## John Pitts, Is Delegate To National 4-H Meet In Washington

COLLEGE STATION (SpL)--John Pitts, 18, veteran Lamb County 4-H member and the 1969 Chairman of the Texas 4-H Council, has been named a delegate to the National 4-H Conference in Washington, D. C., April 18-23.

The State 4-H Club Office made the announcement and released the names of the other Texas delegates. They are Randy Miller, Hidalgo County; Jean Ann Block, Tom Green County; and Yvonne Dzuik, Wilson County. Donor for the statewide awards is Pennzoil United, Inc., of Houston.

John is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kirk Pitts of Route 1, Earth, and a sophomore at Texas Tech University.

The members of the Texas delegation will meet with delegates from the other 48 states, Puerto Rico and Canada and visit the White House, Congress, the departments of the government and historic sites in the city. The Conference headquarters will be at the National 4-H Center.

One of the main purposes of the conference is to give delegates the opportunity to observe the branches of government first hand while they learn more about their responsibilities as citizens.

John has been a member of the Pleasant Valley 4-H Club for 11 years. He has held almost all of the local offices and served as county chairman for two years. He was the district chairman of a 20-county area before becoming the State Council Chairman in 1969.

In 1967, John won the Lamb County Gold Star Award. A year later he won the Lamb County Achievement Award and the County Junior Achievement Award.

At each dinner, Dick Daugherty, gospel minister this week at the church, has given an inspirational message.

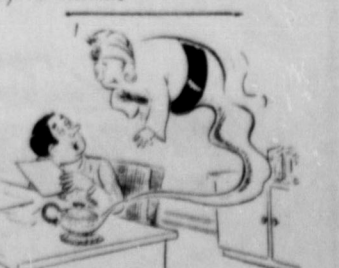
## \$168.50 Collected For Red Cross

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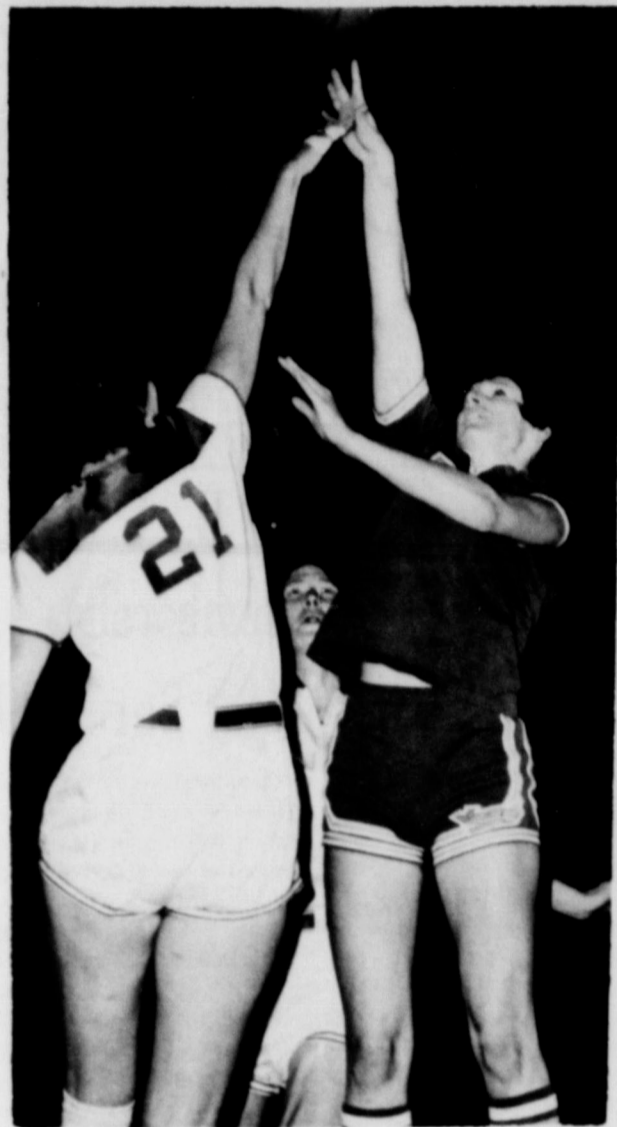

## Britton Named To All-Tournament Team

Former Springlake-Earth Wolverette all-stater, Susan Britton, now a starting guard for the Hutcherson Flying Queens, was named Most Valuable Player of the third Amarillo National Invitational Tournament last Saturday night.

The 5-8 junior is the No. 3 scorer on the team with 214 points in 26 games for an 8.2 average. She has scored in double figures eight times this season. Susan's high game was 18 points in a 61-60 victory over Seminole Junior College.

An AAU All-American selection last year, Susan scored 27 points in the Amarillo event, getting eight in the 57-37 opener against Temple. In the 50-37 semifinal win over Seminole and nine in the

finale against Parsons College of Fairfield, Iowa, that the Queens won, 63-44.

A spirited player, Susan is noted for her long set shots and good defensive play. She averaged seven rebounds a game in the tourney and has been one of the team leaders in rebounding all season.

In addition to her All-American honors last year, Susan also was named to the National Girls Basketball League team.

In 88 games for the Queens in three seasons, she has scored 774 points to rank tenth on the all-time Queen scoring parade. She tallied 304 as a freshman, 256 last year and had 214 as the Queens entered the National AAU Tournament in Council Bluffs, Iowa, Wednesday.

Her decline in scoring has not been a result of poorer play by any means. The Queens have had a more balanced attack the past two years and especially so this season and Coach Harley Redin has been able to substitute more.

The Queens are seeking their eighth national title. They won the crown last year at

Gallup, New Mexico, by defeating Ouachita, 58-53.

Susan is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Britton of Earth.

Thursday (today) a kidnap breakfast was held at the Home Ec Cottage in the morning for the 8th grade girls interested in FHA.

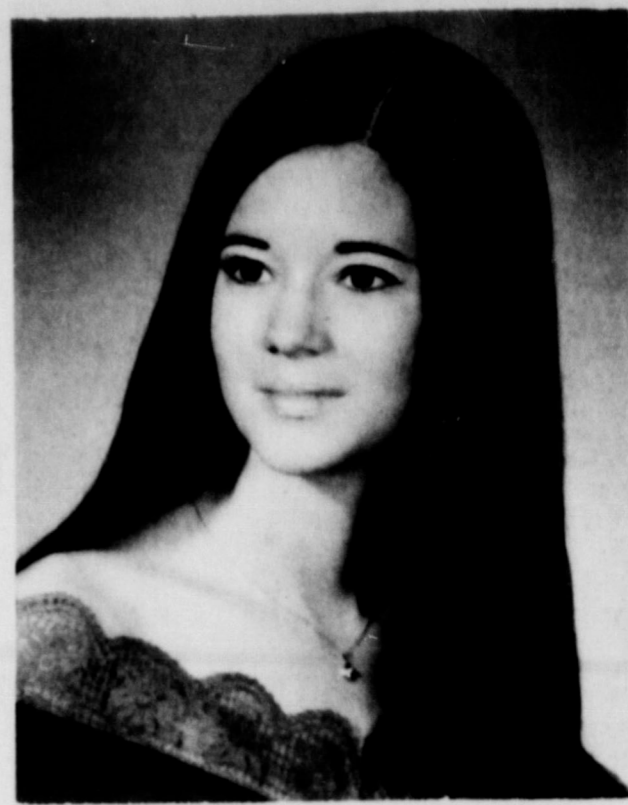
A tea for the mothers will be held all day Friday. All mothers of FHA members are invited to attend.

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


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## MELVIN BARTON IS V. P. GSP Promotion Team Now In Europe

A grain sorghum promotion team left for Europe on March 20. This team, sponsored by the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, is working under the auspices of the U.S. Feed Grains Council and the Foreign Agriculture Service.

Team members include Melvin Barton of Dimmitt, John Seibert of College Station, and E. L. Stephenson of Fayetteville, Arkansas, GSPA Executive Director, Elbert Harp, said, "We are pleased to have these three men representing us on this team."

Melvin Barton is Vice-President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association and Vice-Chairman of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. He is a progressive farmer and livestock feeder and will be working with the European farmers. He is a graduate of Springlake-Earth High School and the son of Mr. Barton of Earth, John Seibert is Grain Marketing Specialist for the Texas Extension Service and his specific duties are working on the threshold price system of the European Common Market and with the economics of grain substitution in mixed rations. Dr. E. L. Stephenson is the chairman of the Animal Science Department of the University of Arkansas, a poultry nutritionist who is highly recognized in his field. Dr. Stephenson is working with the feed manufacturers, poultry feeders, and other livestock people throughout the area which this team will be traveling.

In announcing the departure of this team, Harp pointed out that within recent months, grain sorghum has been moving into the European Common Market at an increasing rate. "We feel that the time is right for this team to go to Europe and work with the importers, the feed manufacturers, the feed consumers, and government officials throughout Germany, Holland, and England. The threshold price system in Europe has been a

major blockade towards U.S. grain sorghum in recent years, but with the price advantage we now have in relation to our exports are increasing and show great promise of continuing its rapid climb," Harp stated.

This team will be in Europe for approximately three weeks working with U.S. Feed Grains Council European Director Bob Peterson. Appointments have been set up throughout the three countries for a fast moving, hard working tour working with people in high level positions.
