can never be counted toward social security benefits.

erosion on the land after leaving various amounts of crop residues on the soil surface.

The areas where they had grain sorghums in 40 inch rows, and had cut it to a 4 inch stubble height showed signs of some soil drifting and the area where they had grain sorghums in 46 inch rows cut to a 14 inch stubble height had some soil drifting in the sandier spots.

The areas where they had grain sorghums in 20 inch rows with a 14 inch left didn't show any signs of drifting or blowing thus showing the effect of leaving enough close spaced sorghum stalks standing to help control soil blowing.

Another interesting part of the tour was the area which was seeded to native grasses to study the effect of dryland range seeding on old abandoned fields. The field was planted to a cover crop of grain sorghum and shreaded before it made seed. They then planted the area to Plains Bristlegrass in strips.

The grass is now about 1-6" high and has a very good covering of the grass on the area. This grass appears to be an excellent grass for seeding dryland areas, as the plots didn't receive any supplemental water.

Anyone desiring more information on this grass should contact the Soil Conservation Service personnel in the court house in Littlefield.

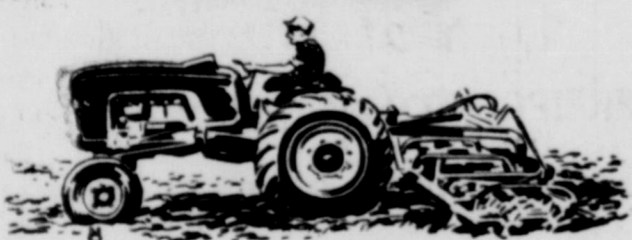

**Corner on Cotton**  
BY BOB COLLINS

Confusion as to how many acres will be planted to cotton this season follows the government announcement of farmers choosing "B" with its 40 per cent increase . . . about 2.5 million acres went into Choice "B" . . . resulting increase making over 3.5 million acres that will be planted to "B" cotton . . . this looks like 16.8 acres of cotton planted (a half million acres of the authorized land will go into conservation reserve) . . . but there won't be for its looks are deceiving . . . all of the "B" acreage will be planted if possible, but a considerable amount of the "A" acreage won't be . . . many farmers won't plant and won't turn in their allotment so some one else may use it . . . and some men have allotments who aren't farmers anymore they have abandoned their farming and moved to the city and have found it too much trouble to notify their ASC committee . . . as predicted, California put a greater percentage of acreage into "B" than any other state . . . 60.6% . . . and Georgia was low with 1.4% about 16% of the basic allotment of the country went into "B".

**Soil Bank**  
There's a possibility of Congress being asked for more funds to take up to 40 million acres out of production . . . would cost about \$575 million or \$200 million more than the current annual payment ceiling.  
**We Suggest**  
If anybody is going to get paid for not growing cotton, we suggest that ginners get paid for not ginning . . . merchants for not buying, servicing and selling . . . crushers for not crushing . . . warehouses for not storing . . . transportation lines for not hauling . . . newspapers, radio and television for not advertising . . . department stores for not selling and customers for not buying cotton . . . this way we would all have nothing to do and would still get paid . . . wonder why somebody hasn't thought of this before???

**Red Cotton Up?**

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
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

## A Brighter Outlook For Farm Equipment Stocks

The farm equipment industry has done considerably better than many of the other capital goods industries during 1958. In fact, in a study we made of seven companies, six of them showed earnings in 1958 higher than those in 1957. Of these seven companies, six of them are on a fiscal year ending October 31 and have already reported their first quarter earnings for the three months period ended January 31, 1959. Five of these show improved earnings while the sixth company (*International Harvester*) showed poorer earnings probably because of a nine weeks work stoppage. Furthermore, it is interesting to note that of these six companies, five operated in the black, again with *International Harvester* being the only one operating at a loss. This is unusual in that the first quarter is seasonally a poor one for farm equipment sales as shown by the fact that last year three of the six operated at a loss.

In 1958 farm income was up over 1957. Greater growth in the farm equipment field seems likely as farms are becoming more and more mechanized and the day of the hand operated farm is almost over. Furthermore many of these companies have diversified into the roadbuilding and construction equipment field, an industry expected to show improvement later this year. Consequently it seems likely that all of these companies

will probably have better earnings in 1959 than in 1958.

Another interesting finding is that five of the seven companies we have covered sell at a discount from their book value, one sells at approximately its net working capital after debt and preferred stocks have been deducted and one sells at a discount to working capital. This means in effect that if these companies were liquidated the liquidation would be at a higher level than the actual market value of the stocks. These findings are particularly interesting when one considers the possibility of any merger with some other company taking over one of these farm equipment companies with the purpose of diversifying its operations.

For the person willing to take a businessman's risk *AH's Chalmers and Oliver* look interesting. For the speculator we would recommend *J. I. Case, Massey-Ferguson* and *Minneapolis-Moline*.
