## Bigger and Better Homecoming Planned

EARTH (Special) — A colorful program of music and comedy with a special attraction, "The Tex-Anns", all girl drill team from South Plains Junior College, Levelland, has been planned for the homecoming crowd this year. Beginning at 5 p. m. Friday, October 26, at Springlake School Auditorium, the program will be divided into four quarters and a half-time show, all of which will depict the "Harvest Bowl" theme. Bill Clayton will serve as "chief referee" (master of ceremonies) and Ted Rowan will be in charge of music. Dwane Jones, president of the Ex Students and Teacher's Association will be on hand to welcome the crowd.

Special recognition will go to the class with the most members attending the program, also exes who traveled from out of state. Free tickets for the homecoming barbecue to be served at 5:45 following the program, will be given the ex-student and ex-teacher and their immediate families who traveled the greatest distance to attend homecoming activities.

The menu for the homecoming supper which will be served in the school cafeteria includes barbecued beef, beans, potato salad, tossed salad, relishes, apricot cobbler, hot rolls and butter, coffee, tea or milk. Tickets for the supper are \$1.25 for adults and high school students, 75¢ for children.

Half-time activities will include performances by the Kress Band and the 77-piece Springlake Wolverine Band. The High School football queen, chosen the preceding evening at the pep rally and bond fire, will be presented. Also at this time, an ex-homecoming queen will be crowned. Vying for the honor are candidates representing the honor classes: 1932, Mrs. G. C. Green; 1942, Mrs. Russell Haberer; 1952, Mrs. Ronald Cleavinger; and 1962, Miss Joan Gover. All are local residents. Miss Gover, daughter of the Allen Govers, is a freshman student at West Texas State College, Canyon.

Dwane Jones will crown the queen. Assisting with the coronation will be Kelly Haydon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Haydon and Johnny Cleavinger, son of the Ronald Cleavingers.

Results of the ex-students and teachers election will also be announced at half-time. Voting will be conducted in the cafeteria during the barbecue and will be by secret ballot.

Free coffee and doughnuts will be furnished following the game when exes are invited there for visiting.

### Memories of Yesteryear

## Era Profiles By Candidates

In keeping with a tradition, this year's homecoming queen candidates were chosen from graduating classes of 10-year intervals. Interviews with the four candidates have provided an interesting profile of the history of Springlake School.

"What was happening way back in 1932?" was the question we posed to Mrs. G. C. Green (the former Bonnie Terry). Her answer: "One thing that happened a whole lot that year was theme writing. The students wrote themes. The teachers wrote themes, then everybody rewrote themes."

She went on to explain that 1932 was the year Springlake School was striving and later received accreditation in English and several other subjects, but the battle wasn't won until the seniors had learned grammar from the sixth grade level on up. She recalls being issued a sixth grade grammar book that year.

Other fond recollections center around the school's outstanding interscholastic league work. The debate team was going great guns, and in the field of dramatics Beedie Welch starred in "Wild Ginger" and Bonnie Green was the leading lady in "He's My Pal".

The football team was also flying pretty bright colors that fall. Aaron Craig ran 87 yards for a touchdown to chalk up one of the few victories Springlake has had over Littlefield. Everyone was excited about winning district in football. Then it was learned that

Springlake had not paid their conference dues, so could not be declared district winners.

Mrs. Russell Haberer (nee Arvella Davis) was chosen to represent the next honor class, that of 1942. She recalls that her class was asked to give up their senior trip, Pearl Harbor having occurred the winter prior to graduation. Also unique is the fact that many of the classmates live in the community and their children attend Springlake school. They are Betty Hinson Parish, Earl Parish, Norman Cleavinger Dawson, Ruby Nolan Anderson, Frances Allen Glasscock, Russell Haberer, V. J. Sigman and Clarence Goodwin.

Ten years later we find the world at war again as several countries participate in the Korean Conflict. Folks were singing "On Top of Old Smoky" and at Springlake School, the paper staff was somewhat in the limelight, having received special recognition from West Izard of the Amarillo News Globe.

Both the High School band and the student council observed their second birthdays that year and the chorus directed by Betty Parish presented a number of outstanding programs.

Mrs. Ronald Cleavinger (the former Wylene Ussery) represents the class of 1952.

To complete our profile, we corresponded with Miss Joan Gover, representing the class of '62, the space age class. She recalls the excitement of

such headlines as John Glenn's orbital flight, Rodger Maris hitting his 61st home run and the release of Frances Powers.

On the local scene history was also in the making. The Wolverines were undefeated with the exception of a loss to Kress. September of '61 saw the birth of a local National Honor Society chapter at the High School. New land scaping was accomplished on the campus and the business department received two new I. B. M. electric typewriters. Plans were begun and funds raised for the new Wolverine Field House and a visit to Kiddie Land was included on the busy Senior Day agenda.

The homecoming crowd will be introduced to these queen candidates, Mrs. Green, Mrs. Haberer, Mrs. Cleavinger and Miss Gover, at the homecoming assembly which begins at 5 p. m. Friday, October 26 at Springlake School. One will be crowned homecoming queen during half-time activities at the Springlake-Kress game.

Everyone is invited to attend homecoming activities. There are no requirements. Everyone is welcome whether or not they have ever attended Springlake school.

### Tex-Anns To Perform Here

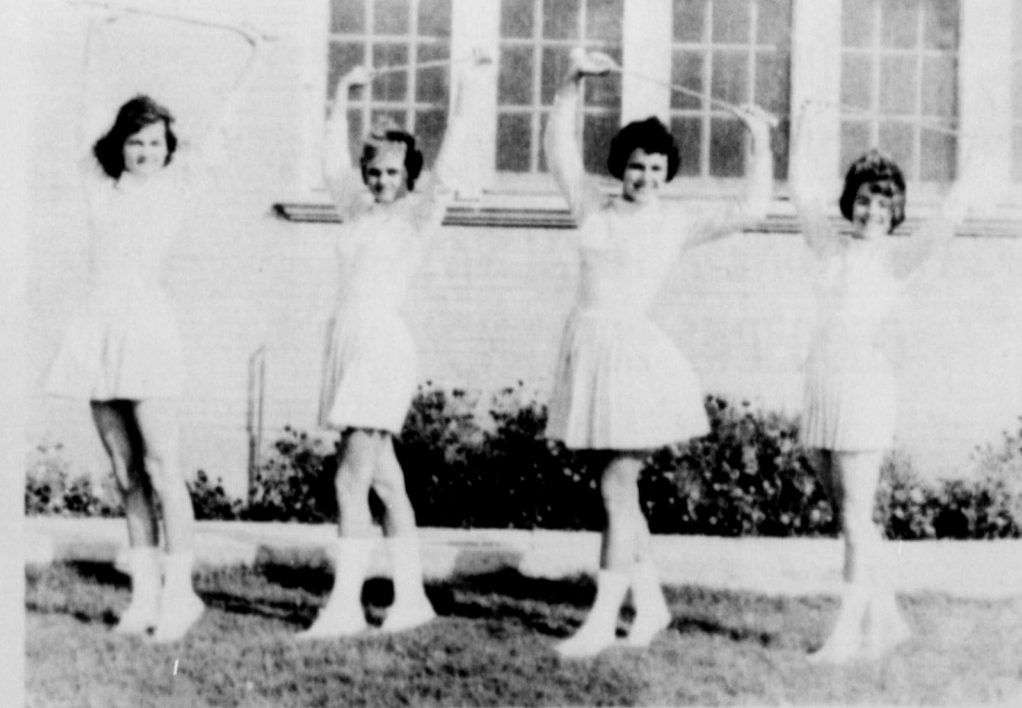

Ed Haley gave a report on referees' calls and decisions.

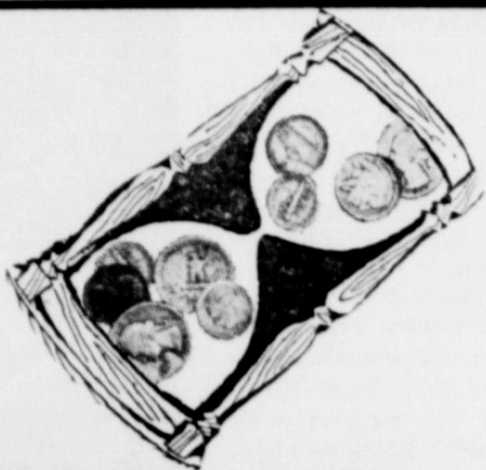

## Sudan Edges By Springlake 8-6

The Wolverines dropped their first district game of the season to the Sudan Hornets 8-6 Friday night at Sudan. An excited overflow crowd saw one of the best defensive games of the year.

The Wolverines won the flip of the coin and elected to receive and defend the north goal. Robert Williamson kicked off to the Wolverines, which was taken on the 13-yard line by Jerry Been and returned nine yards. On the first play from scrimmage, Richard Mitchell carried the ball and

was brought down by James Parish and Tom Thomson on a hard tackle that gained only one yard. On second down and nine needed, Cory Latham on a keeper gained only five yards and was brought down by Joe Bellar, the Senior Halfback of Sudan. On the third down Cory handed the ball off to Troy Layman who fought for a first down but was stopped inches away by Pat Brown. Taking a big gamble Cory on another keeper moved the ball for the Wolverines' first first down of the night.

Kennel May brought Mitchell down after a three-yard gainer

and again Mitchell went for five yards before being brought down by Mike Masten, the Senior Right Guard. An alert defense dropped Cory on an attempt keeper for a seven-yard loss, with Tom Thomson slipping through the line to do the big damage.

On a nice kick by Cory Latham that looked as though it was going to put Sudan in the hole. Jim Savage had other ideas and headed for the sidelines with good downfield blocking, finally getting knocked out of bounds by Jerry Been after a 45-yard return. The Hornets called on Joe Bellar to move and picked up 3 yards before getting dropped by Troy Layman. Jim Savage found out how hard a line the Wolverines had when he was upended by John Patterson and received only two yards for his trouble. Joe Bellar tried to move and had the same trouble and getting set down by Troy Layman after two yards gained. Joe Bellar, still thinking he could move, found double trouble in Raul Munoz and Dale Dent who gave him only six inches gained for his effort.

Sudan lost on downs and the Wolverines started once more with Mike Masten bringing Cory Latham down after a four yard keeper. Cory had trouble again in the Senior Left Guard James Parish who gave up only 2 yards. The entire center of the Hornet line stopped Cory on third down with no gain and forced the Wolverines to boot the ball out of trouble. Cory kicked a beauty that went out of bounds after sailing 44 yards.

Sudan started with Joe Bellar still finding it rough to move and lost a half yard, getting knocked off his feet by James Garrett. Jim Savage started rolling and finally brought down hard by Cory Latham that caused the Hornets to fumble and the Wolverines recovered on the 8-yard line. Mitchell tried to start running but received only three yards and Cory Latham got some of the pressure off him by getting a quick kick away that covered 50 yards.

Sudan took over on their own 40-yard line. Joe Bellar gained five yards, and trying again gained ten yards and a first and 10 to end the first quarter. Bellar started the second quarter with a 3-yard pick up followed by a three-yard gainer by Savage. Mike Mudgett really started the Hornets moving by picking up 20 yards on a nice runoff tackle. Tom Thomson thought it was getting easy to move but found out different on the first down and getting stopped at the line of scrimmage, Jim Savage found

it just as rough and gained only one yard. To try and loosen up the Wolverine line, Thomson took to the air and hit Mike Mudgett, the Hornet halfback, for 20 yards. Savage gained one yard and Tom Thomson getting give, on a nicely executed play starting on a pitch out and a pass from Joe Bellar to Dan Masten who gained 10 yards, and giving the Hornets a first and ten on the one-yard line. On a hand off to Joe Bellar the Hornet Halfback who came through the middle of the line for the first touchdown of the night. Instead of Bellar carrying the ball over for the extra points they elected to pass and hit Durwood White for the two points which proved to be the turning point of the game, which gave Sudan an 8-0 lead with seven minutes and 21 seconds left in the first half.

Durwood White kicked off to Jerry Been who returned the ball out 30 yards. Mitchell ran for six yards and Been picked up a first with a four-yard run. Again Mitchell went for three yards, Been for five, and Mitchell again for six and another first. Turning Mitchell into a work horse for the night they again turned him loose for 3 yards, and Latham followed with a keeper losing two yards. Mitchell moved out for four yards gained but short of the yardage needed for a first. This forced Latham to punt on the fourth down. Cory got off a bad kick off the side of his foot that went out of bounds on the 48-yard line.

Tom Thomson on a keeper had a loss of 2 yards. Mike Smith came in to quarterback the Hornets and tossed a pass to Dan Masten that fell incomplete. Another pass from Smith to Danny Allen also fell incomplete, being knocked down by Don Sanders.

The Hornets punted out of trouble and Don Sanders covered the ball on the 18-yard line. Mitchell tried the center of the line and received 2 yards. Trying the middle of the line again, Mitchell picked up six yards and on a keeper Latham gained enough for a first and ten. Handing off again to Mitchell who found running room in the center of the line, went for 12 yards. Been carried for two yards followed by one yard by Mitchell. With time running out, Latham's pass to Been fell incomplete. With four seconds left in the first half, Latham tossed to Garrett who had got behind the safety men but fell no good, ending the first half 8-0 in favor of the Hornets.

The second half started out with a bang, just as the first. The Wolverines kicked off to the Hornets. Joe Bellar had no more than caught the ball until he was dropped by Troy Layman on a hard flying tackle.

Joe Bellar again was brought down by Troy after a five yard gain on the first down. Jim Savage saw running room for only a second and gained five yards before being met head-on by John Patterson. On a bad pass from center, John Patterson forced Tom Thomson to eat the ball and a loss of 16 yards.

On first down the Wolverines changed quarterbacks in an attempt to get something started. Been on a rollout gained only 3 yards. The next play saw something new for the Wolverine team. Dale Dent usually playing guard moved to the halfback position and carried the ball for four yards. Been on a keeper gained 2 yards, a gain Been on a keeper rolled out but lost his footing and lost three yards and giving the ball to Sudan on downs.

Joe Bellar went for 2 yards and finding Dent back at his guard spot failed to go any farther. Savage gained seven yards before getting knocked off his feet by Jerry Been. A-

gain Savage had no gain after being met head-on by the center of the line. On another bad center and hand off Bellar recovered his own fumble on the 40-yard line, giving the Wolverines the ball on downs.

Savage dropped Mitchell after picking up five yards. Cory running from the halfback spot was brought down by Mike Masten after a four-yard gain. Been on a 2-yard keeper was met by the entire center of the Hornet line trying to pick up a first. Dale running from halfback again, found it easy going for 11 yards before getting upset by Robert Williamson.

Savage had Been's keeper figured out and allowed only one yard on first down. Cory Latham sprang loose and really set Springlake in scoring position on a neat ten-yard run before being dropped on the 11-yard line by Savage and Danny Allen. Dent went up the middle of the line but found only 2 yards in front of Joe Bellar. A pass from Been to Latham fell no good but Cory got loose for three yards and then Been on a roll-out went six yards for the Wolverines' first and only touchdown of the game. Been tried the same roll out on the try for extra points but was dropped short of the goal by Mike Masten, the Hornet guard. With one minute and 54 seconds left in the third quarter Sudan took the lead, the score was then 5-6.

A short kick gave Sudan the ball on their own 36-yard line. Joe Bellar was dropped by Raul Munoz after a two-yard run. Dale Dent stopped Tom Thomson after an 11-yard run to set up another first for Sudan. Savage went for one yard and getting tripped up by John Patterson ended the third quarter. An attempted pass to Danny Allen fell no good and a declined penalty by Springlake

forced Sudan to punt.

Been caught the ball on the 20-yard line and returned it 11 yards before being stopped by Mike Masten. Mitchell carried for 3 yards followed by Cory Latham's four-yard run. Dale Dent found nowhere to go and was stopped at the line of scrimmage, and this forced the Wolverines to punt. Cory punted 30 yards and out of bounds.

Sudan took over and took their time moving on a 2-yard run by Thomson, 8-yard run by Mudgett and with first down Thomson gained one yard. On a keeper trying to use as much time as possible, Thomson went for no gain. Savage was dropped by Dent on a two-yard run then Joe Bellar broke loose

for 15 yards. Bellar was held for no gain with Savage following with 5 yards. Savage was knocked off his feet by Patterson and the entire front wall held the Hornets on fourth down which gave the Wolverines the ball.

In an attempt to move fast, Been fumbled but recovered and before he could get another play underway the game ended, giving Sudan an 8-6 victory over the hard fighting Wolverines.

## Letter From An Ex-Student

Dear Ross,

Thank you for taking our pictures for Homecoming of 1962. It started a chain reaction of thoughts of the past and future.

We viewed first hand the steps where we had the same picture made back in 1932 as a Senior Class. Those steps were on the only building on the Springlake Campus then. The trees were pretty, as we remember planting them on Founders Day in Feb. of 1931. The P. T. A. was organized that year, and they bought the trees and the students planted them.

We walked the sidewalks that same organization paid for and helped lay. We recalled the hard work of those women, working under a financial handicap. A depression was on in our land!

We are grateful in a larger way now to be a Life member of that P. T. A.

We rode over pavement from Earth to the school, recalling Hi-Way 70 was only a graveled road then and the school house road a lake, non-passable except in drouth conditions, due to the fact that the year when we were a Junior our Junior-Senior Banquet turned into an all night affair, because we had one of those cloud bursts and were hemmed in by water and spent the night - keeping what faculty that lived on the

campus, drying our clothes, and feeding us their few provisions a teacher had in those dire times.

We saw in the annual of 1952 the band, my late husband worked so hard to reorganize.

We recalled the great athletic teams that Springlake had, that we defeated Littlefield for District Championship. Podie Welch was one of the star players. Our field was now where the present High School buildings are. Our gym consisted of a tennis court, basketball goals and football field out in the open. Our bleachers were cars, car fenders, and the sidelines. Our Pep Squad were all the girls of the school and the community, from the youngest to the eldest.

We were grateful for the kind of citizenship the Coach, who also taught Government, gave to us. He instilled in us the desire to gain from the Lord above the strength to carry on the kind of world our parents handed to each of us.

We recalled the kind of structure that comprised a lot of our dwellings, dug out made of sod and a little wood. We recalled so many who are still here, and some who are gone, that influenced the growth of the prosperous community we have.

We are thankful for the heritage that is ours, brought about when our parents, driven by a great depression to leave all behind and seek a new life of the soil, in fact most of them did break some sod if not all of the land they bought.

It helps one of my age, a Grandmother, to look back, review the past, to realize that good comes from the bad, and take the task that passed to me from a Dad, and then a husband, and be able as a woman to pass it later on to a son, and he in turn to Grandsons. We hope this explains to some of you relatively new newcomers, we do have a heritage to be proud of and though we have seemed ungrateful, you wake us up to the fact that it was as big as the Earth itself.

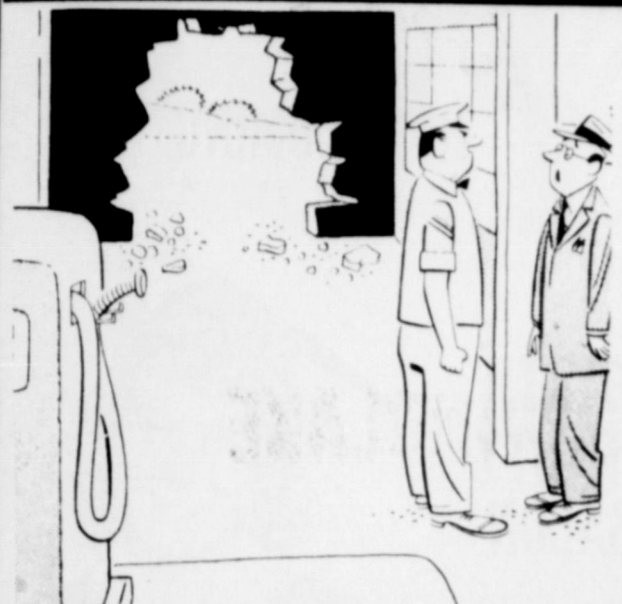
At the age of five, an oversized football uniform was purchased and altered for young Hal, as he had become the Mascot of the Springlake Wolverines.

### LP Gas Safe If Handled Properly

COLLEGE STATION — LP gas, or liquefied petroleum gas, is now being used more and more on Texas farms and ranches as a fuel for tractors and for household purposes, says Henry O'Neal, extension agricultural engineer, Texas A & M College. As with any combustible fuel, safety precautions are necessary when using LP gas to prevent injury and damage by explosion or fire, O'Neal adds.

One important precaution is to locate the tank at least 50 feet from any major building and 20 feet from other tanks containing flammable liquids, ac-

ording to O'Neal. Also, the tank should be located so that it is isolated from open fires, sparks and other sources of ignition.

If a pump is used on the tank, erect a low fence around it to prevent accidental damage to the pump, hose connections, and the pipe fittings which may cause dangerous leaks.

Low spots and holes around the tank should be filled because LP gas is heavier than air and gas that leaks from the tank will settle in these low spaces and become a fire hazard, O'Neal says.

If leaks are suspected in the tank they should NOT be detected by using flame, he warns. Keep away from the tank and call the local service man.

LP gas is a fuel and should never be used for cleaning purposes or to inflate tires.

According to O'Neal, LP gas is a safe fuel and can be used without fear of explosion or fire if proper care and safety practices are observed.

### Vents Remove Moisture From Homes

College Station — The approach of cool weather means harvest time, hunting season, and warm glowing fires and heaters. And heaters and open flames mean the return of the annual problem of sweating walls and windows, according to W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer, Texas A & M College.

A considerable amount of moisture is given off when open flame heaters are burned, he says. When this moisture contacts a cold surface it condenses to a liquid state, the sweating you see.

To solve this problem all gas stoves, floor furnaces, central heating systems, gas refrigerators, dryers and water heaters should be vented, Allen says. This can best be done in a new house when it is built or when an old one is remodeled, but it is sometimes

possible to vent space heaters through a closet or old chimney. But some condensation will still occur if the open type heater is used.

Allen also suggests the use of good insulation when new homes are built and where

practical is can be installed in older houses.

Properly venting of stoves, clothes dryers, water heaters, sinks, dishwashing areas and shower areas will solve the moisture problem in many homes. Check your appliances today to see if they can be vented to prevent mildew and sweating in those areas of the house where excess moisture occurs, says Allen.

## Union Power Leads To More Jobless

"Very little in American economic life, from the price of a quart of milk to Federal fiscal policy, can now be determined without some response to 'what labor wants.'"

The statement was made by Charles R. Sligh, Jr., executive vice president of the National Association of Manufacturers, in releasing NAM's in-depth analysis of the impact of labor unions on the American economy.

The NAM study on union power contends that over the years, labor demands and victories have helped to create unemployment, forced up

government costs, squeezed private profit and harmed the competitive position of American industry in world markets.

The analysis states flatly the widely held belief that unions are responsible for the improvements in the living standards of working people generally is unsupported by the facts.

On the vital problem of unemployment, the NAM reports: "When unions set out to increase labor's share of the national income, they can, in a sense, succeed. But they succeed only through a pro-

cess which also involves an increase in the unemployment rate."

As an example, the NAM says that since the early '20s the policy of the United Mine Workers has been "fewer mines, more machines, higher wages." Such a wage policy stepped up the pace of mechanization in West Virginia and Pennsylvania, cut the number of jobs, and eventually helped to create depressed areas costing millions in federal jobs.

The NAM study points out that three related sets of facts largely explain the sluggishness of the economy in the past several years: (1) the continued upward movement of labor costs; (2) market conditions that have made it impossible to pass these higher costs on in the form of higher prices; and (3) the resulting and gradually tightening squeeze on profits.

In manufacturing, the study holds, labor costs and profits per unit approximately doubled between 1939 and 1951. Between 1951 and 1961, labor costs increased 25 per cent while profits slipped.

"If costs continue to go up, there will be a further squeeze on profits and abandonment of some marginal activities to foreign competitors."

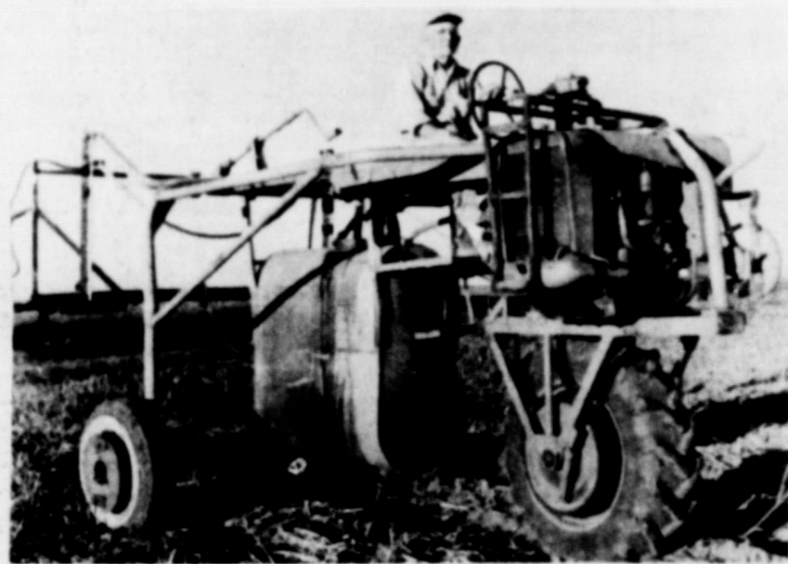

Duties of the two committee members will include coordinating the statewide campaign in behalf of all the Democratic Party nominees in cooperation

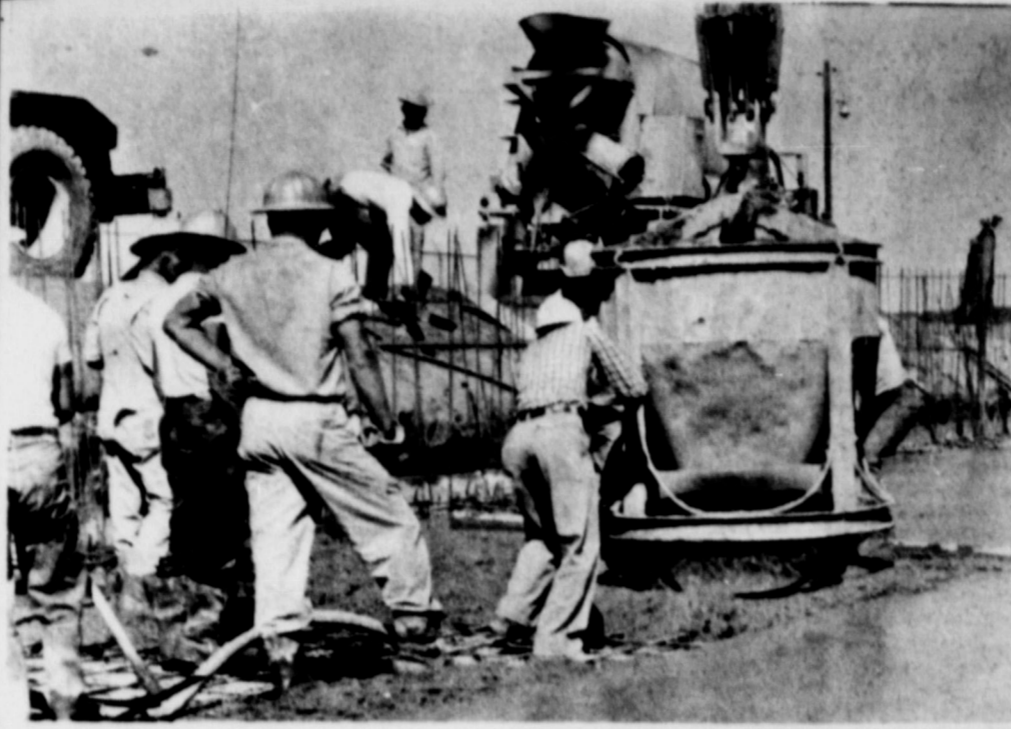
with the state campaign offices of John Connally and other Democratic candidates.

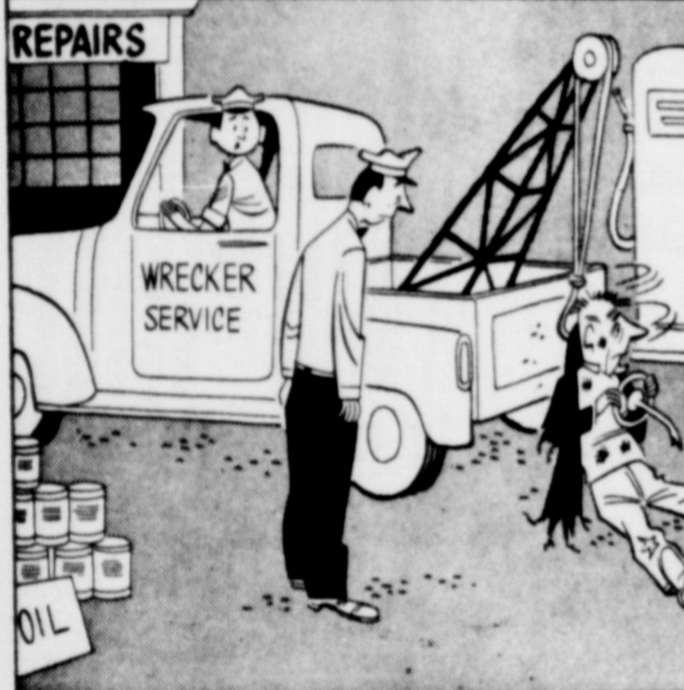

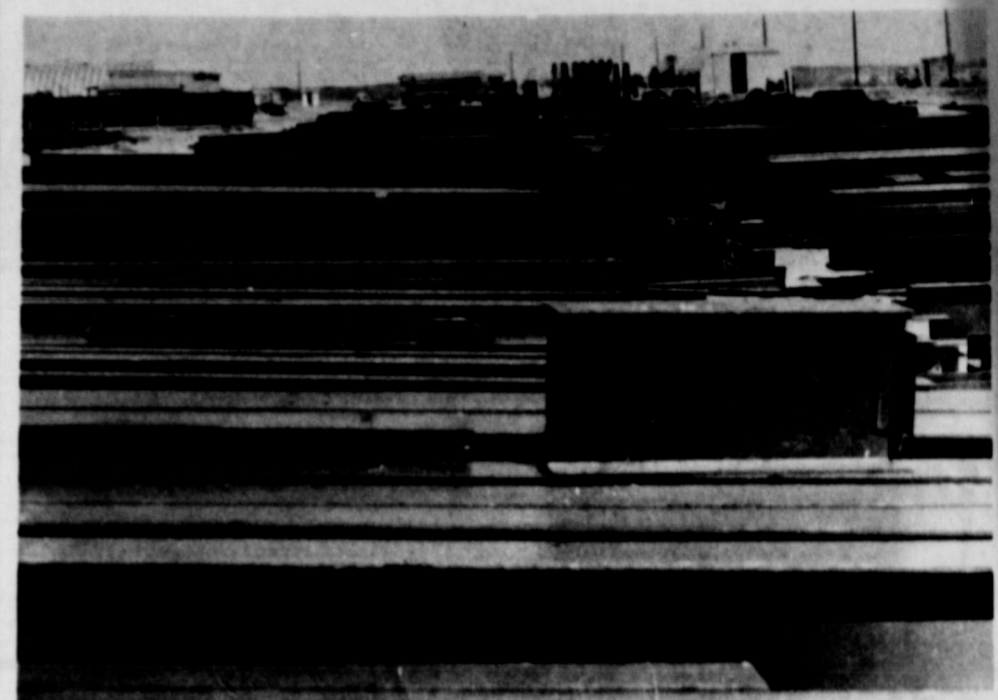

## Master Gland Key to Health

Why can some persons quickly and easily throw off every infection while others constantly wage a losing battle against one germ after another?

Why do most individuals react with overwhelming success to a vaccine, while it has very little effect on other persons?

Is there perhaps a master gland that triggers the immune reactions?

"Yes, it's the thymus gland," says Dr. Robert A. Good, research professor of pediatrics at the University of Minnesota, and March of Dimes grantee.

Dr. Good recently won the annual award medal of the American Society for Experimental Biology at Atlantic City.

He detailed the results of experiments carried out in collaboration with other scientists which, he said, provide evidence that the thymus is a key organ in the body's endless struggle to protect itself against harmful substances. The thymus is located behind the breastbone in humans.

Much of Dr. Good's study was based on observation of 125 patients with agammaglobulinemia, a rare disease occurring most often in children whose bodies fail to produce gamma globulin, the substance in the blood which forms antibodies to fight off invasion by germs and other foreign substances.

Further study showed the association of other diseases with agammaglobulinemia, including a high incidence of rheumatoid arthritis and related diseases; leukemia and Hodgkin's disease (cancer of the lymph glands), and other disabilities suspected to result from malfunction of the immune system.

This led Dr. Good and his associates to the thymus as the important organ of immunity. The theory was tested by removing the thymus of rabbits less than five days old. They proved later to be unable to form antibodies in any way and thus could not throw off disease.

Secondly, Dr. Good found that these same animals would accept skin grafts from other rabbits. Normally, skin can be transplanted only between identical twins. By this means the doctor was able to show how the natural barriers to tissue transplantation can be knocked down merely by removal of the thymus in the newborn. This phenomenon, the Minnesota pediatrician believes, has a human parallel, namely agammaglobulinemia, where antibodies are usually absent. For example, one of the children with this disease now under study by Dr. Good's group has been carrying an intact skin graft for more than seven years—even though the skin had been taken from a unrelated donor.

Studies of this sort, Dr. Good pointed out, have been possible only during the last decade since modern treatment has enabled the survival of children with immunologic deficiency diseases, and new laboratory techniques made possible the accurate analysis of blood and tissue components.

"We are gradually getting much closer to understanding the whole process of immunity and its relation to disease," Dr. Good said. "We now can see a real possibility of learning how to manipulate and overcome the natural barriers to transplantation of human organs, such as the kidney, as well as other tissues."

"It's tempting to speculate that someday we may have thymus gland banks just as we now have blood banks and bone banks, in order to supply thymus tissues for persons whose immune response is below par. This may also provide us with a means of altering an individual's immunologic pattern by implanting foreign thymus cells when the need arises."

The March of Dimes-supported scientist pointed out that further studies of animals artificially deprived of the ability to produce antibodies are urgently needed to provide insight into rheumatoid arthritis and other diseases which occur in patients with agammaglobulinemia.
