



Often you hear people say that "we can't see alike in re-But did you know Jesus requires us to "be of the same mind, and that there be no division among you. but that you be perfected together in the same judgement.

Our outstanding trouble with people in religion is that they have to "see" everything, and it must agree with their own sense of proprietry before they will accept it. If they "just can't see it that way," they feel perfectly justified in refusing it, though the Lord Jesus plainly declared it

God did not say for you to "see" it; and Paul states in Collossians 2:12 that we are buried in baptim and raised "through faith in the operation of God." You are not raised rough sight and ability to understand all there is to it, but "through faith in the operation of God who raised him from the

People who are guided by their own ways and thoughts are never going to arrive at glory, nor are they ever going to arrive at an understanding of the word of God. "The first of all commandments is. Hear, O Iserael." Jesus said: "Why call ye me, Lord. and do not the things I say?" We must be governo what Jesus says, row He sees it.
