## Tower, Price Win, History Made In State Balloting

Indicating an obvious distaste with the Democratic Administration, the 33 County South Plains Area turned thumbs down on Lubbock's own Waggoner Carr, and gave Republican John Tower his first full term as United States Senator for Texas. Tower took the lead early in the evening, and by 1:30 a. m. he had a lead of 16, 207. This lead moved to be unmountable as the counting trend continued throughout the morning hours with Tower holding his early lead. Tower, a Houston-born college professor, became the first Republican to win a senate seat in a general election in Texas this century. He first won his office in 1961, after a special election in which he topped a field of 71 opponents. Following that time, Tower has been serving out a term originally won by Lyndon B. Johnson in 1960, who that year, ran for both reelection to the Senate and for President of the USA, winning both offices. He resigned the senate seat to be president. In a second hot election throughout the area, Bob Price, Republican, of Pampa, won the Congressional triumph over Democrat Dee Miller of Amarillo. Not too surprising in this area, was the victory of Governor Connally over Republican opponent T. E. Kennerly. Also little surprise was noted in the Lieutenant Governor's race, in which Preston Smith defeated his opponent Kellis Dibrell. In the votes cast on the 16 amendments to the state constitution, fifteen of the sixteen were given the okay.

### Student Poll Tuesday Gives Victory to Democrats

A landslide for the Democrat party was the results of a student poll taken by teacher, Clarence Hamilton, Tuesday in the Government and American History classes of Springlake-Earth High School. The poll showed approximately 110 students voted giving a two to one margin to the Democrat Candidates over their Republican opponents. The student poll doubtless showed individual thinking on their part, as it did not coincide with the voting status of parents in the area especially on the U. S. Senate race, where Republican Senator John Tower received 219 votes over his democratic candidate Waggoner Carr who tabled 200 votes in the Earth-Springlake polls. Another close race was that of Bob Price, Republican Candidate for U. S. Congressman, who trailed Dee Miller, Democrat Candidate by only 27 votes.

### Girl Scout Fund Drive Slated December 1

Mrs. John Laing, Jr., of the Beta Sigma Phi sorority has been named chairman of the Girl Scout Fund Drive scheduled to open December 1 throughout the Earth Community, it was announced today by the Caprock Girl Scout Council. ## A DAY TO REMEMBER

"Keep the Home Fires Burning"—a poignant World War song—uplifted home-front morale while the doughboys fought to make the world free.

Some returned. Others met their final appointment with destiny at Flanders Field. And when the last blows were struck and the papers signed—Armistice Day was proclaimed by President Woodrow Wilson.

The day not only honors the war dead, but also reminds us of the horrors of war. Yet, even the name of the "war to end wars" had to be changed. It became World War I to differentiate it from World War II.

The day was changed to Veteran's Day in order that a grateful nation could pay its respects to veterans of all wars. A national holiday was proclaimed.

Another November 11th approaches. On that morning some people may pause between 11:00—11:02 to pay respects to the men and women who paid the supreme sacrifice to keep America free. Others may just forget.

So, let us pause a few seconds to review what President Wilson said in his first Armistice Day proclamation: "To us in America the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations."

The saddle oxford still rides high with saddles showing up in smooth, embossed suede and patent leathers. Oxfords also feature sport scalloping, perforations and spat effects.

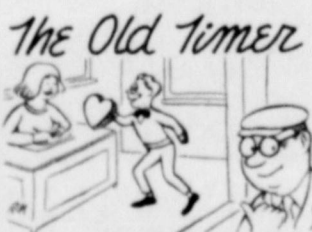

# My Alaskan Tour

Next we traveled to Puget Sound and on to Salem, Oregon. We entered Mt. Rainier National Park. Here the rocks and landforms of Mount Rainier National Park tell a long, exciting story of volcanic eruptions and earth movement. This ice clad, dormant volcano dominates the National Park. There is an abundance of wild flowers displaying their brilliant colors throughout the park. The dense forests have trees of giant size. The trees are: Douglas-fir, Silver fir, Grand, and Western Hemlock. Black bear and mountain goats roam the forests, also at lower elevations are the raccoon, squirrel, porcupine, and many others, including the secretive cougar. This morning we were literally driving in the clouds, as we had ascended up the highway with White River on one side and Crystal Mountain on the other to Mather Memorial Parkway 3,470 feet elevation and on to Sunrise, Visitor Center 6,400 feet, here we got out and walked in the clouds. It was here that Billie Harrah led us in our Sunday Devotion.

As we headed for Salem, Oregon we received quite a nice surprise. As we came into the little town of Randle, there was a big sign "Welcome Hackney Tour." Our bus driver went past the sign, made a block and came back for another look. Mr. Hackney had made friends with a man on our ferry going to Alaska and this man was so impressed by Mr. Hackney and the Texans, he called back home and had this sign erected for us. We were met by some of the townspeople as we stopped at the sign, made new friends here, took pictures, and spread ourselves over the little hamlet like blackbirds and left them

good Texas money. What good old coffee they serve at Randle! What wonderful hospitality has been shown us on this tour!!!

Near Massydam a huge new dam is under construction. You have to see it to believe it; a little town had to be moved.

We visited Oregon's state capitol at Salem, constructed along neo-Greek classic lines and is the newest state capitol structure. On this tour we learned that Oregon does not elect a Lieutenant Governor, so the President of the Senate automatically takes over in case of the Governor's absence.

I took a picture of the automobile. It took two years to build this black automobile. The man who made the car posed for us by the car.

Now to the place where "just a little dab will do you," and that is the mushroom farm, where they are cultivated and grown by skilled specialists, gathered, classed, washed, and even canned ready to be shipped all over the United States. They come canned, fresh, frozen, and dehydrated. We traveled to Coos Bay and to The Pacific Lumber Company at Scotia, California, where we toured the Pacific saw mill. Here the cut logs are brought in, unloaded by cranes, going through a hydraulic log barker, which removes the thick covering of bark, going through the sawer with huge blades, cutting various widths and lengths of boards, air drying of lumber, sorting and stamping, and facilities for loading rail cars for shipping.

The Myrtlewood Forests exact origin is unknown; it is one of the rare woods of the world. The Myrtlewood tree averages about two and one-half feet in diameter and may reach a height of 150 feet, is very hard wood and finely textured, intermingled with colors, hues and grains. Through artistic

craftsmanship this wood can be turned into beautiful gifts, so here at the Bayview Myrtle Wood Shop we left some more Texas money. Our drive through the Redwood Forest was thrilling as we saw and touched ancient trees live and growing, 250 feet high, even higher.

The famous "one log" house was cut from a redwood tree over 2100 years old. This took the labor of 8 months to hollow out the log into a room 7 feet high and 32 feet long. We saw the tree house, diameter at the ground is 33 feet, circumference at the ground 101 1/2 feet. The height is 250 feet, estimated age is 4,000 years and it is located at Tree House Park, Redwood Highway 101, and called the Chandelier Tree of the Redwoods. We had lunch at Richardson Grove Lodge. You must walk among the redwoods to grasp the feeling of their stately magnitude.

Arriving in San Francisco we spent the night of the 20th at the beautiful Olympic Hotel. We enjoyed the San Francisco Bay cruise. We sailed under both the Golden Gate and the Bay Bridges. From 200 yards away we saw and took pictures of the famous Alcatraz Prison. We saw the city of Sausalito with its homes clinging to the cliffs above the waters of the bay, skyline of San Francisco, and the tall Ferry Building, Angel Island, and Belvedere-Tiburon. We had lunch at Fisherman's Wharf one of the most picturesque sights in San Francisco, where is located the world renowned Sea Food Restaurants. There are hundreds of boats coming into the dock daily. We rode the famous old cable car near our hotel to where it makes a turn here they get out, turn it around and away we go again. We wanted to see China Town, and see it we did. We walked and walked all afternoon. We also went to Macy's and to Sax Fifth Avenue and shopped. By this time the curio shops had almost got the last penny.

We went to Candlestick Park finished and dedicated in 1960 at a cost of \$13,000,000. This is the home of the San Francisco Giants. Tonight we watched the Phillies beat the Giants 6-0. We cheered for Willie Mays as we sat in a crowd of over 30,000 people. We heard the announcer give recognition to the "Hackney Tour from Texas" before this audience of people. We saw Lombard Street, the crookedest street in the world, beautiful parks, homes and hotels, and the dark ugly sin that goes with the big city.

Coming into the Yosemite National Park which has been set aside to preserve the natural scenery of the High Sierra Wildlands, its groves of giant sequoias, and the Yosemite Valley. We entered in the

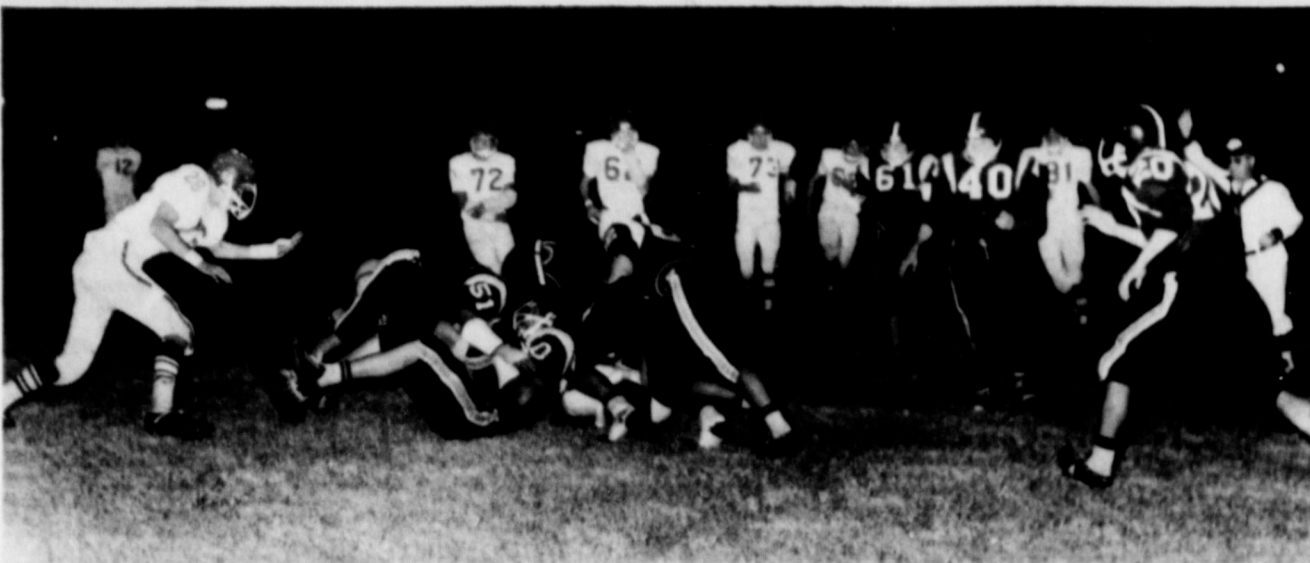

Both Bennett and end Gary Vaughn of Houston Lamar have caught the same number of passes, six, but Bennett has managed 96 yards and two touchdowns receptions. Vaughn has 71 yards of return. Halfback Kevin Ormes of Dallas Highlands has snagged five for 38 yards.

Bennett also leads in rushing, having gained 91 yards on 18 carries for a 5.0 average, and is tied with fullback Tony Butler of Coahoma for scoring honors, with 12 apiece.

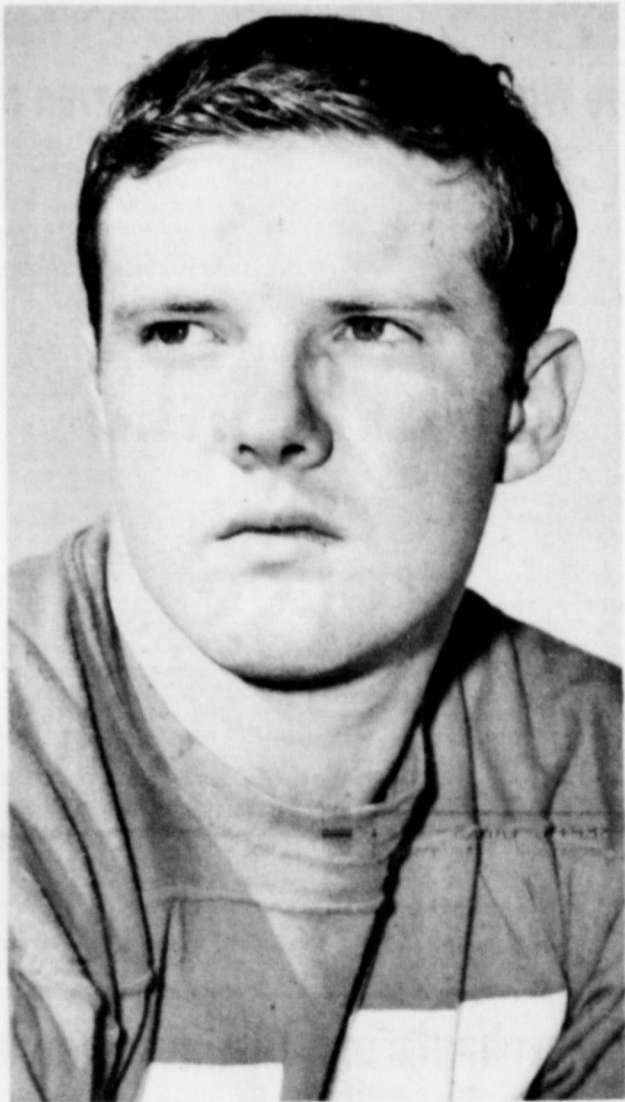

Matched play will be open to the public at charges of 75 cents for students and \$1 for others.

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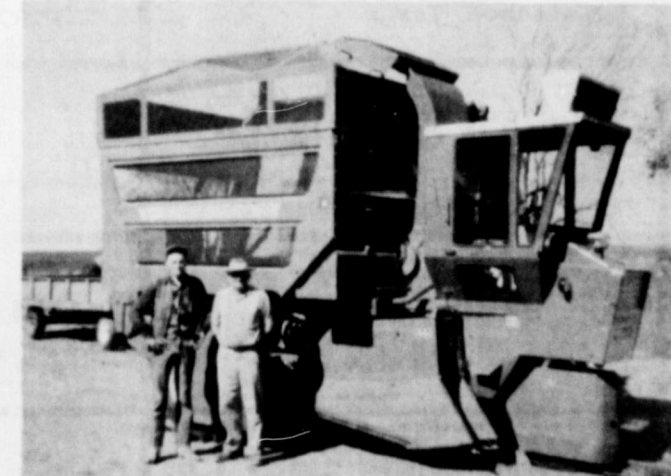

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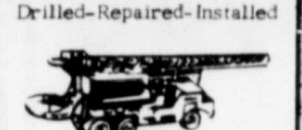
