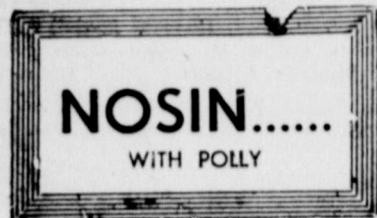

A contract for 1.8 miles of construction on U. S. Highway 70 and State 51 in Lamb and Castro County has been awarded to a Lubbock firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

J. O. Boswell submitted the low bid of \$164,035.29 on the project. Construction of grading, base and 3-course surface treatment in Earth between W. 2nd St. and the east city limits; in Dimmitt between Halsell St. and F. W. and D. D. Railroad, and in Littlefield between U. S. 84 and the south city limits is expected to take 160 working days, according to S. C. McCarty, District Highway Engineer at Lubbock.

Rhea E. Bradley, Resident Engineer at Littlefield will be in active charge of the project while under construction.

A member of the Boswell Construction Co. in Lubbock told the Earth News reporter, Tuesday, that he did not know just when work would begin in Earth, as the Construction Co. was awaiting their Work Order to arrive from the Texas Highway Department in Austin, but they believed it would begin sometime in July and that it would be completed in approximately 60 days.

## DENTS TO LEAVE ON TWO WEEKS VACATION

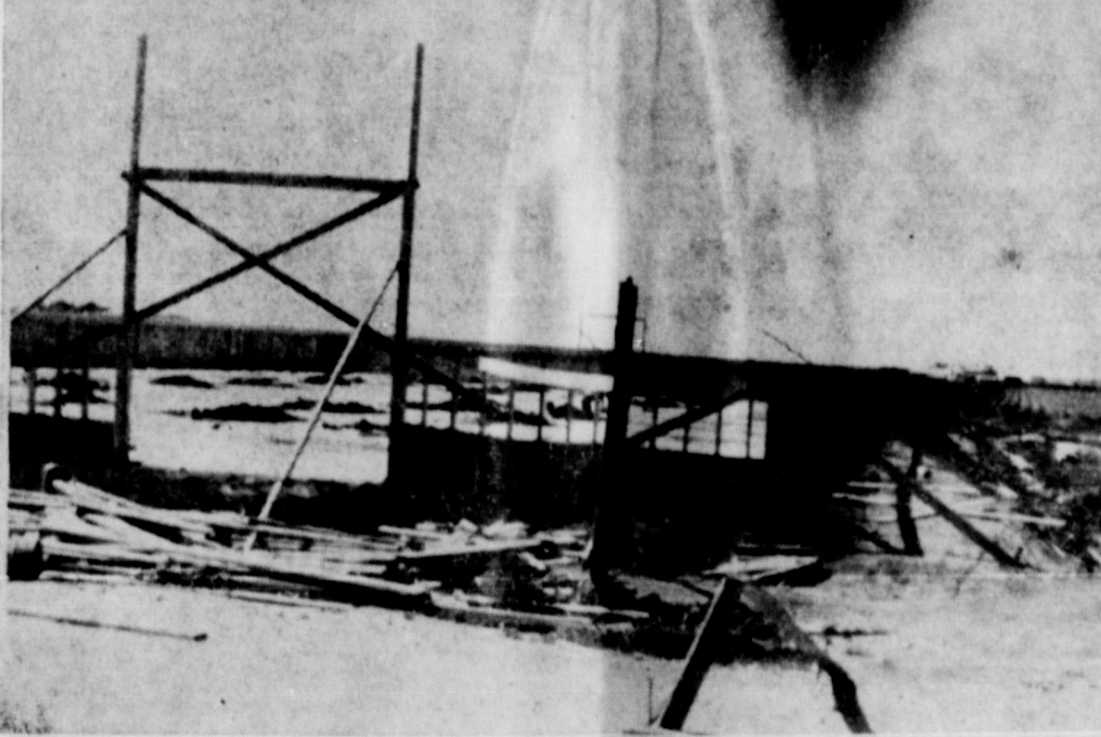

## Areas Crop Prospects Best In Recent Years

GRAIN WAREHOUSES UNDER CONSTRUCTION — Faith in the crops in this area is demonstrated in the construction of these two huge grain warehouses which are being added to the Springlake and Earth Elevator's already large grain storage capacity. Last year the enormous grain crop in this locale proved to have outgrown the storage capacity, causing large quantities of grain to be dumped on the ground until it could be shipped out. This year local grain dealers are getting prepared to have sufficient storage for the grain growers in this area. Both warehouses will be ready for this year's harvest.



Shown here looking over the Springlake warehouse is assistant manager, Z. T. Byers and the construction foreman. The warehouse is already housing a load or two of wheat before its completion. Roy Byers, owner and manager said they would have everything completed in a short time. Byers also added a 60 foot scale to his elevator this year.



This is the Earth warehouse, which is well under construction, and under the supervision of Carroll Blackwell, manager of the elevator. This new warehouse will double last year's storage capacity. The grain warehouse will be in readiness by harvest time.

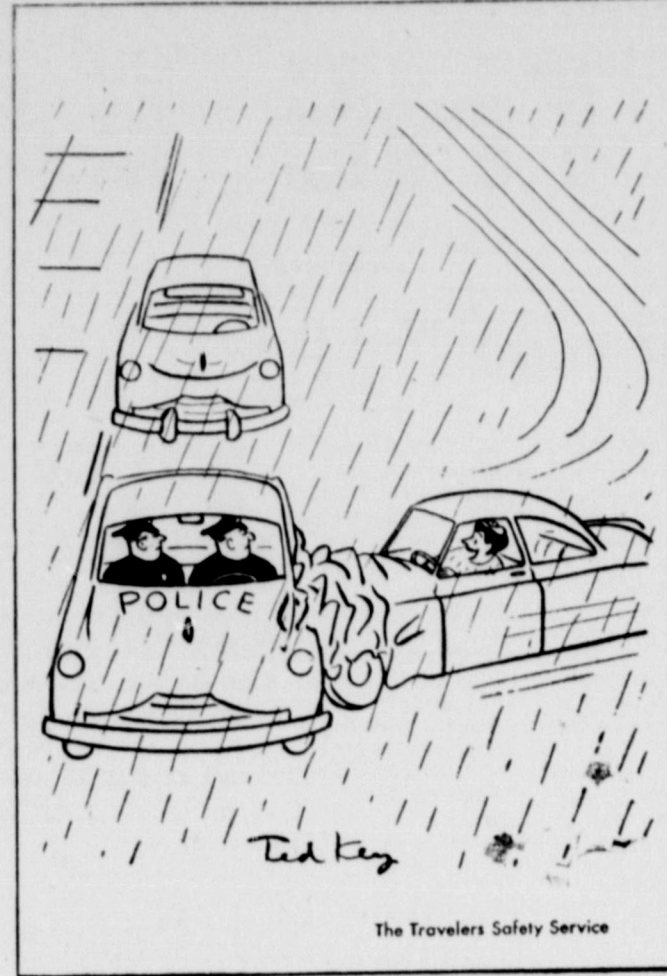

## EDITORIAL

### WHERE GOVERNMENT IS THE BOSS

In a competitive economy, free of government controls and other artificial restrictions, consumers get the goods they want. If one concern fails to produce them, another will—and it will get the business. If one store fails to stock them, a competitor down the block will—and it will get the business.

But the situation is inordinately different where government is the boss. For instance, the New York Herald Tribune carried this news item a short time ago, under a Moscow dateline: "Letters from angry Russians in villages that do not have electricity were printed in 'Pravda' today. The y complained that village stores are out of kerosene lamps and flashlights but have plenty of electric light bulbs on hand."

Now Russia, where the state owns practically everything, is an extreme example. But the situation is similar in any country where government wields a big stick over business. There is no need for producers or retailers to go out of their way to please the consumer—for the economy is run on the "take what is offered or go without" system.

Secondly, the consumer gets a far better run for his money in the competitive economy. Where the state sets prices, it usually incorporates a very high profit—and no one can do anything about it. But where manufacturer must compete against manufacturer and merchant must compete against merchant in order to attract a critical public, profits, of necessity, are held to the lowest possible levels.

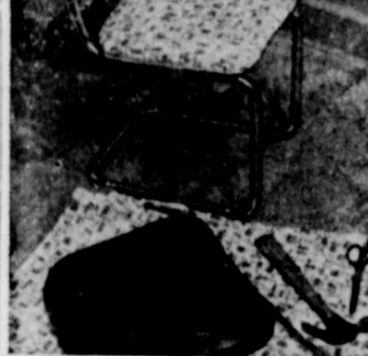

**SCIENCE IN YOUR LIFE**

**Wanted: Scientists**  
By 1960, it is estimated that the United States will be short 100,000 scientists and engineers. This crisis has been brought on by the present-day failure of our educational system to produce the scientists that our future demands. In the five-year span beginning in 1950, the number of science and engineering graduates has dropped more than 50 per cent. High school enrollment has climbed 16 per cent,



but the number of qualified science teachers has fallen 53 per cent. Equally disturbing is the fact that out of every 100 public high schools in the nation, 23 offer neither physics nor chemistry courses, and mathematics and physics courses for 800,000 students are being conducted by teachers whose training has been in other fields.

What to do about this grave problem? Government, and industry are working to provide scholarships, grants and the like to promote science education and research. One major chemical firm, Chas. Pfizer & Co., Inc., has pointed out the need for more science students in its annual report to its 19,000 stockholders. Others also are participating in programs to stimulate science education.

However, most of the basic work to eliminate this problem will have to be done on the community level— at board of education meetings, where school curricula are decided, in bond issue votes, where academic facilities are decided, and in the home itself, wherever parental advice can help a youngster decide his future.

Science is in danger in the United States, and it will remain in danger until we produce more scientists.

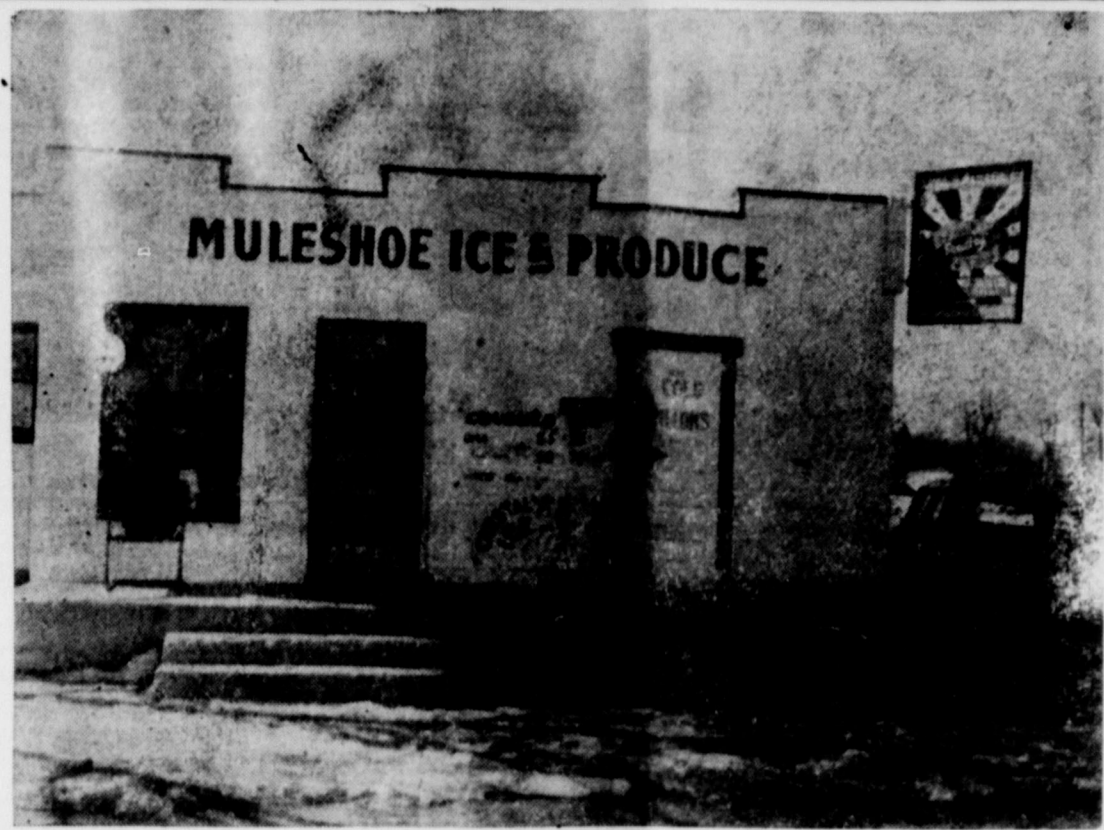
