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Longer Harvest Season This Fall As Result of Rainfall

One of the longest harvest seaons in recent agricultural history seems to be in store for Lamb ports from farm observers and agicultural experts.

Most observers feel that barring n extremely early freeze, the harseason this fall will run a full three months if not longe ompared to the six weeks to two months harvest in recent years. Basing their estimates spring planting, farm experts say that cotton will begin maturing early and will continue barring an early freeze, for three months of

A good bit of cotton was planted in April around Fieldton, and northward toward Springlake an above the sandhills. and rains caused part of this ex tremely early cotton to be replant ed in May and June. Some farm ers have been forced to replant three and four times.

A peculiarity of the replanting this spring has been the cause of the replanting. In springs of recent years, many farmers have had to plant twice or more, but it was generally due to haveing the young plant and seed blown out or sanded out by drouth co ditions. This year the general con plaint has been that early plant ings have either been hailed out or washed out. One farmer observ ed that he had been washed out three times, and his cotton was going to be very late this fall for

Rains, despite the damage they did in some places, are generally conceded to be beneficial rather than detrimenta. Because of the rains, the prospects for a bumpe most farmers feel, despite their natural pessimism.

County Agent Dave Eaton re ported that the insect threat is still light, but warned farmer that warm weather and high hu midity were ideal for insects, and urged farmers to be on the alert for thrips and fleahoppers in their






