## **Paying For Federal Highways**

The enormously costly proposed federal road program, now be ing discussed in Congress, has sharply focused public attention or the problem of how to pay for highways.

Robert S. Henry of the Association of American Railroads recent ly observed that if the cost of highway construction and maintenand is to be distributed equitably, some kind of of adequate user charge should be collected from heavy vehicles. This charge would simply reflect their greater use of the roads and the higher construction and maintenance costs they impose

Mr. Henry added that neither the fuels tax nor the license equitable. Then he said that the most equitable tax of all would be one that, in effect, "weighed" a vehicle and "measered" the distant it runs. As an example, a tax on tires would not only take into ad count theweight and number of tires used by a vehicle on the highways but would measure the miles run. Such a tax is also feasible in administration, Mr. Henry pointed out, since it would be coffected at the relatively few points of manufacture and would be paid but once during the life of the tire.



Although this condition does not happen often in West Texas, something must be done to keep the aphid from killing the alfalfa. The material is 1-4 lb. parathon. 2 gal. diesel oil to the acre.
