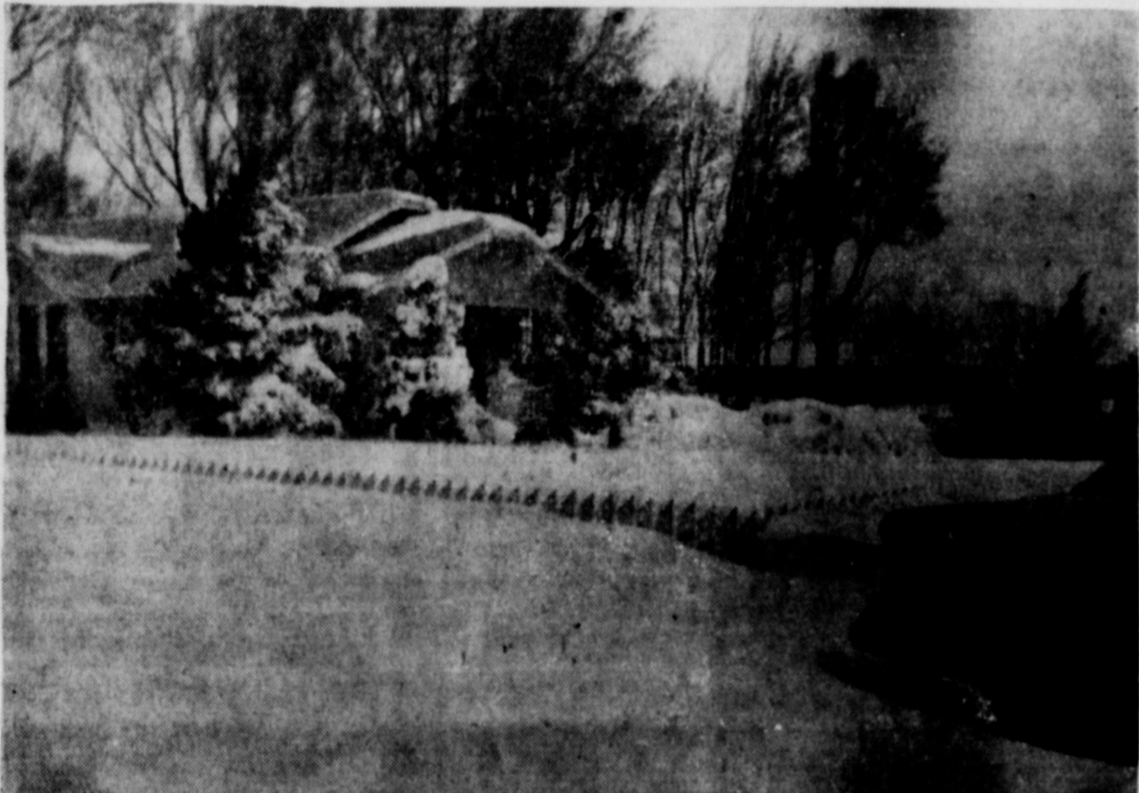

Severe Blizzard Hits Plains Area

Last weekend residents of Earth and the surrounding area, trembled from cold each time they left their shelters. Gusts of wind driving snow flurries were said to have reached the speed of 85 miles per hour at various times during Saturday night and Sunday.

Several inches of snow fell Saturday night, with the high winds collecting the flakes into high drifts, causing blocked highways and rural roads.

The high winds damaged the roof of the Earth Elevator warehouse and several residence roofs in Earth. Several cotton trailers were overturned by the severe blizzardous winds.

Springlake School and other schools over the Plains were closed Monday due to blocked highways and muddy roads.

One half to three fourths of inch of moisture was reported for this area.

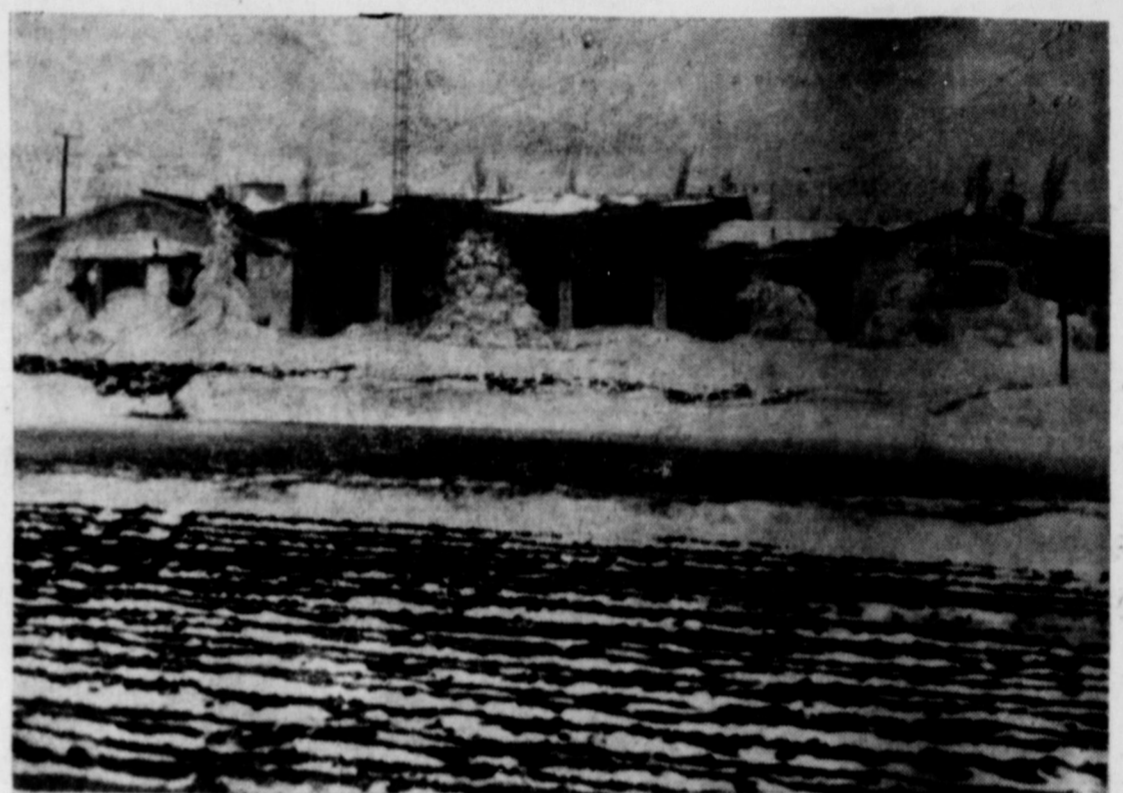
Mrs. Fennell instructed Dr. Faust to take another route where he would be met with men with tractors opening up the road.

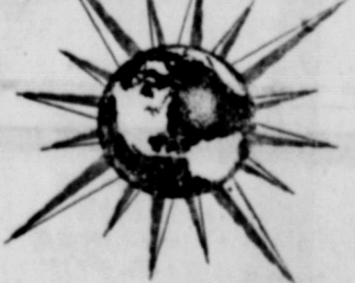
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Storm Didn't Bother Opening At Donald's Gulf Station Saturday

If You Lose Your Social Security Card, Get A Duplicate At Nearest Area Office

"Hold on to that social security card you used last summer. It's now more valuable than ever, because of the recent changes in the Social Security Act." This is the advice given to students by Mr. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock District Office of the Social Security Administration. Mr. Hutton explained that each individual should have only one social security account number and that if the card were lost, a duplicate should be applied for at the social security office. He said that

getting another original number, instead of a duplicate with the number of the lost card on it, would mean credits for social security benefits split between two accounts. This, in turn, could result in a reduction of Social Security payments at retirement, death or disablement.

Some of the main changes made in the social security law, Mr. Hutton said, were disability insurance payments for totally disabled workers at age 50, reduction of retirement age for women to 62, coverage for almost all self-employed professional men, except medical doctors, benefits for totally disabled dependant children over 18, and coverage for the uniformed services on the same basis as em-

ployees in commerce and industry. A representative from the Lubbock, Social Security Office will be in Earth on April 3 at 11:00 a.m. at the Post Office.

Program of Research Approved For High Plains Station of T. R. F.

The program of research for the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation was approved by the Regional Council for the Station at a meeting and tour of the station at Halfway, Saturday, March 16th. Twenty two members of the Council attended the sessions, representing twelve counties in the High Plains area. Also attending were representatives of newspapers, radio station, business men and farmers interested in the station. Sixteen projects are approved for the '57 research program. Some of which are contingent upon the completion of the budget and the employment of additional scientific staff.

Soil projects approved were fertilizer rates, time and methods of application to cotton, maize, soy-

beans, etc. All common sources of phosphate compared on cotton. Deep plowing vs chiseling on yields of cotton and maize. Irrigation, rate and time interval effects on yield of maize and cotton.

Cotton projects will include study and comparison of present and introduced crop varieties under best known cultural practices with emphasis on quality as well as yield. Crops included will be cotton, maize, tomatoes, corn, soybeans, sesame, sunflowers and castor beans. Wheat research will be included in the fall program.

Work underway at the 313 acre station at Halfway was observed by the Council on a brief tour conducted by Dr. Johnnie Davis, associate Head. The tour included the farm, the observance of equipment,

pole barn under construction and the new offices.

Appearing on the program of the meeting were: Harold Hinn, Chairman and host, R. V. Payne, Chairman of Big Gifts, Frank Moore, Area Chairman, H. M. LaFont, Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Grady Goodpasture, R. C. Peler, P. V. Patterson, and John Paetsold.

Mr. R. V. Payne announced that \$266,350.00 of the 5 year budget of \$550,000.00 had been subscribed by 692 farmers and firms of the High Plains area. Frank Moore, Area Chairman announced that campaigns were underway in several counties and in the planning stage for others.

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EDITORIAL

Research For The Farmer —

Research is at the heart of American industrial progress. Huge sums are spent on it each year, and marvelous fruits result. And the farm equipment industry, to the everlasting benefit of agriculture, has been one of the leaders in this field.

The president of one of the equipment companies reports in 1956, after allowing for change in the value of the dollar, his concern's spending for research was 2,470 per cent greater than at the start of World War I. Figures for the industry as a whole are not available, but this is believed to be indicative of the general trend.

Research, he went on to take several directions. It is used to produce developments the farmer says he wants or needs. It is used to find "what the farmer wants in farm equipment before he knows, himself, that he wants it." It is used to keep abreast of a rapidly changing market in the farm field itself—as exemplified by the fact that farms have declined in number even as they have increased in size. Finally another reason for expanded research is covered by one word, and that word is competition. As this executive put it, "The object is not only to make progress, but, whenever possible, to make it first before competitors."

Between 1940 and 1956 agriculture's investment in machinery jumped 360 per cent, measured in dollars of constant value. And the machines got better all the time.

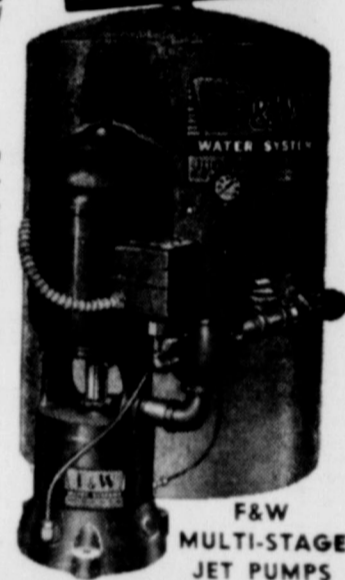

The bride attended school at Springlake and her husband is a Lubbock high school graduate.

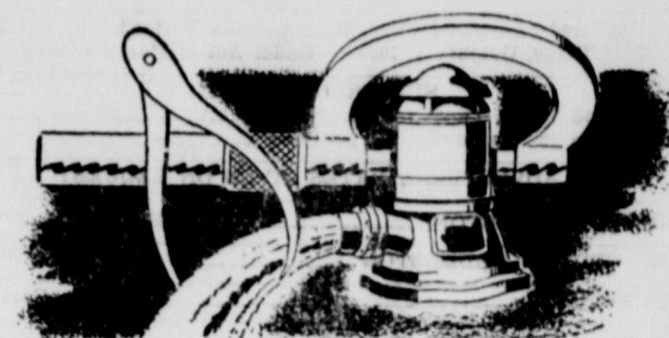
