Austin Wilson of Austin pre_ sented figures to the review com. mittee showing that while Lamb County is being restricted to 52.8 per cent of its planting in the last non-quota year (1953) many coun_ ties in the state have quotas more than 100 per cent of the amount they were planting when they were not restricted.

Due to West Texas farmers heavy planting in 1951, 52 and 53 were largely responsible for the fact that Texas acreage was re_ duced by only 2.67 per cent this in the absence of Mr. Irvin. year, while nationwide the reduc. tion was 4 per cent. This was told to the committee by Henry Marsh_ all statistician for the State ASC Committee.




A large part of the reports will
