Soil Samples Should Be Submitted Now

A new crop year is dawning and farmers are busy planning for the new season. Foremost in these plans should be soil testing.

"Now is a good time for far-mers to collect and submit soil samples for fertility level tests, reminds Jim Valentine, Extension area soil chemist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock. Valentine, who leads up the soil testing laboratory at the center, points out that soil sam-ples presently can be processed and reports returned to the farmer within one week after re-

ceipt.
"In planning a program of fertilizer use, two factors are of
utmost importance," explains
the soilchemist, "These are the
present fertility level of the soil and the desired or expected

A soil test is the best way to determine the soil's present fertility level, points out Valentine. Such a test shows the levels of major plant nutrients that are present and suggests the amount of these nutrients needed to produce the farmer's desired yeild in line with his water and general management practices.

Valentine reminds producers that the necessary information sheets and cartons for submitting soil samples are available at all county Extension offices. The information provided should be as complete as possible and should be sent with the soil samples to the Soil Testing Labor-atory, South Plains Research and Extension Center, Lubbock,

The \$2 investment in a soil analysis could well be your most profitable expenditure for the 1968 crop, "believes Valentine.
