#### Farmers Receive Cotton Allotments

Allotment notices on Lamb County's 1971 base cotton allotment of 133, 980 acres were mailed from the ASCS office last week to individual farm-

Producers will receive their yields in an additional notice hen all 1970 cotton production has been turned into the county office, Lamar Aten, county A SCS executive director, is urging all farmers who have not turned in this production to do so in order that notices may be prepared prior to

sign up.
The base allotment is not a limitation on how much a sent for a delicious catfish dinfarmer can plant but will be used for purposes of how many acres will be paid for and an acreage of how much the setaside will be.

Marketing quotas are not in effect for 1971, 72 and 73 whether a farmer participates or not.

Producers are not required to participate in the cotton program on all farms in which they have an interest in the cotton crop. In addition they do not have to plant within the allotment on other farms in which they do have an interest

In the cotton crop.

The prevented planting and failed acreage provisions will be the same as in the past except that if the prevented and falled acres are planted to another crop the payment will be reduced by one-third. The

producer must plant or have planted credit for at least 90% of the farm's basic allotment to earn full payments and re-

tain full history.

Transfer by sale, lease, or ownership to this county may be made until May 3, 1971. Landowners who would like to transfer cotton allotment by sale or lease to other parts of the State should check with the ASCS office to see what the deadlines are. The 1970 projected yield will

be used for the transferring and receiving farms to determine the amount of productivity adjustment in all cases. The 1971 yield will be used for the receiving farm for payment pur-poses. If the 1970 receiving farm's yield does not vary by more than 10% under the transferring farm's yield, all acreage will be transferred. A temporaryt:ansfer executed in 1971 for the first time cannot exceed three years. The re-ceiving farm must comply with

the total acreage approved for transfer. The same skip-row rules for planting patterns are still in effect except two or more rows skipped in a pattern are now eligible for set-aside.
