## NOSIN..... WITH POLLY

This week I have received not only an editorial from the Laredo Newspaper on the rising Teen-age wave of lawlessness, never before equaled in Texas. This was summed up with the suggestion that ministers, newspapers, radio and television people get started trying to combat this upswamp of delinquency over the State of Texas. Also I received through the mail a clipping from Lubbock about the school discipline problems in New York. There was also much comment from people throughout the area.

When I think about juvenile delinquency, I am made to wonder just what is the exact cause, and where is the breeding place of this rising Teen-age wave of lawlessness.

The roots of this rebellion must begin in the homes. What has gone wrong with our homelife? Do we spread our love, devotion and respect for our children to thin. So thin that they cannot glimpse the symbol and meaning of a home filled with love and devotion for its members.

Is our teaching and counsel with the youngsters so infrequent that they cannot grasp the meaning of respect for the rights of others. Without question each of the older class will declare they had no doubts about "respecting authority," or they received the Razor Strap, or some other means of permanent convincing.

Have today's parents, rather than argue the point, filled the youth's pockets full of money to spend, filled the car with gas and gave them the keys in order to have peace and quiet?

Have we each went separate directions, so long that the child has no desire to accompany parents where they go? Or do families fail to spend enough time at home to actually get acquainted? Is our home today used like a hotel room, used only to change clothes to attend another event?

To this delinquent problem, none has found a complete cure. But with this problem facing the Nation, can neglectful parents, uninterested ministers and unconcerned teachers be excused?

The greatness of our Nation can be measured by what our people hold important, is it our kids? Is it money? could it be a coveted place in the community?

To a blind man, eyes are important because he cannot see, to an invalid, good limbs are important, but do we have to wait until calamity strikes before we put first things first?

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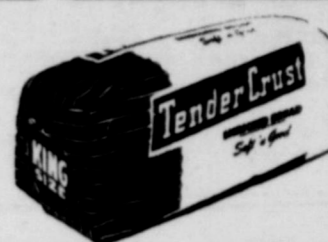

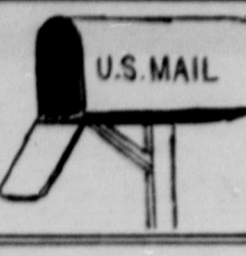

### Soil Tests Get Lawns And Gardens Off To A Good Start

COLLEGE STATION — A soil test is the first step in getting your garden or lawn off to a good start next spring.

Fertility - of the right kind and amount - is necessary to keep lawns growing good and to keep gardens producing plenty of good vegetables. This can be determined in a laboratory test.

Taking a soil sample for testing to determine its fertility needs is easy, said William F. Bennett, supervisor of the Soil Testing Laboratory at Texas A. and M. College. If it is from a lawn dig about the first three inches of soil from about 10 different places, mix them together and then take about a pint to be used for testing.

If it is from a garden use the same procedure, but dig about the first six inches of soil, Bennett said. One sample normally is enough for most lawns or gardens, but if the type soil differs from one part of the lawn to another a sample from each of the various types should be taken.

A soil test cannot be used to

determine whether a plant has died from root rot or some other disease, he said. Neither can the test be used to determine presence of soil insects or other effects not due to a lack of soil fertility. However, if samples are taken to help determine plant growth difficulties, complete information on how the plants have grown and symptoms of the disease should be included with the soil sample.

After a soil sample is collected an information sheet should be obtained at the county agent's office and completed to accompany the soil sample to the Soil Testing Laboratory at Texas A. and M. College. The length of time required to test the soil sample is usually one to two weeks.

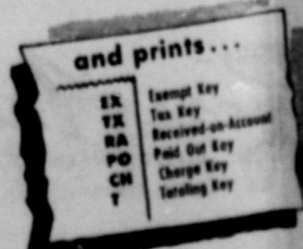

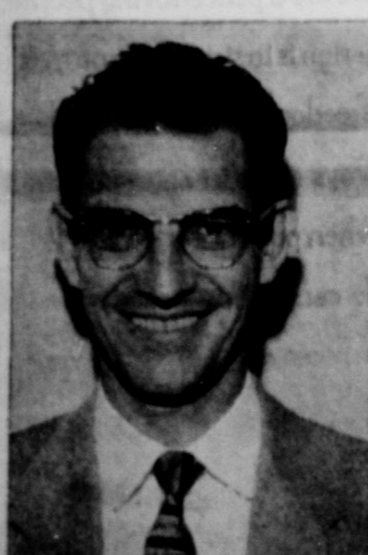

Approximately 150 cotton producers met in the Littlefield High School Auditorium Thursday and decided against trying to secure a Cotton Classing Office in Littlefield at this time.

Bill Franklin, head of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office, was the principal speaker and described the workings of a Cotton Classing Office.

Most of the reaction to petitions circulated after the session asking farmers to indicate if they were for or against establishing a cotton classing office in Littlefield, was unfavorable.

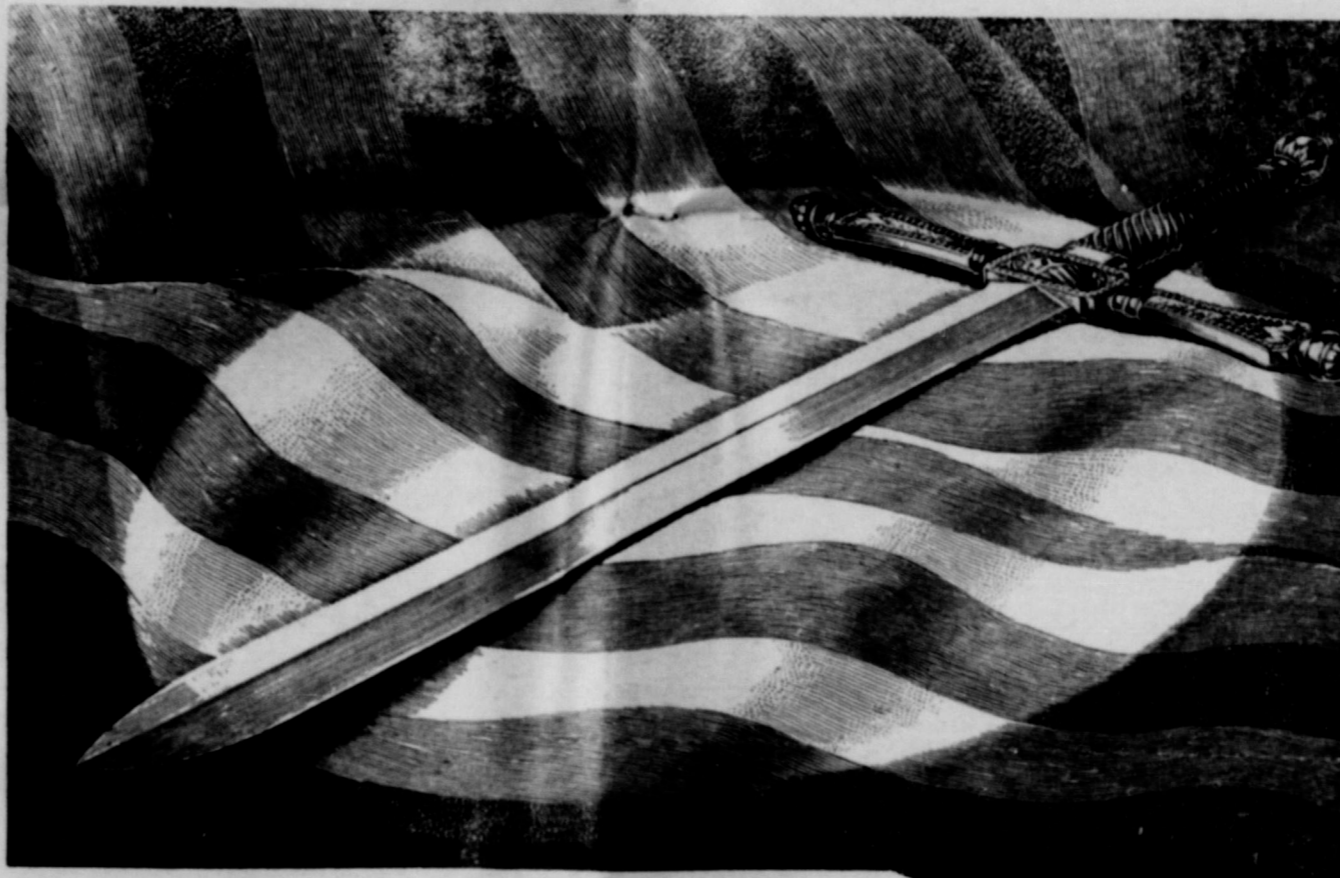

Dear Friend:

Many people have good reason to be worried about an age-old problem: beans and bacon; an extra suit for Sunday; a few pennies stashed away in the mattress.

We are not in a depression — and even the most pessimistic economist does not expect a depression. But this is cold comfort for the folks who are having a hard time making ends meet.

The "economy" is at an all-time high. But: Unemployment is increasing to the tune of four and one-half million people who want jobs right now and can't find them.

Small business failures are at a record rate.

Farmers are having a hard time and there is no promise of relief for them in the agricultural policies stubbornly adhered to by Secretary Benson.

Industrial output is declining. The steel industry is operating at only a little more than half its capacity. Automobile assemblies in January were lower than in any January since 1954. Almost daily, the newspapers carry accounts of the shutting down of industrial plants and the laying off of workers.

The economic strength of the United States is tremendous. But we would be foolishly shortsighted if we ignored such warning signs as these.

We have been hearing a great deal about the need for being strong from a military point of

view. That need is very real, very urgent.

Just as urgent is the necessity for being strong from an economic point of view. And we have reason to be disturbed when six to eight per cent of the total working population of the country are unemployed.

Positive action is called for in the situation that exists. All of us hope the predicted upturn in the middle of the year will become a reality. But we cannot afford just to sit around and wait.

We are in a slump and there is no sound reason to believe it will cure itself.

The economic sores that are plaguing us now must not be permitted to develop into economic cancer.

A small Business Capital Bank System would be established under provisions of a bill I introduced in the Senate and Rep. Wright Patman introduced in the House of Representatives. Our aim is to provide for small business a source of equity and long-term loan capital where it is not available on reasonable terms from existing private sources.

No appropriation from Congress would be required by the proposed legislation. It would impose no liability on the United States Government. It represents no competitive challenge to small business.

This is an example of the kind of positive steps I believe should be taken to meet the growing threat of an economic recession that could do serious damage to our country.

## EDITORIAL

### Driver Training Would Save Many Lives

The economic losses from traffic accidents in Texas run \$250,000,000 each year. Injuries last year reached well over 110,000 and seven people are killed each day.

Following is an article on this subject written by Frank Grimes, one of the best among Editorial writers of the Southwest.

The U. S. Public School system has been accused of wasting the taxpayers' money teaching such courses as ballroom dancing, "personality adjustment," how to get along with the crowd, and so on.

While some courses of that kind may be of value — but not if they interfere with fundamentals — there is one course set up in some Texas high schools that seems to yield real dividends in a pretty important aspect of modern living: the art of survival.

It is driver education.

Catch 'em young and train 'em good applies in this case. Many high schools carry on this work, but some authorities think it should really start in the junior highs, since some kids under special circumstances start driving legally between 14 and 16, and a great many others start driving illegally under 14.

The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs has been campaigning for high school driving instruction for some years, and the best authority in the state in such matters, the Public Safety Commission, seems to think such training pays off, since it will issue a driving license to any youngster who has completed an approved course . . . .

The Federation thinks the time has come to take driver education out of the experimental, haphazard, take-it-or-leave-it stage, and make it a permanent part of our school system. It would do this by inserting in the upcoming Gilmer-Aikin legislation a provision for driver education teachers. This would enable boy and girl to learn the art of survival in traffic from qualified teachers, and raise up a new generation of better, safer and more responsible drivers.

This, it seems to us, is about as far from boondoggling as you can get, since experience has shown good driver training in high school really pays off.

You can hardly pick up a paper that you don't see where one or more high school students have lost their lives in traffic. The nation can ill afford this wastage of potentially good and useful citizens, the very hope of our future.

Ninety-nine per cent of our school boys and girls will become drivers some day. A thorough, well-balanced course in driving under competent teachers not only teaches them how to handle a motor car and familiarizes them with rules and regulations, but inculcates in them a sense of responsibility at the wheel that might never acquire otherwise.

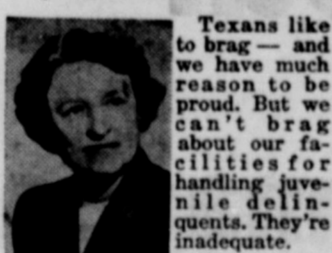

**HOW TO GET WHAT WE NEED**  
(A distinguished Texas judge offers pointers on combating our rapidly increasing juvenile delinquency problem.)

Texans like to brag — and we have much reason to be proud. But we can't brag about our facilities for handling juvenile delinquents. They're inadequate.

The state institutions are heavily overcrowded. There are no state parole officers for children released from them. Many counties have neither institutions nor parole officers.

While the Legislature provided for some additional facilities, the buildings will merely permit less crowding and replace unsafe structures. No more children will be accommodated. No probation officers were authorized.

**You Can Get Them**

There is, however, something that can be done, and it is up to us, the people, to do it.

Public officials respond to what the voters want. On the county level it is the Commissioners Court, and for the state the Legislature has the responsibility.

If there is strong enough public opinion favoring adequate facilities and probation officials, our representatives in county and state office will provide them.

**Develop Public Opinion**

Public opinion is something you can be a force in developing. Talk to your friends, your clubs, your church. Write your legislators, county commissioners, newspapers.

And if your county is too small to afford paid probation people, get volunteer ones, ministers, other people with character... yourself!

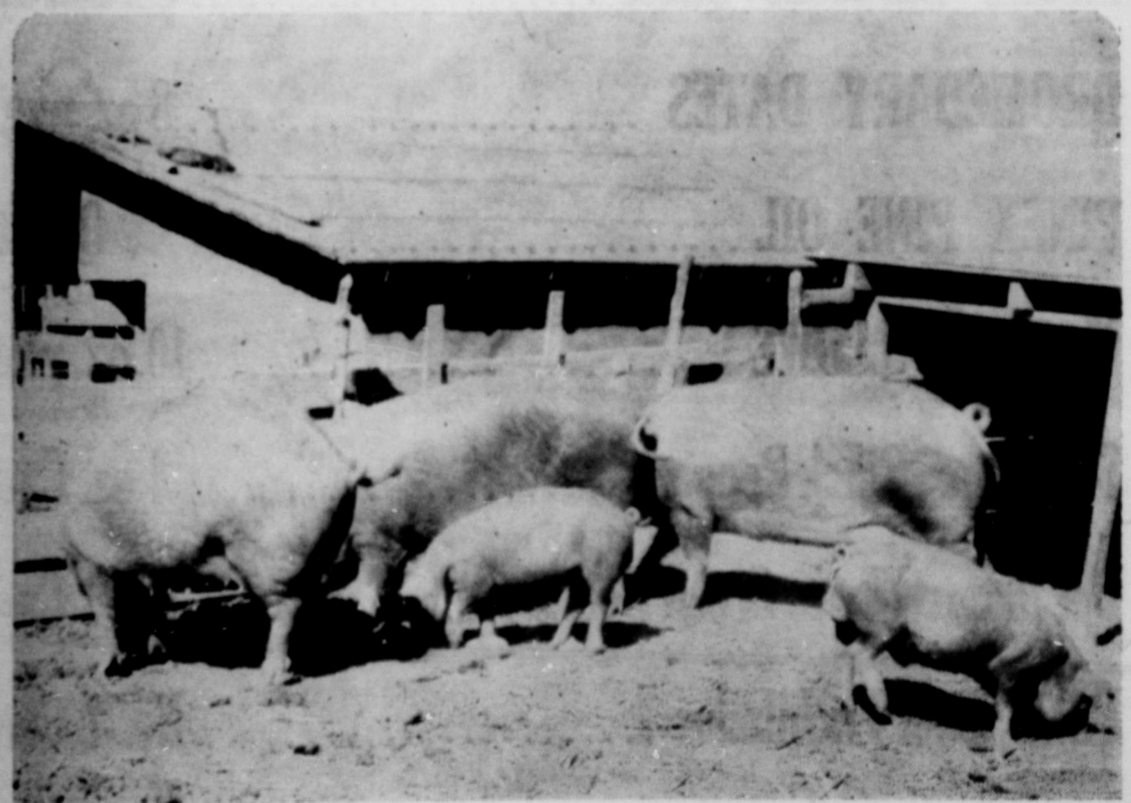
