Gains 13 306 Acres Over 1956 Quota

Lamb County gained the largest boost in cotton acreage over a 25 county area, according to Lamar Aten. ASC office manager.

Lamb County cotton farmers will eceive a 13,306 acre boost to 203,-538 acres in 1956 cotton allotments Cotton allotments will be mailed out Monday and farmers are isked to check them carefully.

Aten also urged farmers to return allotments on farms they will not be working in 1957.

News of cotton allotments being hiked brightened the hopes of cot ton farmers throughout Lamb Co unty. The news came as the farmers are winding up one of their best harvest seasons in history.

It is believed, Lamb County will top the mark of 170,000 bales ginned this year, placing third only to Lubbock and Hale Coun ties.

In all, 22 of the 25 counties in this area received acreage hikes. with only Cochran, Garza and Borden getting less alloted acres for 1957 than in 1956,

Lamb Countys 13,306 acre gain was far the highest in the 25 county area.

The entire area received a hike of 72,041 in acreage by comparison District 4 in East Texas received decrease of 16,189 acres.

The cotton farmers of this area have made this year one of their best. Besides making more cotton per acre, farmers have turned in better staples, also cotton seed prices have been up over 1955.

Blightmaster Cotton

From what we have seen recently, the new cotton variety, Blightmaster, promises to be popular. It not only yields well, but has considerable resistance to bacterial blight.

In the Plains country, 1956 has been a year when bacterial blight (angular leafspot) has done heavy damage to the cotton. It has lowered both yield and quality. There will be many spotted bales due to bacterial blight, and they will be penalized heavily. The difference in loan value between Middling White and a Middling Spotted cotton is about \$21 a bale.

The only good way to fight bacterial blight is to grow a blight-tolerant variety. Many of the varieties now popular are not resistant to the disease. On a trip to the Rolling and High Plains late in August, we saw many fields of sick cotton. Sick, because bacterial blight had practically defoliated it. And, finally, the disease had showed up in dark spots on the bolls, eating through the hull to stain and spot the lint.

A year like this one, disease does more damage togeotton on the High Plains than insects. The big need in this area is for varieties with blight resistance. And we predict that in the years ahead any variety that holds its popularity on the Plains must have it.

Blightmaster promises to be a good variety in the Rolling Plains area Aubrey Lockett has 100 acres of Blightmaster near Vernon this year. When visited, it was heavily fruited, free of blight. It had been sprinkler irrigated. Sprinkler irrigation in a windy country spreads blight rapidly, and is a severe test of blight resistance.

Blightmaster is also making a fine showing on the Chilicothe Experiment Station. Frank Gray, who farms 1,800 acres under irrigation near Lubbock, has 400 acres of Blightmaster cotton. Much of it will make 2 bales per acre with one to two post-planting irrigations.

Blightmaster is not as early maturing as the most popular varieties now being grown on the High Plains. For this reason, C. B. Spencer of the Texas Cottonseed Crushers" Association believes that Blightmaster is best adapted to that part of the High Plains in the immediate vicinity of Lubbock and southward. It is also likely to prove an excellent variety for the Rolling Plains, he says.

When the 1957 crop is harvested, there will be plenty of Blightmaster seed available. A fair amount is ready for distribution this year. And within the next few years, we believe that all the important breeders who supply seed to the central and western part of the state will have bred blight resistance into their varieties.
