She found them advertised in the Lubbock paper for \$34.95 before going to Lubbock she looked at Rutherford's and bought the exact shoes for \$26.95. Earth is a better place to trade than most people realize. The overhead of Earth merchants is not nearly so high as in many large cities therefore they can undersell larger cities in many instances.

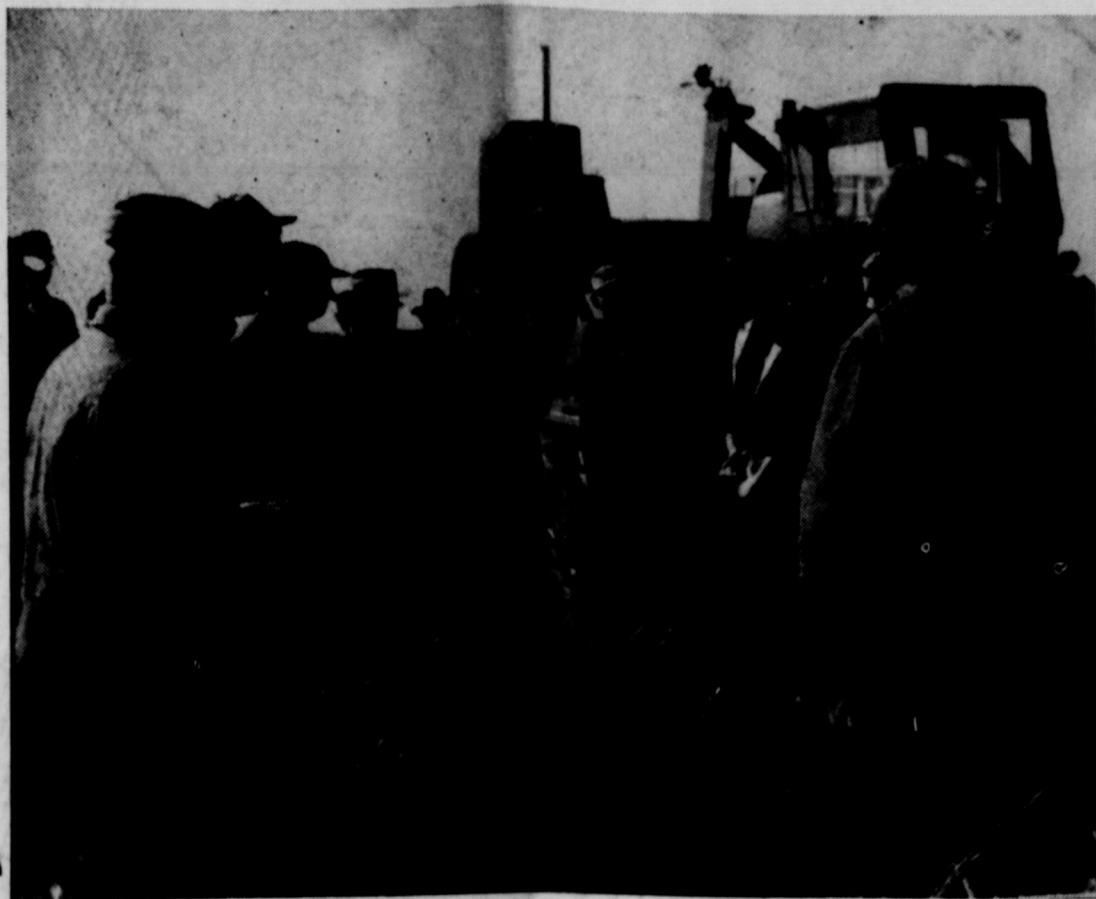
Housewives Bowling League Contributes To Educational Fund

Mr. Griffith's suggestion for raising funds was accepted by the housewives league and they have already started the educational fund.

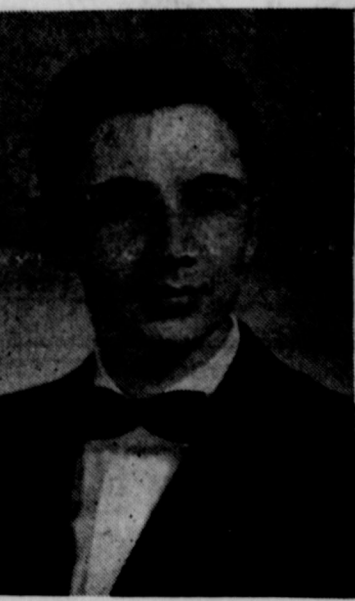

Lamb County Pledges 31% Of Goal In LCC Fund Campaign

LUBBOCK, (Special) — Lamb County has pledged 31 per cent of its goal in the \$2,077,000 fund-raising campaign being conducted by Lubbock Christian College.

In percentage, Lamb County ranks 10th among the 115 participating Counties in Texas and New Mexico. Lamb County has pledged \$29,006.91 and its goal is \$64,200.

Buddy Hedges of Olton is county chairman while local chairmen are J. C. Franks of Amherst, Perry Martin of Earth, Joe Mack Bush of Fieldton, Joe Fisher of Friendship, Dan Staggs of Littlefield, Don Williams of Olton, Gaither Vandaveer of Spade, Alton Hollingsworth of Springlake and Weaver Barnett of Sudan.

In the overall drive, \$228,171 has been pledged over a two-year period and \$75,966 is in actual cash. The school needs \$300,000 to buy 229 additional acres for expansion and that is needed by January 31. Originally, the option was due December 31, but the school was given a month's extension.

Golden Acres Field Day Tour Made Tuesday

A Field Day was held Tuesday, January 3rd, by Earth Elevator Company at the Oliver and Gene Tunnell farm northwest of Earth, showing the standability of the Golden Acres TE66 Hybrid Grain Sorghum.

Oliver and Gene Tunnell planted this Field of Golden Acres TE66 on the 14th of June 1960. It was pre-fertilized with 70 lbs. Nitrogen per acre and was watered twice. A part of the crop was harvested in the fall and the field yielded almost 6000 lbs. of milo per acre. Eight rows were left until January 3rd 1961 to see if it would still be standing at the time of the Field Day despite the exceedingly high winds, snow and freezing weather.

There were about 60 people present for the Field Day.

"Doc" Potts, President of Taylor-Evans Seed Company was present, also Bob Vail, Sales Manager, and Doug Cochran district Salesman of Taylor-Evans, also "Cotton John" of KGNC Radio all from Amarillo.

Out of State visitors were Mr. Black, from St. Vrain, N. M. and Mr. Snyder of Clovis, Both farmers in the Texas and New Mexico Area.

Several ladies were present, Mrs. Bonnie Haber, Mrs. Clarence Hamilton, Mrs. Truman Lowe and Mrs. Oliver Tunnell.

Lunch was served by the Springlake FFA boys to raise money for their Show Barn. Coffee was served by the Earth Elevator.

Bill Rhue, Photographer from Amarillo, arrived late but was still able to take some pictures of last or First Milo to be cut in our area.

A Film was shown about the advance made in Grain Sorghum. Also the Milo crop in the Coastal Bin area after a 30 inch rainfall that flooded the fields. TE55 and TE66 were the only Hybrids to have 95 per cent standability afterwards.

The demonstration that was seen Tuesday left little doubt in the Grain Growers mind as to the standability and size of head on the Golden Acres TE66. The Grain Growers were also pleased with the average height of this variety. It averages between 36 and 38 inches in height.

Gruber came to the United States in 1937 and graduated from Southwestern Seminary in 1940.

He served as pastor of the Latvian Baptist Church, in New York City, for six years.

Since 1945 he has been Musician-Evangelist, averaging thirty revivals a year.

He became a citizen of the United States in 1948 and the same year married Vivian Doris Mercer, College professor in Spanish and French.

Dr. Feezor served as president of the Board of Trustees at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky., in 1954-55; President of the Baptist General Convention of Texas in 1951-52-53, Vice President of Southern Baptist Convention in 1951-52.

He is a former member of Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention; Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention; Board of Trustees, Baylor University, Waco; Board of Trustees, Hillcrest Memorial Hospital; Board of Trustees, Meredith College, Raleigh, North Carolina.

Dr. Feezor has also served as Executive Secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas since September 1, 1953.

Dr. Feezor married the former Jessica Ray Fuller. The Feezors have two daughters, Ann Joy and Forrestine.

Science Department Receives Unusual Sea Fish

Monday, January 2, 1961, the Springlake Science Department received an unusual sea fish which is rarely heard of in this vicinity. This unusual fish, the Stinger Ray, was discovered by Ross Morris while fishing off a pier at Port Arkansas, Texas, Thursday, December 29, 1960. Ross was given the Stinger Ray by a fisherman that had just caught the fish and was detaching its barbed sting.

The Stinger Ray was six inches in width and nine inches in length. The stinger, which was eight inches long, was flexible with two sharp spines on the back of the tail near the middle. There were teeth along the edges with poisonous glands at the base.

This sea fish is a menace to bathers along the coast. A bather wading in the shallow water may accidentally step on the fish and receive a painful and sometimes dangerous sting from its barbed tail.

1959 Census Of Agriculture Show Fewer Farms

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Lamb County last fall, counted 1,636 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Total land in farms was 637,481 acres. The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$96,521.

Of the county's farm operators, 496 owned their farms, 419 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 720 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 44.9 years. There were 98 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 1,636 farms in the county, 1,609 were commercial farms.

In the 1954, the census shows, Lamb County had 1787 farms. However the average size of each farm increased from 368.9 in 1954 to 389.7 in 1959.

Fifteen farms went off the rolls during the five-year period due to what the census calls "change in definition."

The fact that the small farm lost territory during the five-year period is reflected in the break down of the number of farms by various acreages. For example the census shows that the number of farms containing 1,000 to 1,999 acres increased from 32 to 43 during the five-year period while at the other end of the bracket, farms containing less than 10 acres decreased from 75 to 57 and the 10-49 acre farms slipped from 102 to 96.

Farm Facts

Although you may own no more land than the fraction of an acre on which your home is located, you are enjoying the output of several acres. In fact, each of us each year receives the production of 7.4 acres.

Each of us annually receives the total output of 7.4 acres.

Food production, directly or indirectly, accounts for a large part of this total. An estimated \$75 million acres in the United States are used for grazing.

It is estimated that crops were planted on about 337 million acres in 1960. These ranged in variety from avocados to cranberries and from mint to artichokes.

Much of the acreage however, was used to produce feed for livestock and poultry. Corn was grown on 84 million acres, hay on about 70 million, and oats, barley, and sorghum grains on another 60 million.

The food grains—wheat, rice, and buckwheat—used about 52 million acres, soybeans about 24 million, and cotton about 16 million. Vegetables, nuts, and fruits are



among other products listed in the acreage for crops. Privately owned commercial forest lands in the United States total almost 360 million acres, producing trees for lumber, paper, and a wide variety of uses.

Springlake Rural Telephone Service Delayed 60 To 90 Days

Rural telephone applicants in the Springlake rural area originally scheduled for connection to telephone service in December will experience a delay of 60 to 90 days, according to R. E. Saunders, District Manager for General Telephone Co. of the Southwest. "As a result of the ice storm which hit eastern New Mexico early in December, our Company experienced extensive damages to telephone lines in the Hobbs, Lovington, Tatum area", Saunders stated.

Saunders indicated that some 400 poles were toppled in the wake of the ice and snow storm in the Hobbs area alone. Lovington and Tatum were isolated from long distance service making it necessary for the company to remove all available construction crew

personnel into that area to restore service.

The emergency crews included personnel from the Littlefield plant area, thus creating a work stoppage on construction of lines which will provide service to the rural residents of Springlake.

Letter of explanation have been mailed to those applicants affected by the delay in construction, Saunders pointed out.

"We sincerely regret the delay and appreciate the patience and considerations of those involved," Saunders added.

"Construction on the pole lines will commence at the earliest possible date, following restoration of telephone service to those areas in New Mexico crippled by the ice storm", he said.

Although the courthouse was closed for the New Year's holiday, the building was opened long enough for the ceremony to take place. Under the laws, the new officials must be sworn in on the first Monday of the new year.

Henry Lewis was sworn in as County Commissioner, Precinct 2 for the unexpired term, succeeding Mrs. Gladys M. Goodwin, Earth, who did not seek re-election. Three candidates had sought that post in last summer's primaries.

L. A. Glasscock, Earth, was sworn in for Justice of the peace, precinct 2. Glasscock was unopposed and J. L. Drake, constable for precinct 4 was also unopposed when P. B. Dillard, the incumbent did not seek re-election.

J. L. (Roy) Yeager became commissioner of precinct 3, succeeding Bill Jeffries of Littlefield. He was

winner in a race last summer which saw four seekers, including the incumbent.

A new district attorney was sworn in but that ceremony took place in Bailey County. Jack Young of Bailey County will become district attorney for the 154th judicial district.

In Lamb County, Curtis R. Wilkinson, again took the oath as county attorney. Dick Dyer was sworn in again as sheriff and Lindsey D. Williams, another incumbent took his oath as county surveyor and Herbert Dunn as county tax assessor-collector.

All other county office holders are hold-overs and 1959 was an "off year" for those offices. These include the county clerk, district clerk, county judge and county treasurer.

A. J. Spain, Olton, becomes county commissioner for Precinct No. 1, succeeding R. D. Bryant, also of Olton, who did not seek re-election. Spain beat out three others in the primary elections to win the post.
