Farm record keeping, parliamentary procedure, Civil Defense against radiation, basic woodwork and tools, breeds of livestock, selection of livestock, producing livestock, varieties of crops, crop and weed seed identification, crop production, control of noxious weeds, soil conservation, pruning trees, and internal combustion engines.

Vocational Agriculture II — Electricity, nutrition of livestock feeds and nutritional requirements (feeds and feeding), control of common insects and chemicals used, welding - acetylene; welding electric arc, tractor maintenance, soils and fertilizers, and pipe fitting.

Vocational Agriculture II — Farm credit instruments, advanced welding, farm law, marketing farm products, farm government organizations, farmer's income tax, landscaping the farm home, cold metal work, hot metal work, irrigation, advanced crop production, and advanced livestock production, genetics.

In addition to the above curriculum for Vo-Ag courses, Federal law requires boys taking Vo-Ag to carry, in connection with his classroom and shopwork, a supervised farming program (projects). They do not spell out what a boy must carry. A boy in town could not carry as much as a farm boy would be expected to carry. An example of projects to be used are: (At least 1 per boy)

Rabbits for meat, chicks for fryers, hens for eggs, pigs for pork, wheat for grain, cows for calf production, cotton for lint, milo for grain, alfalfa for hay, gardens for vegetable (provided they are for selling), sows for pigs, lambs for mutton and etc.

Boys DO NOT have to have projects for show. Their Vo-Ag grades will be based on the kind of job they do with the project that is authorized. Many of our boys show animals. We believe it has

a vital part in our total Vo-Ag program. However, this is left up to the boy and his parents. Approximately one fourth of our Vo-Ag students never have projects for show purposes.

Projects serve several purposes—

Increase interest, increase responsibility, learn by doing, practical record keeping, make profits.

Vocational Agriculture is so broad, I cannot give adequate coverage of all things taught, with the details I would like, in this article. There is much more a boy gets than the subject matter from his Vo-Ag courses.

If you should have need for further information concerning the program, please call on me anytime. Feel free to drop by and plan a program for your son, or attend any of our classes or shopwork periods.

I hope I have given you enough help here for you to evaluate more clearly whether or not your son should enroll in a Vocational Agriculture class this fall.

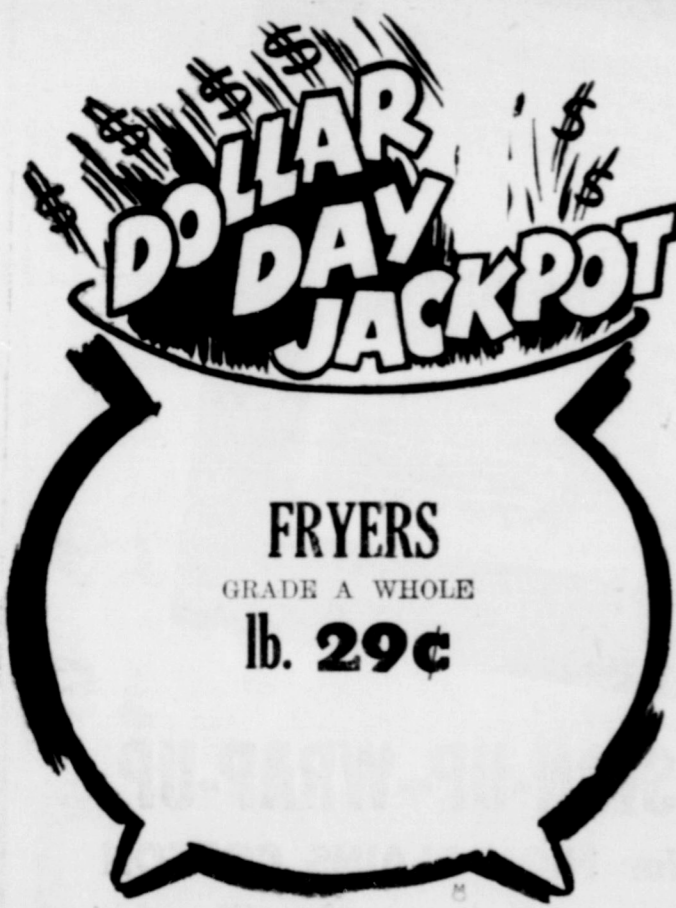

Annual Boys Ranch Rodeo Set For September 2-3 At Old Tascosa

A new rodeo arena and a record number of contestants is expected to attract the largest number of people ever to visit Cal Farley's Boys Ranch when the 300 boys now living there put on their 18th annual Boys Ranch Rodeo, September 2nd and 3rd, the Labor Day weekend.

A total of 265 boys have registered as contestants in the nationally-famous event that has become a Boys Ranch tradition. Although all of the boys who make their home at the Ranch will participate in some phase of the rodeo, only the best riders will be riding the professional rodeo animals that have been taken to the Ranch for the occasion. Boys, from 5 to 17, will be competing for honors and prizes by riding calves, steers, bronama bulls and bucking brones.

To prepare for the crowds, the boys have been helping with the construction of the new and larger rodeo arena, located in the midst of shady cottonwood trees, south of the Ranch picnic grounds. New chutes and corrals have been con-

structed to assure a fast-moving rodeo and bleachers have been elevated to provide an excellent view of the action for all the spectators.

The boys will be competing in two divisions, according to ages, and will ride under R. C. A. rules. Clowns and trick riders will provide the color and excitement along with other special feature attractions.
