Total of 24 Seniors Graduate Tuesday Night

"May you go far in life and May God bless you all the way" were the closing remarks of Dr. Roy McClung, as he spoke to the senior graduating class of Springlake High School, in commencement exercises, held in the school auditorium Tuesday night, before a capacity crowd. He used as his topic, "The Three Q's", defining the meaning of the three Q's, he said, the first was the IQ, which comes from heredity. This he explained, determines the capacity for learning. He pointed out that several of this class may have an IQ of 90 or perhaps 115, but may literally be using only 20% of their available ability. He described the second "Q" as being the RQ, commonly called the "relevance Q". This, he said, should cause each individual to figure how best to adapt himself and his life into the pattern of work in today's world to better use their IQ. The third and most important of the group is the "CQ", the

character Q. This, he voiced must be worked out on an individual basis. Each senior must decide what kind of a person he would like to be and mold his character accordingly. He said, the morals of this nation were deteriorating, but his hopes were that the youth of today could be so inspired to reach upward, and to see that the wonderful things our forefathers had established when they founded this nation not be destroyed, but to hold steadfastly to our freedom of worship, and cling to high and righteous morals, and molding themselves into a character pleasing to God. Rev. M. B. Baldwin, Earth First Baptist Church pastor, gave the invocation and the class song, "Moments to Remember" was sung by Mrs. Sharon Hamilton, accompanied by Mrs. Charlyne Riley at the piano. Hereford Man Confesses To Earth-Springleake Burglaries

Raymond Lee Henderson, 24, of Hereford, was arrested last Tuesday near Muleshoe, by Bailey County officers, after they were notified by a Muleshoe farmer, that Henderson was fooling around his irrigation well.

Before the officers arrived, Henderson had pulled away

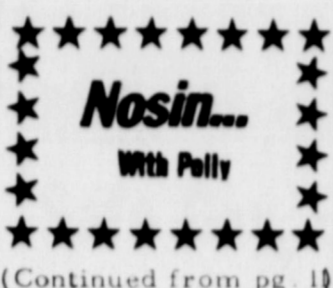

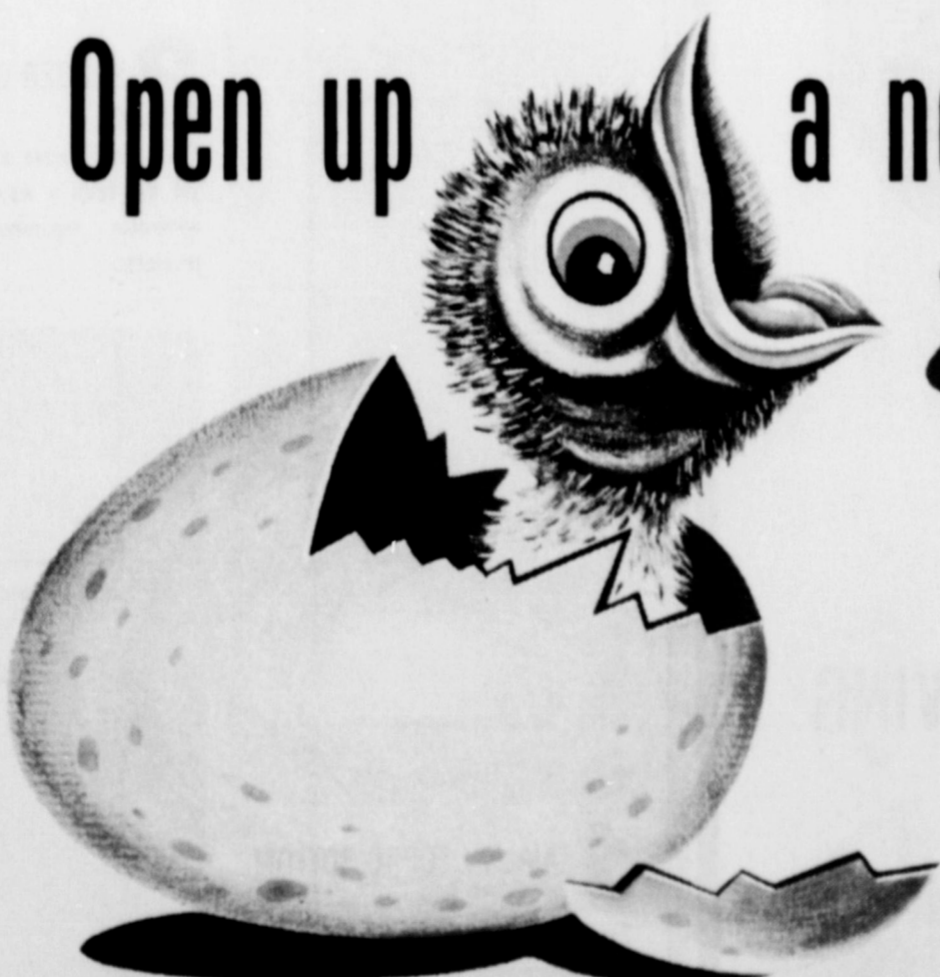

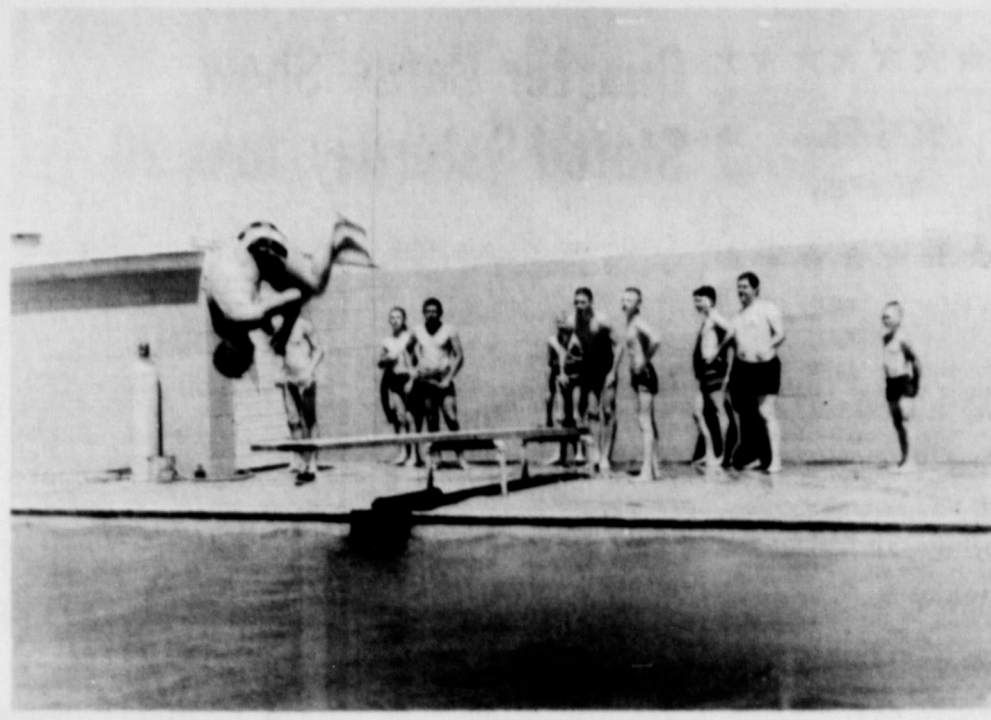

Increase Noted In Soil Samples and Fertilizer Usage

The number of Texas farmers and ranchmen using soil testing information as a guide for plant food usage continues to increase.

Figures released by Soil Chemist C. D. Welch, Texas Agricultural Extension Service for the January - April 1964 period, showed a 46 percent jump in the number of soil samples tested over the same period a year ago. During the first three months of 1964, a 30 percent increase, Welch said, was reported by the Feed and Fertilizer Control Service for fertilizer sales. This plant food included the combined total for mixed fertilizers, materials, special fertilizers and others.

Welch noted that the soil testing laboratory at Seymour posted a whopping 255 percent increase in the number of soil samples analyzed for Rolling Plains producers. The number of samples tested increased from 904 in 1963 to 2,308 in 1964.

The laboratory at Lubbock showed an increase of 42 percent or a jump from 4,674 samples tested for the first four months of 1963 to 6,660 for the same period of 1964.

The College Station laboratory, while showing a smaller percent increase than the other testing facilities, handled 8,233 soil samples compared with 6,259 for the same period last year, an increase of 31%.

Welch said the interest in soil fertility and fertilization throughout Texas is reflected both in the number of soil samples tested and the total tons of fertilizer sold.

The three soil laboratories are operated by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

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Dropout Percentage Highest in Grades 9-10

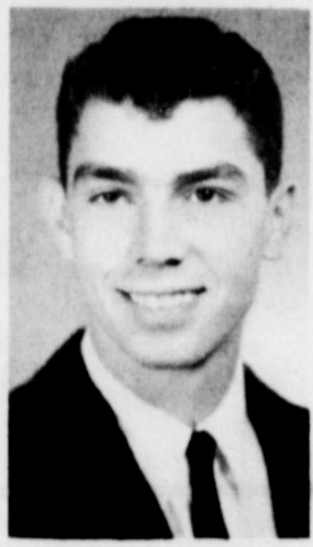
Sixty four percent of all school dropouts occur in grades 9 and 10, says Patsy Reynolds, Extension Service family life education specialist at Texas A&M University.

Another 34 percent of school dropouts take place in grades 11 and 12, she says. This is the age when young people want to be free of authority and earn their own support.

Dropouts aren't necessarily less intelligent than their schoolmates. Many factors enter into their leaving school. A major one is parents who place little value on education.

"The dropout usually doesn't achieve in the classroom, is irregular in attendance, gets along poorly with his teacher, resents school authority, and may be two years behind his age group in the classroom.

What happens when the dropout looks for a job? The unemployment rate for those 16 to 19 years of age is 24 percent compared to 10% for all age groups. When he surveys his friends who did graduate, he finds that nearly twice as many in his age bracket had jobs in 1962.

Memorial Day, a holiday on which we pay our respects to those gallant men and women who have given their lives in the service of their country, has become a day of mourning for many persons not connected with the military services.

No one will argue the fact that war is one of the worst calamities to befall mankind. During the history of our coun-

try it has become necessary on several occasions to defend the freedoms we cherish. At times such as these many persons find it within themselves to become heroes in the fullest sense. We look upon a death in the defense of our country as a thing of honor and dignity. How much less honorable or dignified is a death in a traffic accident.

The most useless, senseless loss of life possible results from these tragedies which we have come to accept as a part of our way of life.

In recent years, since the advent of the automobile, we have found ourselves involved in the needless slaughter of our fellow citizens at a rate not equaled in history. We have had the automobile approximately sixty years and in that short space of time have already killed more Americans than have been killed in every war ever fought by our country since 1775.

This holiday which we observe at the beginning of our summer vacation should be filled with only pleasant memories but instead we use the excuse of a few days out of the office or off the job to fill our newspaper headlines with tales of blood and horror.

Over the nation last year with a one day holiday falling in the middle of the week there were 109 lives lost due to traffic accidents. In Texas there were seven deaths on this one holiday. These seven people represent a loss to all of us. Any one of them might have been a person who would one day have been able to render us a priceless service.

Most of us do not know any of these people but in each of them a part of us died. Their families will suffer for years the pangs of pain that results from their passing in such a manner.

We could quote endless statistics from publications from every safety organization in the country. In the book, "Motor Vehicle Traffic Accidents" published by the Department of Public Safety alone are 44 pages of figures telling the story of bloodshed and damage that we write every year.

In the final accounting, however, it comes down to the responsibility of each driver to keep this one fact in mind. The safety of every user of the highways is only assured to the extent of the most unsafe driver on those highways.

If only the dangerous drivers were killed in traffic accidents the problem would soon right itself, but we find that in a great number of accidents it is the innocent driver, passenger or pedestrian who suffers.

Make this holiday a safe sane and sensible one for you and your family. Keep Memorial Day a day of respectability instead of infamy.

Suppose you had \$25,000 to invest... where would you turn for advice? You have two choices-- an amateur or a professional advisor.

The same goes for your health, whether you realize it or not. Good health, the experts say, is worth a \$25,000 price tag.

Where will you turn for advice about your health investment -- your neighbor, a health quack or a physician? Undoubtedly, your neighbor is both interested and concerned about your health and welfare.

Stop listening right there. Only your doctor can diagnose your case, or Mrs. Jones's. Different diseases may have similar symptoms.

Whatever the source, always question a cure--all or sure-fire remedy. Carrot juice will not cure varicose veins or gout. Yeast flakes will not rehabilitate weary and worn out body cells.

Above all, beware the health quack. This self-designated health authority is a fake. He is intensely interested in you, not in your welfare, but your money.

The old-time medicine show pitchman has given way to a much more suave and impressive scientific operator. Today the bogus health expert usually dribbles impressive scientific language into his spoken and written come-ons.

The quack may be selling copper bracelets to cure arthritis or a serum to cure cancer. The cancer quack imposes a two-fold problem. Not only is he wasting the money of the hopeful patient, but he is wasting time and time, spent on a false cancer cure, may cost the person his life.

Pay no attention to oral promises or a friend's advice about health products or devices. Read the product's label before you buy. False claims on labels are subject to prosecution; they therefore tend to be much more subdued than unpoliceable sales talk.

In any case, remember, your good health is worth \$25,000. Be wise, use only your physician's advice on your investment.

Grain Sorghum Freighters Reduce To The West Coast

Grain sorghum rail freight rates from the High Plains to the West Coast for export are to be lowered from the current level of 80 cents per hundred down to 55 cents per hundred. Provisions for the new rate were authorized by the Executive Committee of the Trans-Continental Freight Bureau meeting in Chicago this month.

JITTERBUG DIETS

Texas teen-agers, with a record amount of allowance money to spend, are the most undernourished age group in the state, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White revealed recently.

White blamed "jitterbug diets" of hot dogs, soft drinks and candy bars as the big robbers of proper nutrition. "With a plentiful supply of the best food available, recent studies show the age group from 13 to 18 has the worst eating habits of any," Commissioner White said.

It is a sad paradox that we produce a tremendous amount of beef in Texas, yet fully 10 percent of our teenagers are deficient in protein, the important food element in meat," said Commissioner White.

Elbert Harp, farmer-president of GSPA said that work such as this on freight rates by the Association is part of the overall research, market development and service programs for grain sorghum by farmers themselves to better their position. Such work has pushed sorghum exports from a mere 22,000 million bushels annually in 1956 to over 112 million bushels now and resulted in stronger cash prices to area farmers.

GRAIN SORGHUM

Bill Nelson, Executive Vice President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, commended the individual railroads for this action through their Bureau. Nelson said the old 80¢ per hundred rate had been prohibitive to West Coast movements of grain sorghum for export even though users in Japan--the world's largest cash buyer for U.S. sorghum, had been interested in West Coast ports are 20 days closer to Japan than Gulf ports and ocean freight saving average \$4 per ton.

He said that the combination of savings in ocean freight and reduced rail rates will now make it possible for Japan and other Far East grain buyers to have a choice as to point of delivery of area grain sorghum. He also added that in times of stress such as the recent Panama incident, the new rate may make a difference as to whether the foreign buyers have access to grain at all or not.

According to Nelson, the Grain Sorghum Producers Association had requested a 54¢ rate on a one-year trial basis with 130,000 pound cars minimum. He said that oversized car requirement will not be a serious problem if the railroads will step up efforts to make such equipment available which has up to now been in short supply.

White said a number of schools have removed vending machines from the property in recent months.

CHILDREN IN CAMP

It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or a camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. But the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parents' consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid--but only for emergency treatment where a child's health or life may be at stake.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Children cannot do this. By going to your doctor you show your willingness and consent to accept his treatment. Your consent is assumed also when you ask for a house call by the doctor, or if as a result of an accident you come to a hospital for emergency treatment.

Minors cannot consent to medical treatment, and except in dire emergencies their parents or guardians must give it for them.

The consent should not be broadly or loosely phrased, but should be as specific as circumstances permit.

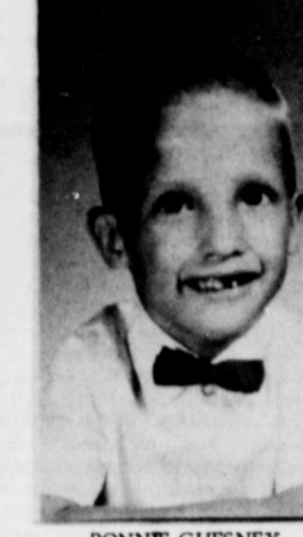
