HINTS OF HOMEMAKER

To remove animal hairs from clothing or furniture, rub an ordinary hair comb with any woolen material to create static electricity in the comb, then move comb across loose hairs, which will adhere to the comb.

To remove egg stains from fabrics first wash with cold water until dissolved; then follow immediately with hot water and soap. Make certain that all of the egg particles have disappeared prior to applying the hot water.

For mothers with diaper pins that won't stick through the diaper fabric use a bar of soap for a pin cushion.

In order to restore crushed pile where the furniture legs pressed, remove the furniture and lay a wet towel, folded twice, over the spot. Then steam gently with a hot iron bolding the iron firmly, This will lift the pile back into

TO THE CONTROL OF THE PROCESS OF THE

To remove animal hairs from former condition on the rug or lothing or furniture, rub an carpet.

To remove paper stuck to furniture, do not scrape it. Instead moisten with a little linseed oil or sweet oil. Let paper remain until easily rubbed off with finger.

For an inexpensive window cleaning solution and for one which will cut household grease and water spots; mix equal parts of naptha, amonnia and vinegar. Use 2 cup to 1 quart of warm water. Wipe window with solution and dry with black and white newspaper for a special shine, Mirrors look especially nice if dried with paper towels.

When glass tumblers stick together, in order to avoid breaking the glasses, place bottom glass in hot water and fill upper glass with cold water, Allow to stand a few minutes and gently separate To remove corrosion around faucets and bathroom fixtures saturate a rag in vinegar and lay over corrosion. Let soak for a few hours and rinse away.





Texas Dept. of Public Safety Estimates Traffic Mishaps Christmas Week-end

AUSTIN--Col. Homer Gar-rison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said as of December 10, that DPS Statistical Services has estimated 55 persons may die in traffic mishaps over the Christ-mas weekend.

Garrison said that the combined efforts of state and local police agenices and private traffic safety support organiza-tions will be directed toward keeping the traffic toll below the estimate.

"Operation Deathwatch will be in effect from 7 p.m. Fri-day, December 22 through 11:59 p. m. Monday, December 25," said Garrison, "During this per-iod we will make every effort ing. For the first time in many years the uniformed services of the Department are at almost full strength, and every high-way patrolman will be on duty as much as possible. In addi-tion, we will have about 250 men from other uniformed services of the DPS who will supplement the highway patrol force doing patrol duty." Traffic deaths will be tabu-







Package Sorting Leads to Seals

Inspiration for the first Christmas seals came to Einar Holboell, a Danish postal clerk as he was sorting packages one Christmas season. He envisioned all the packages bearing a special stamp, with the proceeds spent to aid people who suffered from tuberculo

The King and many of Denmark's leading citizens endorsed the idea, in 1904, Later, the plan spread to Norway and Sweden, and in 1907 was adopted in the U.S. More than 50 countries now use the seal SANTA'S ELVES

Instead of Nativity scenes or symbols of holly and mistletoe, early American Christmas cards of the 19th century were decorated with roses and portraits of young ladies, according to The Encyclopedia Americana. Often, plump robins were pictured sitting on tree branches dripping with icicles.

In this early stage pin-up girls were not unusual. Kate Greenaway drawings were frequently used, some cards picturing single figures from her drawings, others portraying dancing girls with garlands of flowers.

About 1870, cards were frosted and fringed with heavy silk.

Santa Claus is gaining favor with Italian children, but the traditional gift-giver, espe-cially south of Rome, is Be-fana. Usually represented as a gray-haired witch who rides a broomstick, she brings toys for good children, but a stocking full of coal or ashes for naughty ones.

Legends say, variously, that she misdirected the Magi or that she refused shelter to the Holy Family. Repenting, she now goes around the world on Christmas Eve, seeking the Christ Child and doing good to children.

Dowries Filled Early Stockings

St. Nicholas, the early bishop who was the first Santa Claus, is also credited with orginating the custom of hanging up Christmas stockings.

According to legend, he wished to provide dowries for the three daughters of a bankrupt merchant. Since he wanted the gifts to be anonymous, he tossed bags of gold down the merchant's chimney. Accidentally, the gold fell into stockings the girls had hung by the fireplace to dry.
