New Industry For Area Originated At Earth Elevator

A new industry was begun in this area recently when an idea was born and put into action to help farmers increase their profits from grain sorghums, along with providing the farmer a sure supplement to their

farm income
This new industry, Self-Feeding Cattle, was formed at the Earth Elevator, a firm who is eager to keep abreast in every phase of progress in the West

Texas area.

This new feeding industry provides farmers, who have a small plot of land with available water supply and approximately 20 minutes a day to spend seeing that the cattle have an ample water supply to derive a nice profit from their investment in cattle. The Self-Feeding program

will do the rest. Mr. Bob Bell has been named feed manager of this new industry. Mr. Bell said the formula given the 771 head of cattle they are feeding at the present time, has had five years of research by the Purina Research farm at St. Louis. This research farm has experimented with several types of formulas and after much deliberation and months of feeding and experiment, found this formula used by the Earth Elevator to be the most workable and beneficial formula for

feeding beef cattle.
Mr. Blackwell, manager of the Earth Elevator said farmers! could get into this cattle industry feeding business with very little investment and use only a small plot of land. He went on to say, "We furnish and in-stall all feeders, plus servic-ing the feeders, therefore leaving very little for the stockman to over-see. He stated that they give advice and re-commend cautions to be taken

in cattle sanitation.

One new bulk delivery truck is now in operation and another should be forthcoming by the first of March.


At the present time, the self-feeding headquarters can service about 3,000 head and with the arrival of the second unit, the feeding capacity will be increased tremendously.

With this equipment and a desire to see farmers almost double their profits by feeding their own grain rather than putting it in storage, it was only natural to add this new industry to the many services rendered to the grain growers of this area.

Linda, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Houston Oden, has been a member of the Springlake FHA for four years and is a member of the National Honor Society. She is the president of the newly-formed FTA and also a member of the Pep Squad.

Having scored first in her school in the knowledge and attitude test on homemaking given senior girls December 4, the winner's paper has been entered in competition with those of other state high school winners for state-wide honors.

Evelyn Meadows, former Springlake student and daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Cecil Meadows of Grand Prairie won this same honor at Grand Prair ie High School,

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named in the spring. She will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, sponsor of the program. A \$500 award will be made to the second highest ranking Homemaker of Tomorrow in the state. The school of each state winner will receive a set of Encyclopaedia Britan-

Later, State Homemakers of Tomorrow with their advisors will enjoy an expense-paid ed-ucational tour of New York Washington, D.C. and Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia, which will culminate with the naming of the 1963 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The national winner's scholarship will be raised to \$5,000 with second, third and fourth place winners being granted \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000

County Farmers Urged To Apply Now for Crop Insurance

Lamb county farmers who haven't already done so are eligible now to apply for in-surance on their 1963 crops of cotton and grain sorghums, ac-cording to Joe L. Matthews, district director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corp., an agency of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture.

Matthews said that already more than 400 Lamb county farmers carry FCIC protection on either cotton or grain sorghums or both, and that they are receiving nearly \$15,000 in loss-payment on 1962 crop damages.

"Cotton coverages are higher, and the program generally is improved over any before." Matthews said. "Representatives are visiting farms in this county now and will continue for several weeks, and information also is available from

No such insurance is available elsewhere, Matthews said.

"With today's normal profits down to about 20%, a farmer's high investment (the other 80%) is vitally important, and it takes him five years to recover from a crop failure," the FCIC official explained. "More and more farmers are turning to Crop Insurance to protect this important investment dollar.







PCG Plans Tour Georgia Textitle Mills

The Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., has announced plans for another textile mill tour by cotton growers, ginners and other interested persons of the High Plains area. The tour this year will be to the mills in the Augusta, Georgia area. George W. Pffeiffenberger, PCG Executive Vice President,

said the tour is scheduled for February 26-28 and will cost approximately \$150 per person. Wives are invited to accompany their husbands.

The PCG will sponsor the tour in cooperation with the American Textile Manufacturers Institutes, Arrangements will be made for a chartered airplane that will seat approx-

imately 50 people.
"This tour will help in better understanding the utilization of cotton", Pfeiffenberger said. "We think area farmers, gin-ners and others will come back from the tour with a better picture of the overall cotton situation and of cotton's competitive position in the textile

industry."
The tour last year was to the P. H. Hanes Knitting Company in Winston-Salem, N. C. and Fieldcrest Mills in Spray, N. C. It was considered a complete success. Mr. F. M. Jack, Carlisle ginner, said after return-ing: "I think we can more readily understand now how cotton can price itself out of the market if price relationships with synthetics get too far out of line."

Leroy Durham, Plainview farmer, remarked as the group was returning from Winston-Salem, last year: "Any cotton growers who takes advantage of an opportunity like this to tour textile mills will never be sorry. This has been one of the most enlightening tours that anybody who deals in cotton

could make."

Ronald Weaver, Petersburg ginner and another participant in last years trip, stated:"This tour should make us want to produce and gin better quality otton on the South Plains, More quality improvements would mean that mills would buy increasing amounts of our cotton."

Pfeiffenberger said that this year's tour will afford an opportunity to meet many users and potential users of High Plains cotton, It could generate more interest in area cotton on

One mill to be visited will be the Graniteville Company's plant near Augusta, Mr. J.B. Kyser, an official of the mill, reported on a visit of ATMI officials to Lubbock and the High Plains last year, that the firm buys about 100,000 bales



Texans Warned Of Savings Bond Chain Letters

Savings Bonds Director, J. L. Adams, cautioned Texans about becoming involved in chain letters or similar

He stated that the Treasury Department disapproves of the use of Savings Bonds and Savin lotteries or games of chance involving the element of personal profit. "This has been a policy of long standing," he pointed out. The Treasury has no objection, however, to the use of Savings Bonds and Stamps in contests of knowledge or skill, such as quiz

programs and athletic events. hat prompted Adam's words of caution were reports of a resurgence of chain letters involving the use of U.S. Savings Bonds. Wherever the plan has been started in a town, banks have reported a quick depletion of the \$25 and \$50 Savings Bonds being

Adams pointed out that the Treasury's objection is based upon consideration of public policy and in no way involves the legality or illegality of this or any device or method employed.

"The purchase and distribu-tion of Savings Bonds through the so-called 'chain-letter' arrangement, which has been brought to my attention by personal inquiries to the Treasury Department, is contrary to the policy of the Treasury's intended purpose for which such Savings Bonds are sold by the Government.

"United States Savings Bonds are issued by the Treasury to permit out citizens to invest

ers report, vehicles al--ways skid in a straight line,

Highway officials think the saw cut project is paying off quickly in a savings of property and human injury. They

feel they have made an im-

portant beginning toward elim-

inating the menace of high-ways with abnormally high

slick-when-wet coefficients.

An expressway in San Antonio is safer now because the Texas Highway Department has found a way to make drivers "stay in the groove" in wet weather.

With diamond-bladed rotary saws the department sliced small grooves in 244,557 sq. feet of Interstate Highway 35, a strip which one had the highest wet-weather accident rate in San Antonio.

Until the Highway Department took saws to the problem accidents had almost tripled in two years' time on the expressway section between Broadway and South Flores St. Accidents had jumped from 42 in 1959 to 120 in 1961.

Engineers tried roughing up the unusually slick pavement with acid, resins and slurry seal with disappointing results. Then the Research Section of the Department's Highway Design Division at Austin suggested striating the strip with grooves 1/8 inch deep and 3/16 inches apart.

Accidents were reduced dramatically. During a 7-day period of rainy weather last November, not one accident occurred on the treated strip Nearby on a stretch of similar distance on the same expressway, 12 vehicles were involved skidding accidents during the same period.

Subsequent tests on the pinstriped highway indicate wet weather stopping distances are significantly reduced by grooving. Before the longitud-al saw cuts were made, it took 94 feet to brake to a stop in wet weather. Now it takes just 72 feet. Dry weather stopping distances remain about the same.

But in both wet and dry highway conditions, test drivment and through their savings put aside regularly something for future use and benefit. It is my understanding that this present scheme serves no such

purpose. Adams would still like to see Savings Bonds purchased by thousands of Texans in every bank; however, he wants them to be purchases for themselves and their loved ones as "gifts today for a brighter tomorrow.

"With the deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near, only 27% of the vehicles in Lamb County have been instructed." Capt. Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety. said this week.

Unless the number of inspections is increased appreciably soon, long waiting lines will be froming at inspection stations when the April 15 dead-line approaches. "The author-ized inspection stations are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles without delay if owners will not wait until just a few days before the deadline," Johnson said.

"Any driver operating a ve-hicle registered in Texas, that is required to be inspected, on public roads after April 15 will be operating in violation of the law," he said.

Captain Johnson called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program, vehicles having a defect that was a causitive factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13% to 4%. "The purpose of the Motor Vahicle Inspection Program is to dis-cover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident; he pointed out.
