

Areas Crop Prospects Best In Recent Years

GRAIN WAREHOUSES UNDER CONSTRUCTION - Faith in the crops in this area is demonstrated in the construction of these two huge grain warehouses which are being added to the Springlake and Earth Elevator's already large grain storage capacity. Last year the enormous grain crop in this locale proved to have outgrown the storage capacity, causing large quantities of grain to be dumped on the ground until it could be shipped out. This year local grain dealers are getting prepared to have sufficient storage for the grain growers in this area. Both warehouses will be ready for this year's harvest.
