

A curious and potentially controversial feature of research on che therapeutic agents for cancer is that agents capable of controlling cancerous growth will probably be able to control other types of growth as well. This is likely because anti-cancer agents generally act by blocking cell division. In so doing, they attack mechanisms that must common to most dividing cells. •

Cell division is ordinarily a rather uncommon event in the hu-man body. There are, however, at least three important exceptions to this rule. These are the life-long production of red cells and other formed elements of the blood in the bone marrow, the formation of sperm, and the rapid proliferation

of cells in the fetus.

The deleterious effect of cancer chemotherapeutic agents on the formation of red cells and other cellular constituents of the blood is already well known; it is one of the major problems of practical cancer chemotherapy. The effect on sperm formation and on the fetus not so well known.

Several years ago University of California investigators adminis-tered aminopterin, an antagonist to the B vitamin folic acid employed in the treatment of leukemia, to gestating rats. The object was to deplete the animals of folic acid and determine whether folic acid deficiencies might have a part in the origin of congenital anomalies. Many of the fetuses showed severe anomalies but some had disappeared altogether; they

had died and been resorbed. Recently, Drs. Harold Jackson



and Marion Bock of Christie Hos pital (Manchester, England) found that triethyl melamine, a nitrogen mustard used in treating leukemia, retinal blastoma and other tumors, induces sterility of at least several weeks' duration in male rats. The effect is on sperm still in the process of development rather than mature sperm

Of course, present cancer chemo therapeutic agents are entirely too potent to be used for any but their intended purpose. But future re-search may well turn up growthcontrolling agents quite capable of other applications

Along with allied conditions, in one way or another, the disease has afflicted more than 10 million people in the U.S. and completely crippled some 200,000 others. The secretary, housewife and young mother are most susceptible. Arthritis is insidious. Its symptoms at first are usually mild. Gradually they worsen, until one day you wake with an arm or leg that is completely useless.

What causes arthritis? Scientists have not yet found an answer.

Nor have they yet found a com-

They do have available a num-ber of chemicals to control the symptoms of rheumatoid arthritis in many patients. These drugs, ad-ministered by the physician, can lift the hopelessly crippled ar-thritic victim out of the wheel-

chair and back into normal life.

Among the medicines which have proven effective in some patients are aspiriu, gold compounds,

However, these drugs are not fully effective and the hormones, in particular, sometimes create un-pleasant side effects in some pa-tients and thus force their aban-

donment. Recently, a new synthetic hor-mone called Sterane has been placed in the hands of physicians. Sterane appears to be far more potent than cortisone or hydrocor-

potent than cortisone or hydrocor-tisone and offers promise of reduc-ing the side effects noted with the other hormones. With advancing research and rehabilitation, many arthritic pa-tients will be given a new lease on life.





As everyone certainly knows, morphine is one of the oldest druthe pharmacopeia; its parent substance, opium, was well and faw known to the most ancient physicians. Morphine continues nevert to yield interesting discoveries. The latest is that morphine it thing for chills, and also has value as an antipyretic.

The author of these observations is Dr. Walter E. Marchand of the Bedford, Massachusetts, Veterans
Hospital. In a recent paper, Dr.
Marchand relates that fourteen
years ago he gave morphine for
relief of pain to a woman suffering
severe abdominal pain and a shaksevere abdominal pain and a shak-ing chill following an operation. In thanking him afterward, the patient remarked that the chill had been worse than the pain and that she was particularly glad he had been able to stop the chill. A few days later, he gave morphine to a patient in pain and suffering a chill from a buttock abscess. She also remarked upon the quick ending of the chill.

In the years since, Dr. Marchand has given morphine to 86 patients to halt chills. The 86 included 27 tattle casualties, 3 patients with severe burns, 14 suffering transfusion reactions, 9 with soft-tissue infections, 3 with pneumonia and

3 with reactions to typhoid vac-cine. The drug never failed.

Among those to whom the Bos-ton physician administered mor-phine for chills were, also, several patients undergoing malaria treatment for central nervous system syphilis (general .paresis). morphine not only halted their chills, but promptly brought their



fever down. Subsequent trials showed morphine to be highly effective as an emergency treatment when fever threatens to get out

Dr. Marchand decided to report on his experiences with morphine when a check turned up a strange fact. In all the immense literature on morphine and other derivatives of opium, there is not one reference to morphine's unique action against chills (no other drug is so swift or efficacious); and there is only passing mention of its potency as an agent against fever. At this late date, new properties were still to be found in "God's own medi-

For apart from lack of normal growth, children struck by it show no readily discernible signs of nutritional deficiency. Often the only clue to give it away is lasting loss of appetize. Yet once it spots a nutritional deficiency like "simple growth failure," medical science can quickly put it to rout. Studies by Dr. Norman C. Wetzel, a pioneer in growth and development research, indicate that dietary supplements, particularly vitamin B-12, not only help to stimulate

plements, particularly vitamin B-12, not only help to stimulate growth but can consequently help to improve a child's scholastic work, behavior and attitude as

Dr. Gino Frontali, professor of pediatries at the University of Rome, has also conducted a series of exhaustive tests on the growth potential of vitamin B-12. During potential of vitamin B-12. During two separate seven-month periods, he administered 20 micrograms of the vitamin to selected groups of children in two different schools. At the end of the test period, all of them gained appreciably more weight than control classmates who didn't get the supplement.

From these and other studies, scientists have learned that B-12 does more than help piece out what otherwise might be an inadequate diet. By stimulating the appetite, it can also help turn a finicky eater into a trencherman of at least average ambition.

Thus, medical specialists of the J. B. Roerig Co. recently devised, especially for children, a combination of B-complex vitamins, vitamin C and the amino acid lysine. Called Stimsvite, the tablets are designed to perk up appetite, stimdesigned to perk up appetite, stim-ulate growth and help put as end to mealtime malingering.





Approximately one-fifth of this amount goes directly into the milk; the remainder goes into the digesting process and for body conditioning. Feed lot steers and calves require twelve gallons a day for top gains.

ere are 58 million cars on the road in this country, and by 1965, it is expected that this figure will increase to 81 million. All these cars, bumper to bumper, would reach around the

cars, numper to bumper, would reach around the equator tent times, or stretch to the moon.

Automobiles may well evolve into three types, say the experts. One type may be the luxurious highway cruiser for safe, intercity transportation. The second, for general, around-town driving, will combine maximum passenger space and maneuverability in a small package. (In line with the idea of a small vehicle, don't overlook the open air scooter. It seats two, uses a minimum of gasoline, folds and unfolds in a minute, and can be stored in your larger car trunk, boat, plane, or under the desk—if you're a commuter.) The third type will be the "sports" cas, to help you recapture the thrill of driving for pure pleasure. It's excellent for your "Shun-piking" trips. Plastic-body cars are already on the road, but someday, the entire car may be made of plastic, including a completely transparent scenic dome.

A highway modernization program is in progress and it envisions a 40,000 mile national system of intercity highways. This could mean coast to coast without a traffic light in a few years! Plans for the completion of the Pan-American highway are underway, so that drive from "Bometown U.S.A." to South America may someday be a reality.





#### by Science Features

We humans rely on a complex array of 500 muscles of various sizes for the physical power we have over our environment. Yet, we commonly become aware of this wonderful system of locomo-tics wells when our muscles

this wonderful system of locometion only when our muscles "act up."—when they remind us through pain or spasm that something has gone wrong.

A spasm is any sudden, involuntary contraction of a muscle. Twitching, cramps or other types of muscle spasm may be brought on by a variety of causes. Sudden chilling of the body after swimming may result in severe spasm of several of the body's muscles. Sharply diminished circulation of the blood to any part of the body brings about spasms in the bloodthe blood to any part of the body brings about spasms in the blood-starved area. Chemical imbalance is also a common cause of spasm; for example, recent research indicates that the painful leg-cramps of pregnancy are due to abnormally low levels of calcium in the blood of expectant mothers. The so-called night cramps—sleep-disturbing spasms of leg muscles—are also believed to be related to calcium metabolism.

Bacterial toxins can send the body's musculature into violent

bacterial toxins can send the body's musculature into violent contractions; the most notorious of these is the voison secreted by the germ of tetanus or lock-jaw. In addition, many ailments of the nervous and skeletal systems are accompanied by muscular spasms.

In many of these chrenic condi-tions, including arthritis, bursi-tis, paraplegia and low back pain, a new treatment known as cy-clotherapy is proving beneficial. Doctors have found that cyclo-therapy, a unique form of elec-trically generated physical entherapy, a unique form of elec-trically generated physical en-ergy, has scored striking results in easing spasms and relieving the pain of patients suffering from a variety of ailments that affect the muscles, and helping them toward rehabilitation.

The physician also has a variety of other physical and chemical agents at his disposal to quiet disturbed muscles. Heat, in various forms, has been used since time immemorial to "iron out the kinks" in painful muscles, and it kinks" in painful muscles, and it is still a valuable means of therapy. Many drugs, including anesthetics, barbiturates, counter-irritants and the recently de-veloped "tranquilizing drugs" have their place in the spasmighting armamentarium.

In some cases, muscle spasm is not primarily the result of dis-ease, but is related to over-use of a particular set of muscles. In these conditions, such as the so-called "occupational cramps" or "athlete's cramps," modern meth-ods of treatment including cyclotherapy have proven effective in restoring free motion to the affected parts.

**Tips on Touring** 

By Carol Lane

Everyone bopes he can avoid an accident, but not all are that fortunate. If you become involved, you'll find these tips worth remembering.

REMAIN at the scene of the accident. It's illegal—and immoral—to leave.

RENDER assistance or obtain medical help if needed. Be very careful with injured people; confine your aid to keeping them warm and controlling bleeding, unless you have completed a standard first aid course.

GATHER the facts. Ask the other driver involved in the accident for his name, address, license number, registration, car make and insurance company Get the names and addresses of all occupants of the other car. Make a diagram of the accident showing car positions and directions cars were traveling.

CALL the police. In all but very minor accidents, call the city police or highway patrol. The officer will take charge and fill out an accident report. It's a good idea not to discuss the accident with anyone but the police and your insurance company.




