There will naturally be cries of police brutality. The do-gooders and the sob-singers will raise their voices in angry protest and speak of the evils befalling this country because of wanton infliction of pain on our "decent" citizens. They will tactfully neglect to mention the fact that these bearded "off-beats" have brought this on themselves. There is, of course, no clear cut solution. We have had these people among us throughout our history and I suppose we always will. But in quick defense of the police departments throughout our nation, I say they have no other recourse. It is foolish

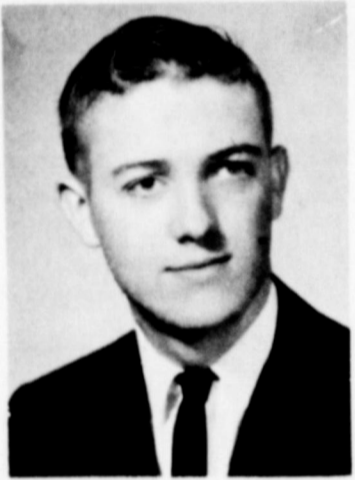

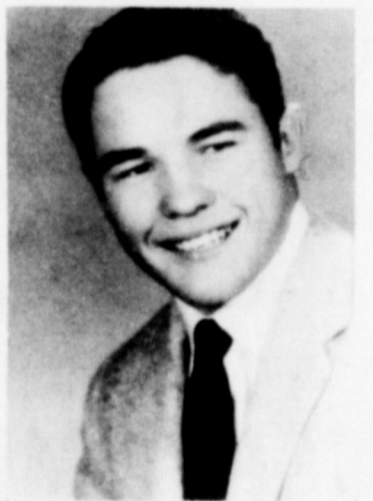

A report from the second test taken by Jimmy Mann at the revisit Center, Monday, in Hereford for the Institute of Achievement of Human Potential, indicated he had advanced six months in neurological age during the past two months. Jimmy, who began the therapy four months ago, has successfully advanced a complete year during his months of treatment. In all phases of the tests Jimmy showed marked improvements. In the comprehension tests, Jimmy's score was up to the third grade level. He surprised his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Mann with answers he gave to questions involving stories they had read to him.

In a vocabulary test he was graded at a second grade level. The therapy treatments will continue the same with only a few minor changes, Mrs. Mann explained. The masked breathing will be cut down to one minute every hour, instead of every thirty minutes. She went on to disclose that his "Board Walking" was cut to 15 minutes each day instead of the 40 minutes he has been

accustomed to. They also suggested a change in his homolateral patterning to cross patterning.

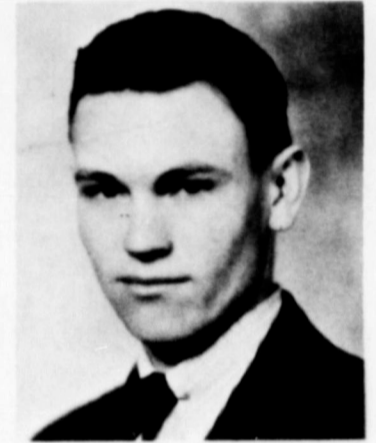
The lad is expected to continue the therapy treatment program for at least two years. However, the marked improvement seems to give Jimmy a boost, as well as his parents and the entire community who hope Jimmy will have a better life. "The treatments and the improvement have added much happiness to the young lad's life. He enjoys each day to a greater degree than before."

The final score was 20 for the Steers and 0 for the Wolverines.

Scoring all their touchdowns with runs to the outside, the Steers found the stubborn Wolverine defense settled down after the opening stanza. With Bobby Cummings and Terry Ott capable plugging the middle of the line, the Steers had to resort to passes and end runs to make any showing.

Farwell passed 12 times during the contest and completed only one for the evening. The Wolverine defense completely checked their passing game. Speed was the deciding factor in the contest as the Steers simply outran the defenders once they got to the outside.

According to Coach Danny Smith, it was a good team effort for all the way, but lack of poise and confidence hurt them in the first quarter. For the remainder of the game, the Wolverines seemed to settle down and made the going a bit rough for the Steers in the last three quarters of play.

Smith mentioned that, besides Cummings and Ott, that he believed Gary Haber and Randy Washington played fine defensive ball the entire game and that Washington played his best offensive game of the year. Farwell had 18 first downs as compared to 11 for the Wolverines and four penetrations as compared to one for Springlake-Earth. Farwell had one pass completion out of 11 attempts while Springlake-Earth had two for seven. One of the completions for the Wolverines was for thirty yards but was nullified with a penalty.

In the penalty bracket, Farwell was penalized thirty yards while the Wolverines had 20 yards assessed against them. This Friday night, the Wolverines play host to the Bovina Mustangs in their annual homecoming game. Game time is set for 7:30 p. m.

Bovina, in last week's game against Sudan, acquitted themselves very well. trict game of the season for the Wolverines and will have a direct bearing on the outcome of district play. Though dropping their first district game last week, the Wolverines are still in full contention for the championship.

As Friday's game is somewhat, a large turnout is to be expected. However, the Wolverines need all the support they can receive and it is urged that all local fans turn out and back the Springlake-Earth Wolverines for this important district game.

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

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

U. S. D. A. Announces The 1968 Cotton Program

LUBBOCK, Friday, October 13, 1967-----Essentials of the 1968 cotton program, as announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture October 11, are these:

1. National allotment of 16.1 million acres (same as in 1967);
2. Domestic allotment at 65 per cent of total allotment (same as in 1967);
3. Price support loan at 20.25 cents per pound, basis middling inch (same as 1967);
4. Price support payment of 12.24 cents per pound (compared to 11.58 cents this year);
5. Mandatory diversion of five per cent of allotments (12.5 per cent in 1967), with a payment of 10.76 cents per pound times projected yield (10.78 cent payment in 1967);
6. Option to voluntarily divert an additional 30 per cent with a payment of six cents per pound times projected yield (compared to 10.78 cents in

1967), and

7. Skip-row rules as they were in the years 1962-65, permitting two in, one out and two in, two out plantings without penalty.

Other major program provisions remain the same as this year.

Producers on the Plains generally are applauding the Secretary's decision on skip-row planting. Their immediate reaction to the rest of the program can probably be summed up as "not too bad."

Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. said: "We are happy to see a return to the 1965 skip-row regulations as this will be of substantial benefit to many of our members. And, considering the alternatives open to the Secretary under present law, I have to agree that the program doesn't look bad at all."

Initial calculations reveal that the producer who still elects to divert the maximum 35 percent of his allotment will get a blended payment (payment per pound based on projected yield from his entire allotment) of about 10.29 cents. This year's payment rates yielded about 11.27 cents on the same basis.

Applied to a 100 acre allot-

ment with a projected yield of 500 pounds per acre a producer's income from government payments alone in 1968 will be approximately \$490 less than in 1967 if he diverts the maximum 35 per cent.

To compensate for that loss of payments, producers will have the opportunity to plant skip-row cotton without penalty, or if they figure the market price of cotton will justify it, to plant up to 95 percent of allotments.

In many instances the revised skip-row regulations alone will increase production and improve quality from planted acreage enough to more than make up for the loss.

For the grower who plants only the domestic portion of a 100 acre allotment, only an additional three to five bales of cotton from 65 acres will make up the difference, or a slight improvement in average grade, micronaire or staple will do the same thing.

Growers whose conditions render them capable of growing the premium priced cottons will likely choose to plant either the maximum 95 percent of allotment or some percentage between there and the minimum.

And if this season's market

prices prevail in 1968 a significant boost to the income of these producers will occur.

Each farmer will need to apply his own cost figures and price expectations to the program to determine which route is economically best under his particular circumstances.

From a strict dollar and cents standpoint it will be a matter of deciding whether cotton grown on 30 per cent of an allotment will sell for enough to cover the six cents per pound payment that will be forfeited, plus production costs and enough profit to offset the additional risk.

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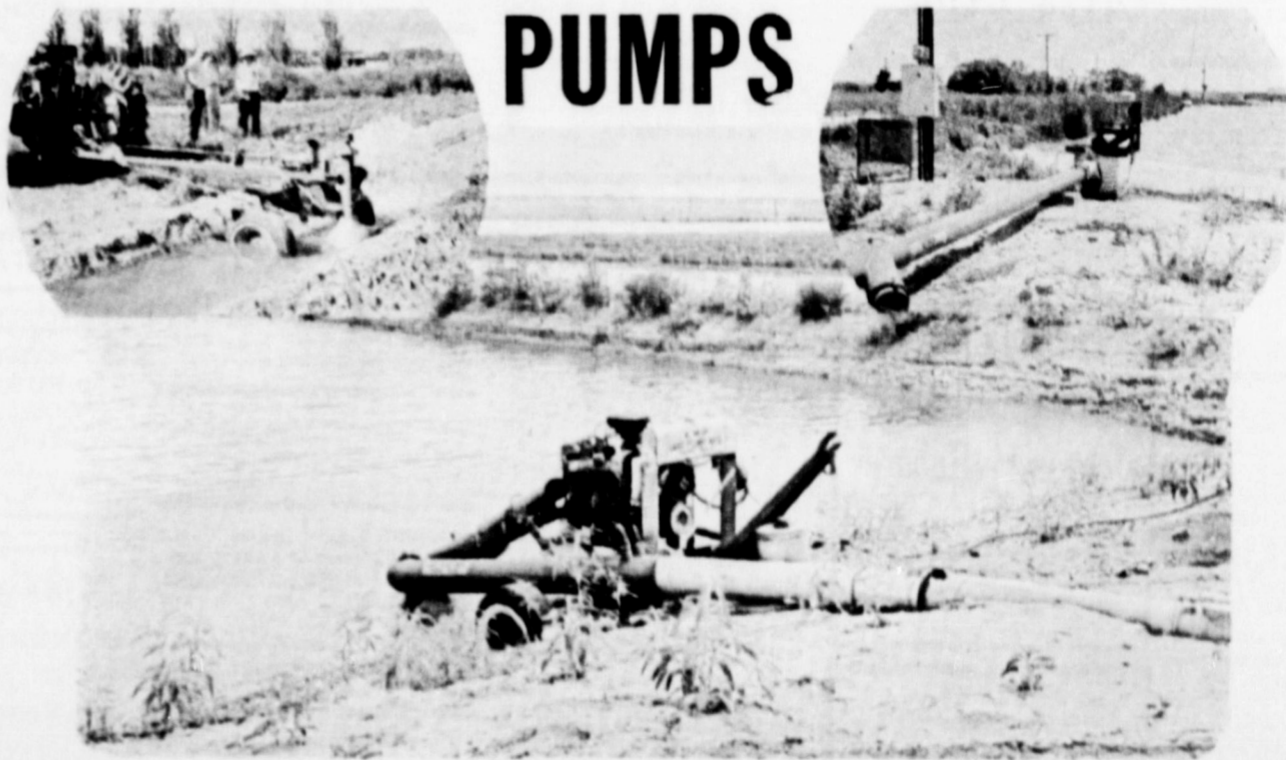
