may get the details for this operation from Mr. Williams at the college, your nearest supplier of grain aeration equipment, and your county agricultural agent.

It is reported by Steel Bilt Products Company engineers that this three horsepower electric fan can safely aerate, fumigate, and keep about 72,000 bushels of grain in good condition in flat storage. If drying is desired, special attention should be given to the grain and not more than 3,000 bushels of grain should be dried with this unit in one operation. The job of keeping the grain cool, free of weevil and bug contamination is simple when this aeration process is used on

The cost of this equipment is fixed, the cost of electric power is insignificant; so barring poor weather or a poor market, your good management can increase your grain profits with acration equipment.





Extension Service Reports On Cotton Pests In Area

Light to heavy rains fell Jver the area during the week. Besides greatly improving conditions for growth and fruiting of cotton the heavier rains materially reduced infestations of thrips, aphids and fleahoppers.

Thrips damage decreased in nost fields. Although the insects ere found in considerable num bers on some untreated fields. there was little loss of small squares from the rapidly fruiting plan-The rather general use of in secticides for freahoppers control of thrips.

Aphids occurred in rather heavy infestations in some fields in Hale county. Only light or spotted in festations were reported from oth-

While fleahopper infestations decreased on some early planted cotton, the insects increased in in many later planted cotton fields. Heaviest infestation were repjorted from Crosby, Gar za, Hale and Lubbock counties, In a few localities, where cotton was closely checked for fleahoppers infestations, 50 to 80 per cent of the later planted fields were

mewhat over that of the pre vious week. While most fields showed low counts of eggs and worms, some cotton had sufficient infestations to warrant control were reported from Bailey, Cochran, Dawson, Garza, Hale Par Scurry and Terry counties A numbe of fields have had in ecticides applied for control of the worms in a number of fields the counties. Since present weather conditions are favorable for activity of the bollworms, all fields should be checked every four or five days for eggs and small worms. As counts reach the point at which the "GUIDE" rec ommends control. insecticides should be applied. Kill worms while they are small and prevent excessive form damage.

Cabbage loopers were present in small numbers in most fields, Lygus bugs occurred in low in festations in some fields in Cros-by, Floyd, Hale and Lubbock countles. Garden webworms (care less weed worms) were reported in spotted heavy infestations a few fields in Deaf Smith and Floyd counties. Grasshoppers con tinued to move to cotton in some fields in Swisher and Floyd coun

Information contained in the otton insect situation release has compiled from reports re ceived from county agents, voca-tional agriculture teachers, personnel of the Texas A&M College system, various branches of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Commercial Cotton Inspectors chemical companies and others.




