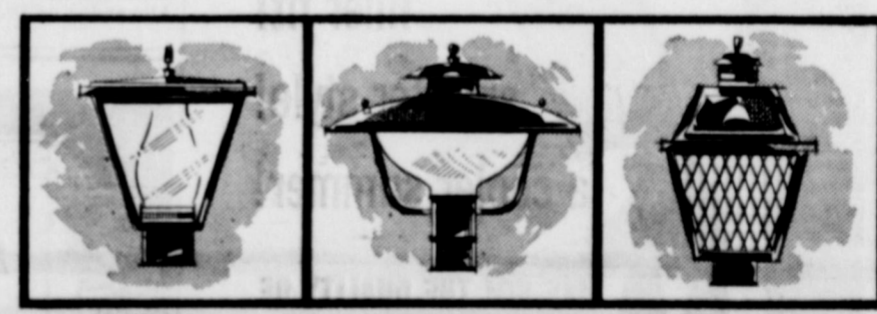

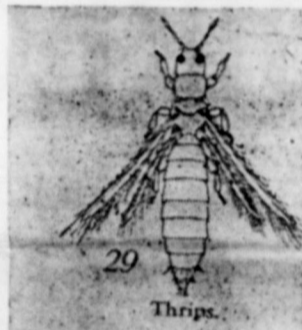

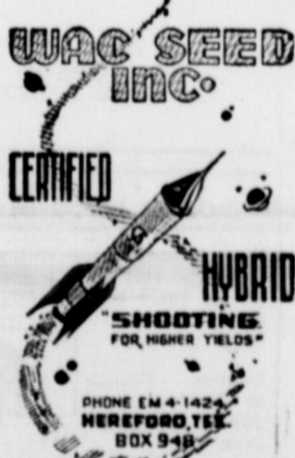

County Red Cross Report For 1960

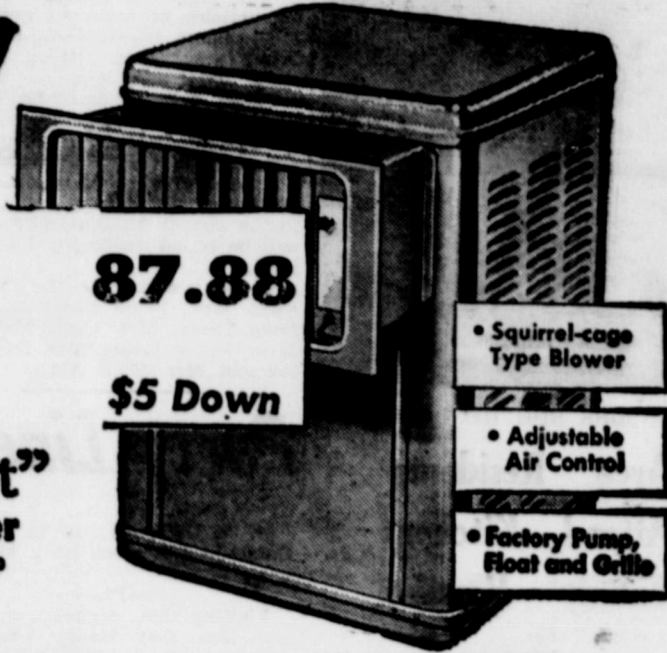

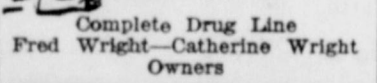

Tour Of Foreign Lands

By Rev. M. B. Baldwin

We left Lubbock April 3, 1961 at 1:15 a.m. We stopped for a few minutes in Dallas and from there we went to New York City. We were there for two days and saw several places of great interest. We were able to visit the NBC building and see just how they produce most of their TV programs.

We left New York by British Overseas Airways Corporation, Flight 540A for the Trans Atlantic Flight to Europe. We were to land in Glasgow, Scotland, but because of a freak storm we had to go to London and wait there for seven hours before flying back to Prestwick Airport at Glasgow. There we were met by the director of the Scotland Evangelistic Crusade and each of us were taken to the church in which we were to be engaged in evangelistic services for eight days. I was sent to the city of Girvin. We had twenty professions of faith in the services in which I participated. I feel that the Lord richly blessed all who took part in the services. We were able to see a good part of Scotland. One of the most interesting visits was made to Edinburgh, Scotland where we visited several places of great interest.

We left Glasgow, Scotland by B. O. A. C. to London where we spent two days. This also was a very interesting place. We were honored in the House of Parliament with a Tea given by one of the members of Parliament, Sir Cyril Black. The Bell Tower was just one of the interesting spots that we saw in London. Leaving London we went to Zurich, Switzerland, the most beautiful country at this time of year that a person could wish to visit. There we visited the Baptist Seminary, the most beautiful Seminary of all the Baptist work.

From Zurich we went to Rome, Italy. Time and space prohibits telling all of the places of great interest that we saw, but one that was of special interest to me was our Southern Baptist work. We have about 4,550 members in about 60 Baptist Churches in all Italy, with about 50 organized groups growing toward booming churches soon. Through the influence of this work there were about 200 baptisms last year. We also visited several places in Italy that are significant in Bible history. From Italy we went to Athens, Greece, where we visited many other points of interest significant in Bible history. We stood on Mars Hill where we had to let our mind think of the words of Paul in his day.

We then visited old Corinth and again listened to the words of the Bible concerning this great Bible city. In Cairo, Egypt we visited the Pyramids and the Sphinx and traveled through the Land of Goshen and the Nile River area. Leaving Egypt we went to Beirut, Lebanon, a great city on the coast of the Mediterranean Sea. From Beirut we drove through the fashionable summer resorts of Aley, Bhamdoun and Sofar to Danel of the fertile plain of Bekaa and the Anti-Lebanon chain of mountains. Then we continued to Baalbeck, known as the City of Sun, which started in the first century B. C. took nearly 200 years to build. We visited the Temples dedicated to Venus, Bacchus and Jupiter, the Constantine Arch, the Citadel and the Mosque. We saw the unfinished Obelisk in the Quarries. Then we proceeded to Damascus to view the street called Straight, visited the Sultan Soliman Mosque, Pauls Window, the house of Ananias and the new part of the city.

Leaving Damascus we proceeded to our Baptist Hospital near Amman and to Jerash, Jordan, the most completely intact Roman

We then went from Amman to the Dead Sea, and from the Ancient city of Jericho and to the Jordan River some place near where Jesus was baptized. In the city of Jericho we visited the wall that was bitter and Jesus turned the water sweet. In the ancient city of Jerusalem we visited most of the important places of interest, then continued to the city of Bethlehem. From Bethlehem we used a full day visiting the cities of Nablus and Samaria, Jacob's Well and many other places of great significance. Leaving Jerusalem (Jordan) through the Mandelbatum Gate into Jerusalem (Israel) we visited the Eternal City beginning with Mount Zion, then the most ancient quarters of Jerusalem, embracing the Coenaculum (room of the last supper), King David's Tomb and the Church of Dormition. We drove through orthodox Mea Shearim and the picturesque Bukharian quarter, then to Mount Herzl and beautiful Tel Aviv and the Baptist work there. We then continued to Caesarea to see the remains of that ancient port, and along the Carmel range to Haifa and Mount Carmel. From Haifa we went to Nazareth, Tiberias, Capernaum, Tabgha, and Kafir Cana and Natanya.

This was one of the greatest inspirational experiences of my life, to see the place spoken of in the Bible and to stand near the Sea of Galilee near where Jesus had walked and had chosen His disciples, and the places from which He gave a good part of His instruction to His apostles. I was able to make about 700 slides of this tour plus about 500 feet of 8mm film that I would be glad to show to any group at any time that may fit into our schedule.
