I am sure this question arises ach year with many parents. It is the aim of this article to explain more to the parents what Vocational Agriculture consists of and benefits of the program to the boy. We too often take it for granted that the people of our community know what is taught various courses of the school. I am inclined to believe that the image of the Vo-Ag pro gram may be distorted because there are certain aspects of our program, due to its competitive nature, which receive more publicity.

This is not the total Vo-Ag program. Only a minor, but nevertheless important part. Our livestock show and contest competition is entirely extra-curricular, but an important teaching aid which helps enrich the student's learning experience.

I believe there must be a broader knowledge of the Vo-Ag program before a parent, or a stud-ent, can accurately make his decision to enroll or not. He should determine whether it will benefit him in his pursuit of happiness and the all important basic function of schools, prepare a boy for life and making of a living.






A total of 265 boys have registered as contestants in the nationally-famous event that has become a Boys Ranch tradition. Although
