Candidates Pay \$4,704 Filing Fees

Candidates filing in the May 2 Democratic primary in Lamb County paid a total of \$4,704.38 in filing fees to finance the election, according to a report from Glen Batson, Democratic chairman.
 The biggest income came from the county sheriff's race, in which four candidates paid \$2,050 for filing fees. Others, as constable were just \$10.
 The figure ran as much as \$512, 50 for each candidate for some county offices, as sheriff and tax assessor-collector. Generally the charges were one month's salary for the office sought, by each candidate.
 Costs of both Democratic party primaries, and two are almost certain this spring, will be paid by the County Democratic Organization, through Candidates fees.
 This includes hiring judges and election workers for 16 polling places in the county, supplying ballots and other supplies,

Final Tab On County Poll Tax Reaches 5,772

According to a report from Herbery Dunn, Lamb County Tax Assessor Collector a record total of 5,772 poll tax receipts were purchased by voters in the county.
 The record total was launched after residents made a last moment rush on the county courthouse and substations to claim their voting privilege.
 The old record for poll tax receipts was set in 1960 when, 5,508 voters purchased poll tax. Dunn reported that persons desiring to obtain a non paid poll tax receipt, may do so at his office through March 6, with no charge for the special receipt.
 The receipt will make voters eligible to vote in Federal elections only.
 This law effects only the five states that still have poll tax and Texas is one of them.
 Simply, the new law will let any voter take part in an election for Federal offices, such as President, Vice President, Congressman or U. S. Senator without paying a state poll tax.
 The amount of horse power required to move soil on United States farms each year would move a ridge of soil 100 feet high and a mile wide from New York to San Francisco, says the Ohio Agricultural Extension Service.

No Candidates On Ticket For City Election

 Approximately 10 entries will be entered in the show by the local FFA Chapter.
 Deadline for entries in the county show is Friday, Catalogues with rules and complete information have been distributed, according to Bill Kimbrough County Agent.
 Prize money, trophies and banners await top winners in the five divisions which include steer, seine, sheep, heifers and Shetland Ponies.
 The barns will be open on Feb. 20 to start taking stock and all animals are to be in place by 1 P. M., Feb. 21. Sifting will start at 1:50, Lamb and Shetland pony judging begins on the first day of the show.

Faculty Committee Review Text Books

The Springlake School Board met Monday night for their regular monthly meeting with James Busby, Guy F. Kelley, R. L. Sport Byers, Roger Haberer Leon Dent and Supt. Bill Mann present.
 Several items of business were on the agenda, which included the discussion and payments of school's utility and fuel bills, the past month.
 Supt. Bill Mann was authorized by the board members to offer a 1 year extension to the present contracts of principals John H. Lawrence, J. J. Davis and acting principal Cecil Slover, with Slover's being on a part time basis, due to the lack of a few college hours, which is required before he can accept a full time position as principal.
 New text books to be adopted next year were presented to the board by Mann for their review, this included a selection of Chemistry, geography and math. The group discussed math courses that are required for college entries. Guy F. Kelley, suggested that the school obtain enough of these required subjects to insure Springlake students the opportunity to graduate with a sufficient amount of these courses to enter college.
 A total of 15 local teachers have been appointed on the book committee to review text books adoptions for the next school term. Those on the committee include Mrs. Gladys McCord, Leonard Lane, Dean Foshee, Mrs. Opal Davis, Alvin Ray Lynn, Gladys McCaskill, John Lawrence, Mrs. Mary Alice Gaston, Miss Ann McMannigan, J. J. Davis, Cecil Lover, Mrs. Galdys Parish, Edwin Winn, Miss Margaret Womble and Supt. Mann.
 The group also discussed the amount of books lost annually, by students in school. Supt. Mann reported that 29 books were reported lost at the present time by students.
 A letter was read by Elementary Principal, J. J. Davis, in which he reported there were at present 600 pupils in grades 1-6 with 19 to 20 teachers. Davis also stated his opinion on P. E. periods saying girls and boys between the grades of 4 through 6 should be separated during P. E. He also reported that the Elementary faculty were doing an excellent job in teaching arithmetic and reading and all the other basic needs, with reading the most necessary subject.

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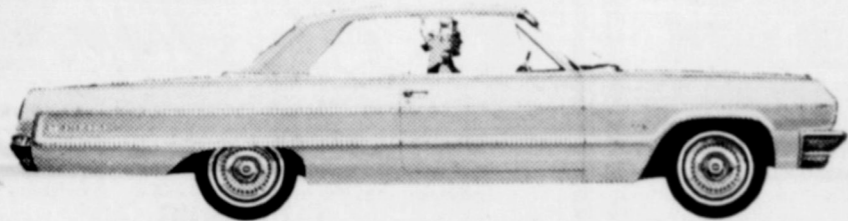
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Going Away Party Honors Tuffy Dents

other merchandise possible which is made of cotton and for all of us to use these natural fibers as much as possible.

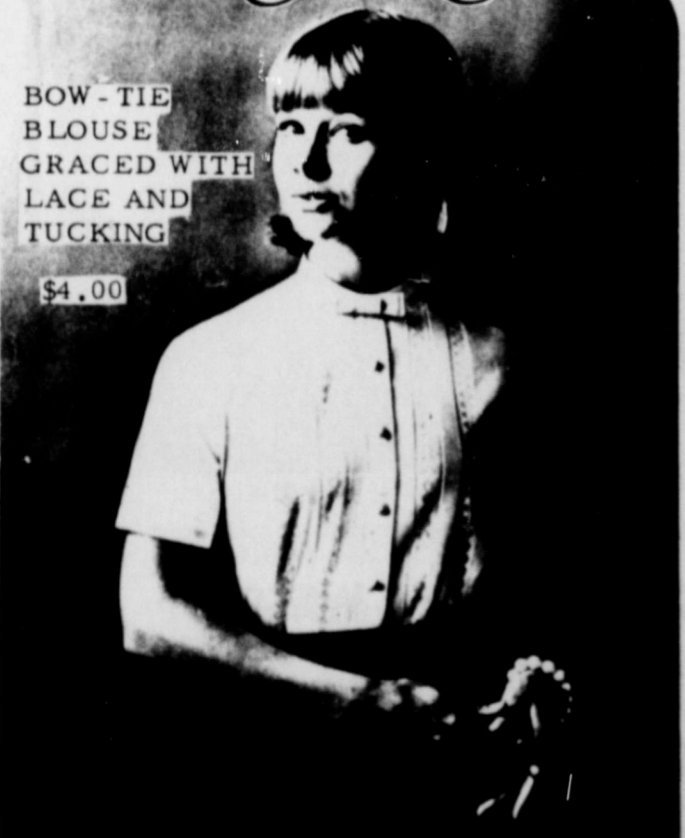
We are not against synthetics and know they have their place but feel it is suicidal to not recognize what could happen to our area if our natural fibers are replaced.

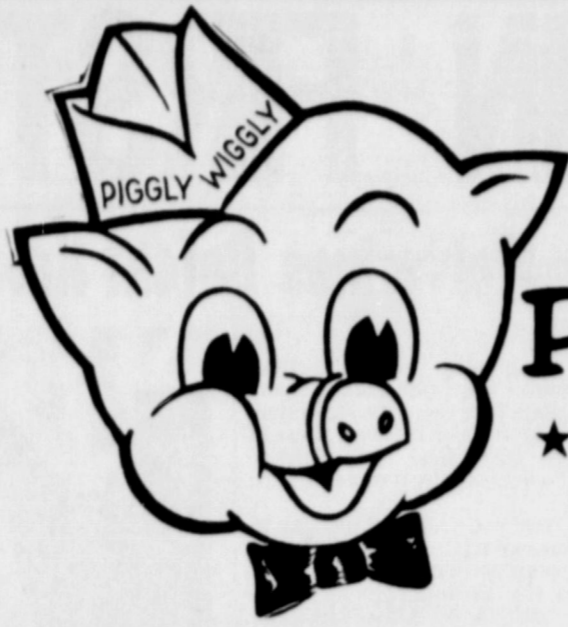

Continuing the uphill climb toward their first district championship in years, the Wolverines of Springlake defeated Kress in the first round of the District Tournament by a score of 67 to 51.

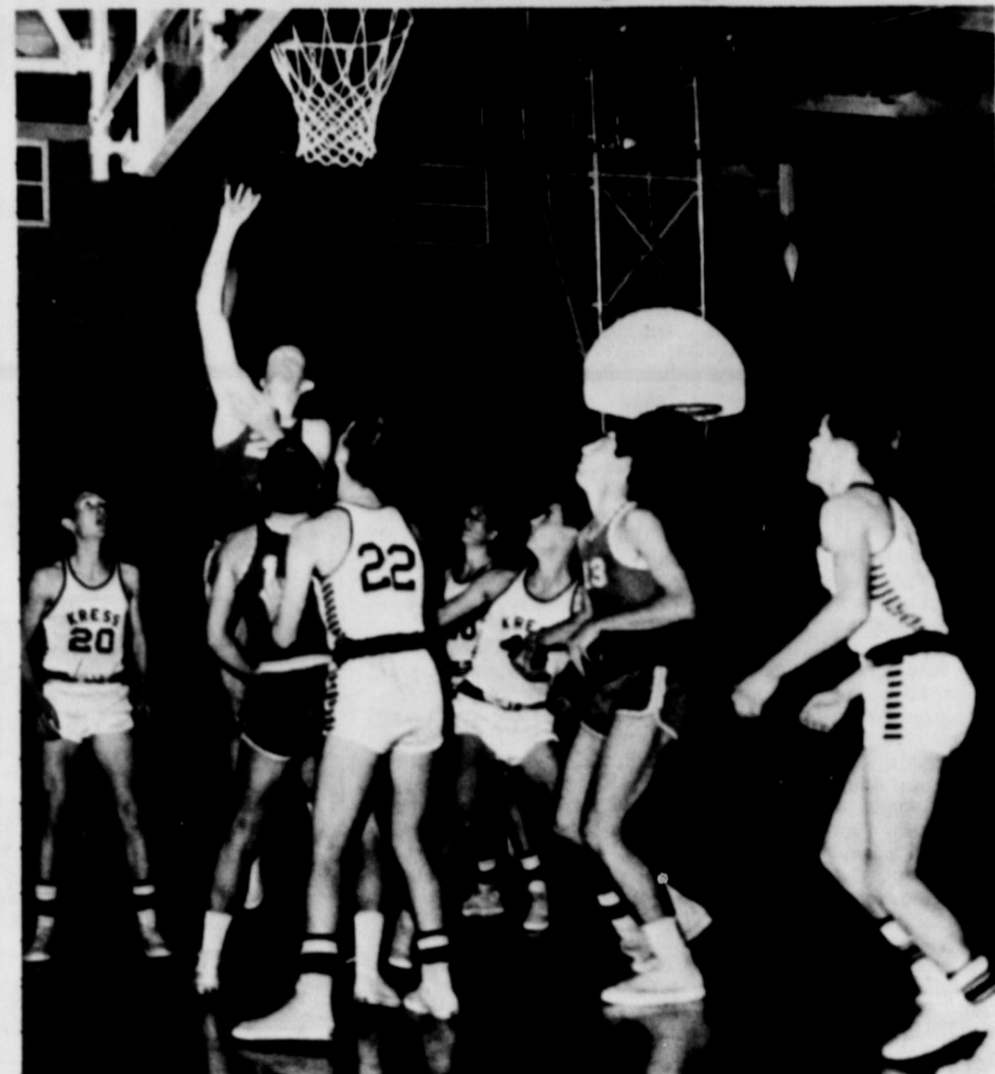
Rocky Cain paved the way to the one sided victory scoring 26 points and controlling his share of the rebounds.

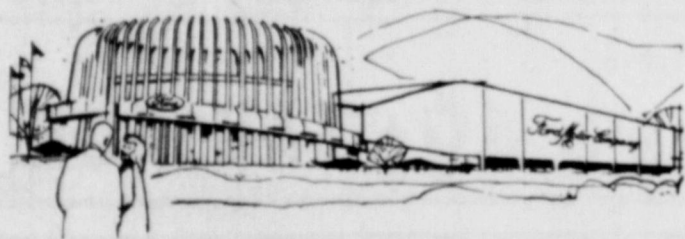

Rallying his forces, Coach Lynn took automobiles with Cecil Slover, Jodie Mahan and Mr. Rinker assisting. They were unable to get the Nazareth boys to Springlake on time, and Amherst moved toward the championship finals as Nazareth boys took the consolation path.

Friday night action saw the Springlake boys and girls playing their second game of the tournament with the girls pitted against Lazbuddie and the boys against Muleshoe. The girls came out on top in their game by a score of 37 to 24 and the boys won by a wide margin, 42 to 16. The wins gave the local teams automatic second place, with a chance to try for first.

Saturday at 9:00 P.M. the consolation games began with the Sudan girls beating the Muleshoe girls by a score of 20 to 14, giving the Sudan Hornets the consolation trophy.

In boys consolation, Farwell nosed out Sudan in a two minute overtime by a score of 34 to 30.

The championship games pitted the Springlake girls against the Farwell girls, with the local team coming out on top by a score of 28 to 25, but only after coming from behind several times during the course of the game.

The local boys team didn't fare quite as well as they lost to a good Amherst team by a score of 32 to 30, giving the locals second place in the tournament.

Donald Huff took scoring honors during the tournament for the local boys as he scored 31 points, average of 10 points per game. Excellent assistance and floor play for the Springlake boys was given by Mark Holt, Randy Washington, Floyd Weatherly and Gary Kelley.

For the girls, Susan Britton was far in the lead as she scored 51 points in the tournament for a 17 point per game average. Linda Gregory had a total of 21 points for a 7 point average and Pat

Bryant had 20 for a 6.9 average for the tournament. Doing a good job defensively for the local girls were Sharon Ward, Becky Parish, Linda Packard and Debra Parish.

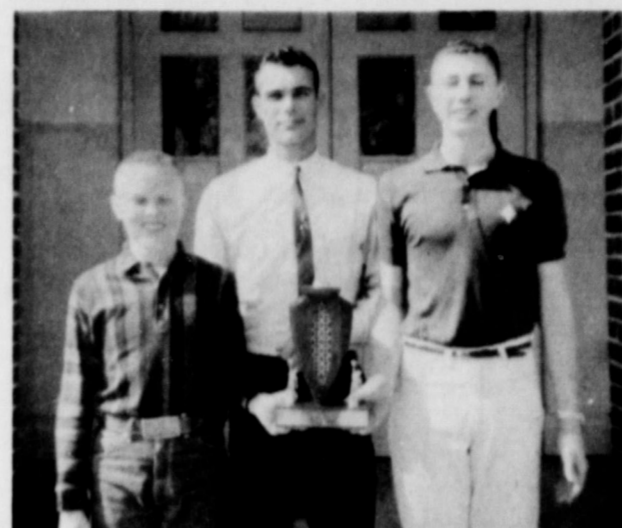

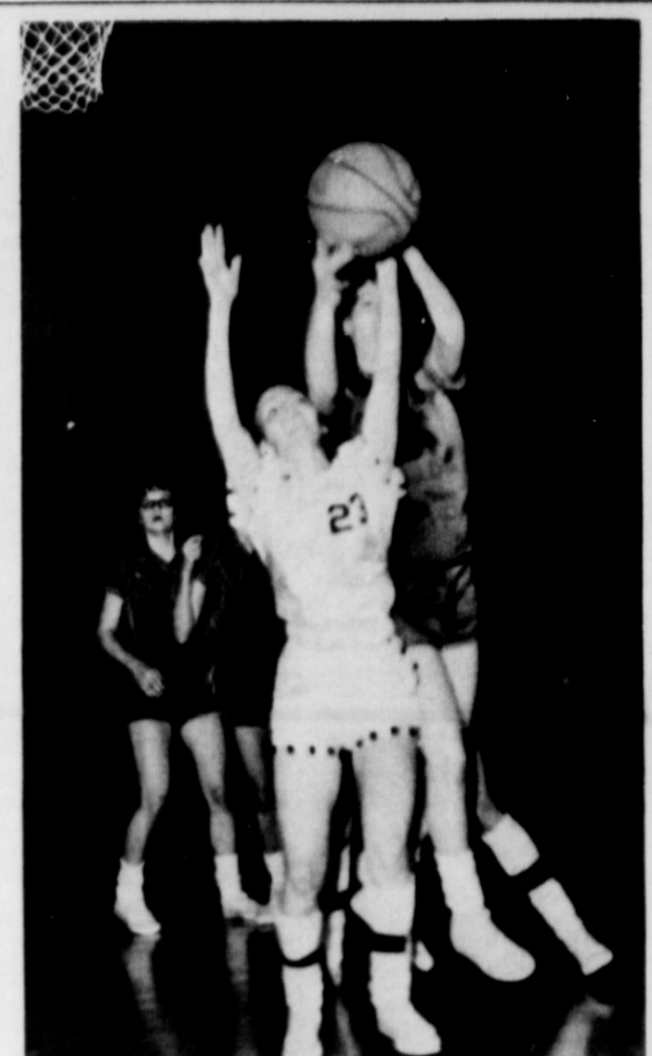

Conservation Cropping System

A conservation cropping system may be defined as growing crops in combination with needed cultural and management measures. Such a cropping system is necessary to meet the needs to the soil for improvement or maintenance of good physical condition and to protect the soil from erosion.

The necessary components of a good conservation cropping system are: Soil improving crops, high residue producing crops, crop rotation, the utilization of all crop residues, and emergency tillage if needed.

The intensity of the cropping system is dependent upon the soil type. For example a sandy soil or a shallow soil would require a more intensive treatment than a fine or medium textured soil because of their lower inherent fertility and higher susceptibility to erosion.

If a crop rotation cannot be used then the use of a cover crop such as rye or the use of a mulch such as cotton burs or barnyard manure when applied in proper amounts will replace high residue crops in a cropping system.

If you desire assistance in developing a conservation cropping system feel free to contact your Soil Conservation Service office.

Science Awards To Be Presented In April

Texas Chemical Council has invited more than 150 Texas high schools to participate this spring in its annual Science Award Program.

For the eighth consecutive year, TCC will award \$18 value slide rules to the outstanding senior science student at each participation school. The awards will be made during Chemical Progress Week, April 20-25.

TCC President Tom Anderson says the 1964 Science Award Program is a continuation of the Council's long-standing policy of giving small rewards and encouragement to high school students who show an aptitude for scientific careers.

In letters mailed last week, high school principals and science teachers were asked to select students for the awards, on a one-per-school basis. Scholarship, imagination, scientific interest, and course of study are some of the factors to be taken into consideration.

Local members of Texas Chemical Council will visit the schools to make the presentation of the slide rules.

Later this spring students who are nominated to receive slide rules will also be invited to participate in a Texas chemical Council essay contest.

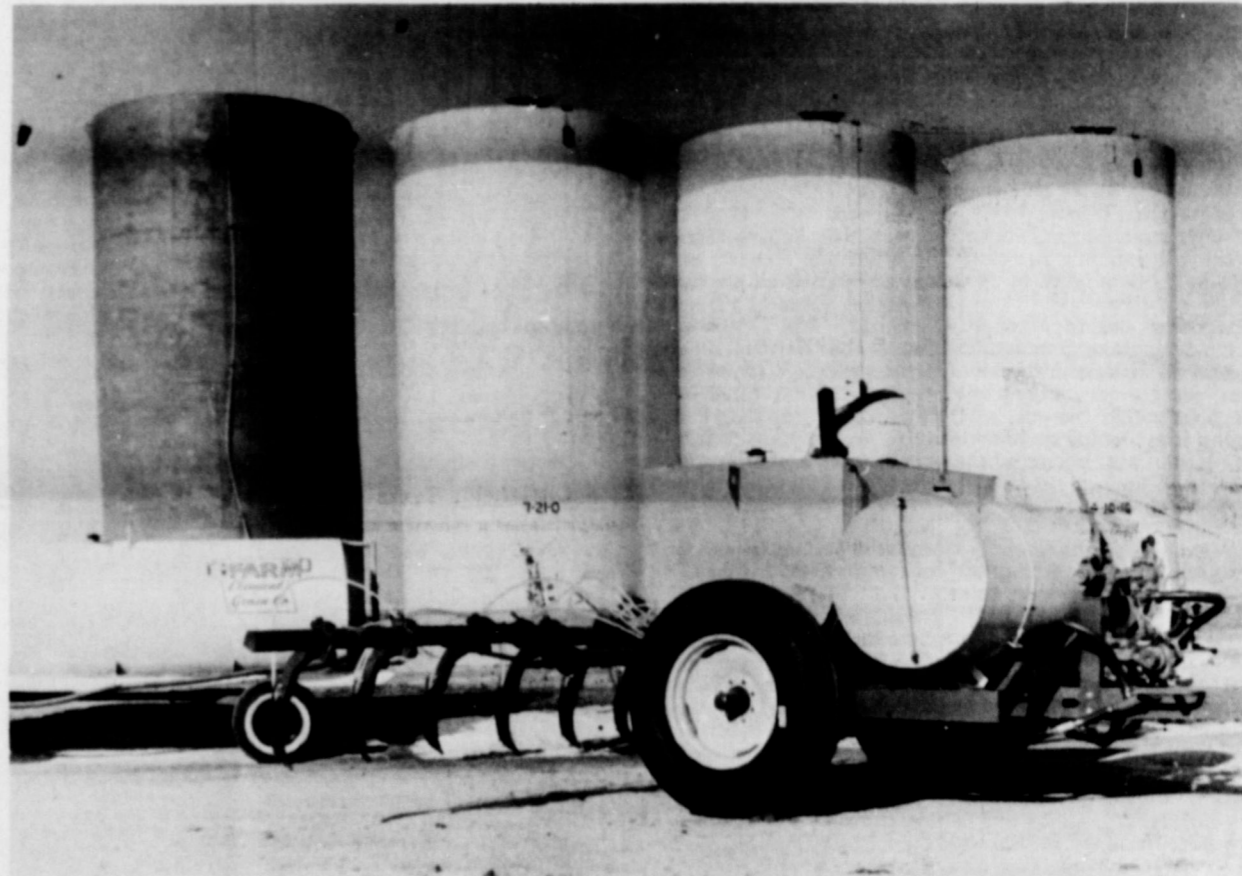

Son of Local Couple Candidate For Curry Sheriff

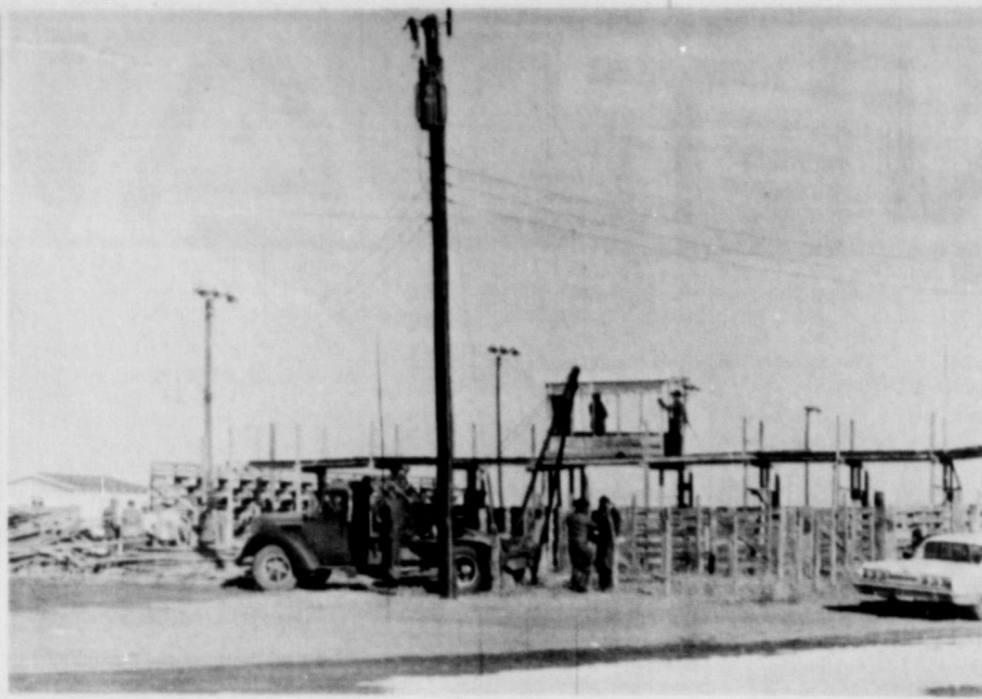

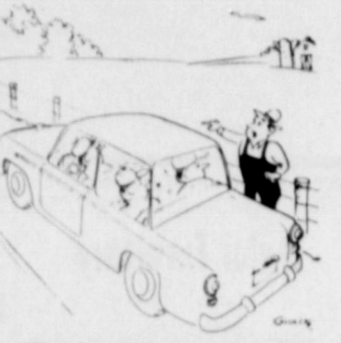

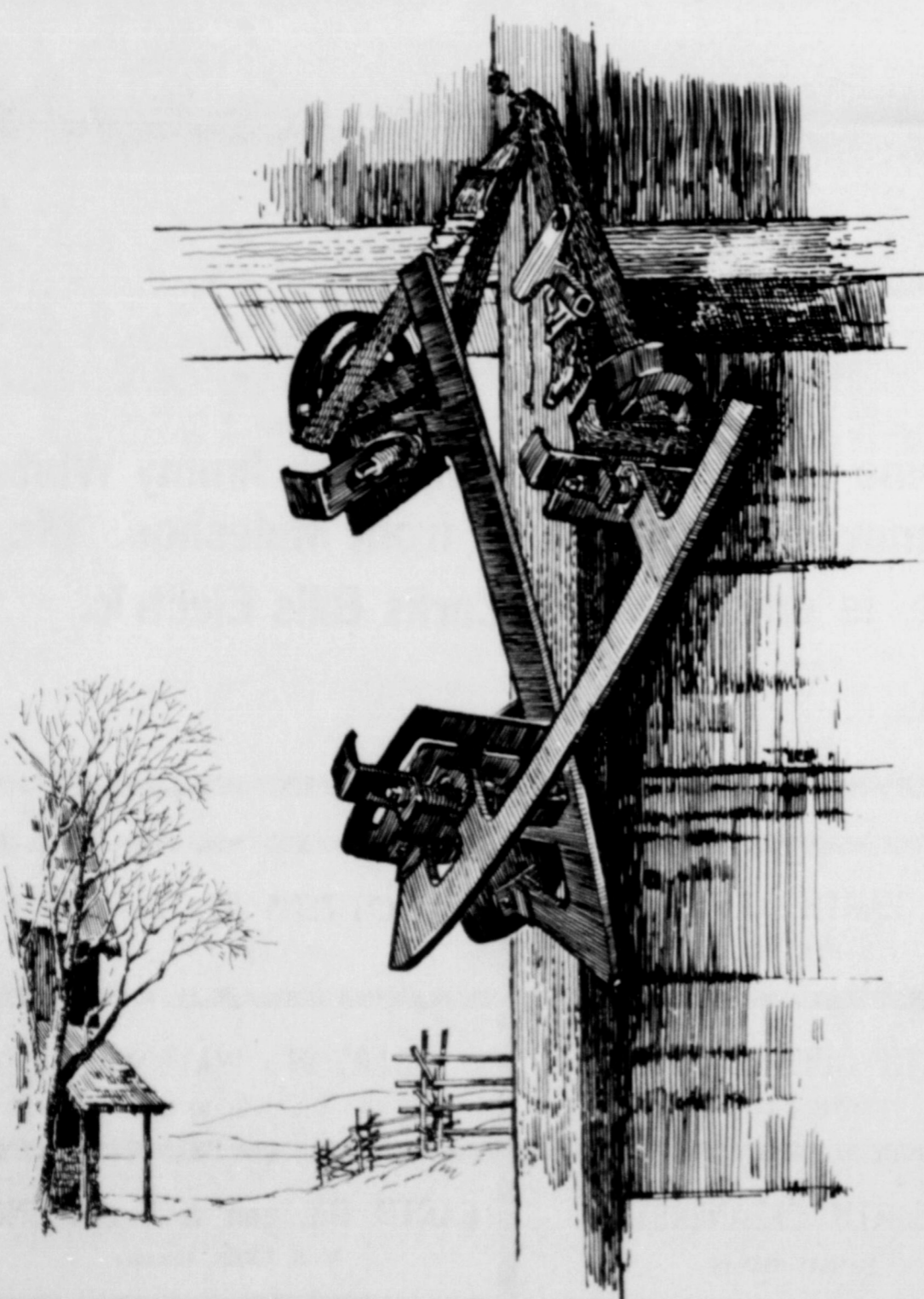
