E. G. Gaston To Be Honored August 10 At Honor Banquet For FFA Instructors

E. G. Gaston Vocational Agriculture Teacher in the Springlake High School, will be honored August 10 in Corpus Christi for outstanding service to his profession, according to James Wester, President of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas. The award will be a part of the program of the annual vocational agriculture teacher's conference, and will recognize Gaston for his 10 years of service.

The state's nearly one-thousand vocational agriculture teachers will be in attendance at the four-day conference. In addition to awards and honors, the teachers will attend programs and engage in workshops designed to increase their proficiency in the increasingly complex business of agriculture.

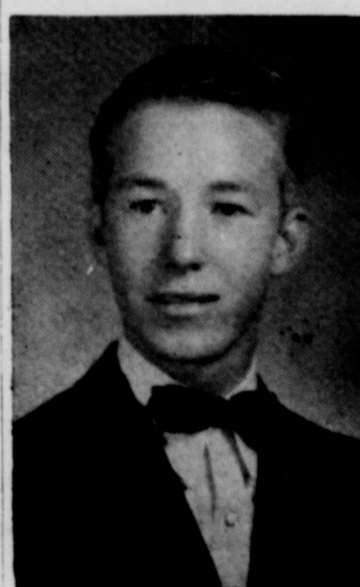
Mrs. Hite Wants To Share Beauty With Area Friends

PALATABLE PICNIC PLEASERS



Here are a couple of hints that will make your July 4th picnic a real success—or any picnic or party for that matter, whether indoors or outside. Try 'em!

Minted Strawberry Cooler
 1 package Pineapple- Grapefruit Kool-Aid Soft Drink Mix
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 quarts water with ice cubes
 1 package quick-frozen strawberries, sliced
 Mint leaves (dried or fresh)

Dissolve soft drink mix and sugar in water and ice cubes. Add quick-frozen strawberries and let stand until thawed. Add mint leaves. Makes about 17 servings.

Barbecue Basting Sauce
 3 tablespoons finely chopped green onions
 1/4 cup finely chopped celery
 1 clove garlic, finely chopped
 2 tablespoons prepared mustard
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon sugar
 2 tablespoons vinegar
 1/4 cup MAZOLA Corn Oil

Measure all ingredients into a jar. Cover and shake well. Chill. Use to baste chicken, lamb or fish on outdoor or indoor grill. Shake thoroughly before serving. Makes about 3/4 cup. For additional color, stir in chopped parsley just before serving.
 Note: Onions may be substituted for the green onions.

THE DRIVER'S SEAT



Any traffic accident is an emergency, even if it's just a crumpled fender. If you know how to handle any emergency, you'll have a better chance of keeping cool, calm and collected.

In order to report an accident to the authorities or make an insurance claim, you must gather information at the scene. Here are a few tips to remember should you ever be involved in an auto accident.

First, and most important of all: if anyone is hurt, get assistance immediately. Find the nearest phone and report the accident to the police, requesting medical assistance or an ambulance, if necessary. Apply first aid if you are trained to do so. Otherwise, leave the injured persons alone. Take notes on any apparent minor injuries. Get the names and addresses of those who seem injured or dazed.

Find out what hit you. Ask to see the other driver's auto registration card. Copy from it the owner's name, address, auto license number, and make model and year of his car.

Take down the name, address and age of the other driver. If there are any registrations noted on his driver's license, make a note of them. Also find out the name of his insurance company.

Draw a rough sketch of the accident scene, showing street names, the location of each car and the direction it was traveling. Also note the date, time, weather conditions, traffic signs, and any unusual traffic conditions.

Make notes on the speed of the cars what signals were given. Describe the damage to your car and others.

By all means get the names and addresses of any persons who saw the accident. Write down the names and badge numbers of any police officers who come to the scene.

By remembering to take these notes, you will be able to fill in accident reports and insurance claims fully.

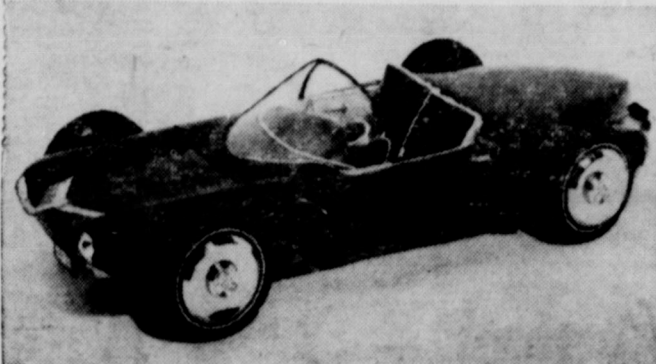
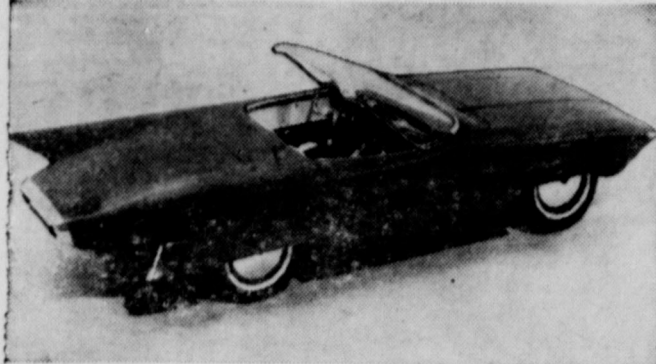

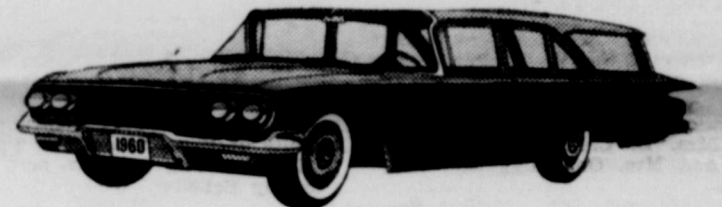

New Law Passes To Benefit Texas Disabled Veterans

Austin, Texas — A large number of Texas veterans who have serious handicaps resulting from active military service will benefit from a law recently enacted by Congress and signed by the President. This announcement was made today by Charles L. Morris, Executive Director of the Texas Veterans Affairs Commission in Austin.

Veterans who have disabilities resulting from service in the Armed Forces may receive compensation from the Veterans Administration for these disabilities. If the service-connected condition is disabling to a degree of 50 percent or more, additional allowances are payable to the veteran on account of his wife, dependent children and dependent parents. Prior to passage of the new law, this additional allowance was payable on behalf of only three of the veteran's children.

The new law provides for an additional allowance for all dependent children of the veteran. If the veteran has disabilities of service origin evaluated at 50 percent or more. Those disabled veterans who are receiving compensation at 50 percent or more, and who have more than three dependent children are advised to contact their nearest Veterans Affairs Commission office or Veterans County Service Office for additional information and assistance in obtaining these additional benefits.

According to a recent survey, two-thirds of the people who fish never eat fish.

When you stop to think about it, that's not too surprising. In the first place, fish is brain food. People who eat fish have large, well-developed brains. And people with large, well-developed brains don't fish.

It's that simple.

Kidding, of course. But we've gotta admit that we've wondered more than once what we were doing out in a boat on a hot, blistering, summer day, getting a whale of a burn and landing not one keeper.

But what about the fisherman who does catch them, and doesn't eat 'em? He has a problem too. But it's a different one.

His problem is how to get rid of them.

Our Pilgrim Fathers solved this problem by burying a dead fish in a hill of corn. It made good fertilizer and the corn grew — tall and bountiful.

But who's going to take time to hunt up a cornfield today?

Some fishermen try to palm off their catch on friends and neighbors.

However, it doesn't take most folks long to learn that a dead bass, lugged around all day on a stringer until it is as stiff as a board, is poor competition for a tantalizing T-bone steak.

So, fishermen who don't eat fish must find other ways to dispose of same.

Odd Methods of Disposal

We heard about one fellow who became effective on July 1, 1960, and benefits payable as a result of the new law will be effective from the date the Veterans Administration receives proof that the disabled veteran has such additional dependents.

stuffed his fish in a corner mailbox, when nobody was looking. But that's not a very satisfactory method. Besides, it's illegal.

Then there was the fellow who checked his hat in at a bus station, then threw his check away. That was in bad taste.

Read not so long ago about a fellow who couldn't get a loan from the local bank. It made him so mad he rented a safety deposit box, put a dead fish in a paper bag and deposited same in the bank box, then and there. He was a stinker. And so was the fish!

There are lots of fishermen, who don't eat fish, who just fish for the fun of fishing.

Any true sportsman, if he doesn't plan to make good use of his catch, turns them loose. He eases them gently into the water, after carefully removing the hook, so as not to injure them in the least.

He sees to it that they are put back into the water, to grow larger, for other sportsmen to enjoy.

Same Applies to Gulf Fishing

Just the other day I talked to a local fisherman who had been to the Gulf for the week-end. He and his party of four landed at least 50 King Mackerel. That's a lot of fish!

When we commented that he could look forward to some wonderful eating, he said, "Oh, we didn't bother to bring any back. When we got done fishing, we just dumped the entire lot back into the Gulf."

Each of those Kings had been gilled and subdued. Of course, all of them were dead.

What a waste of food!

A Kingfish, properly prepared, is one of the best eating fish in the Gulf.

Same is true of the Sailfish.

Believe it or not, even the Ribbon Fish is regarded as good eating by some, especially when filleted, buttered and wrapped in dough — cooked like Flounder.

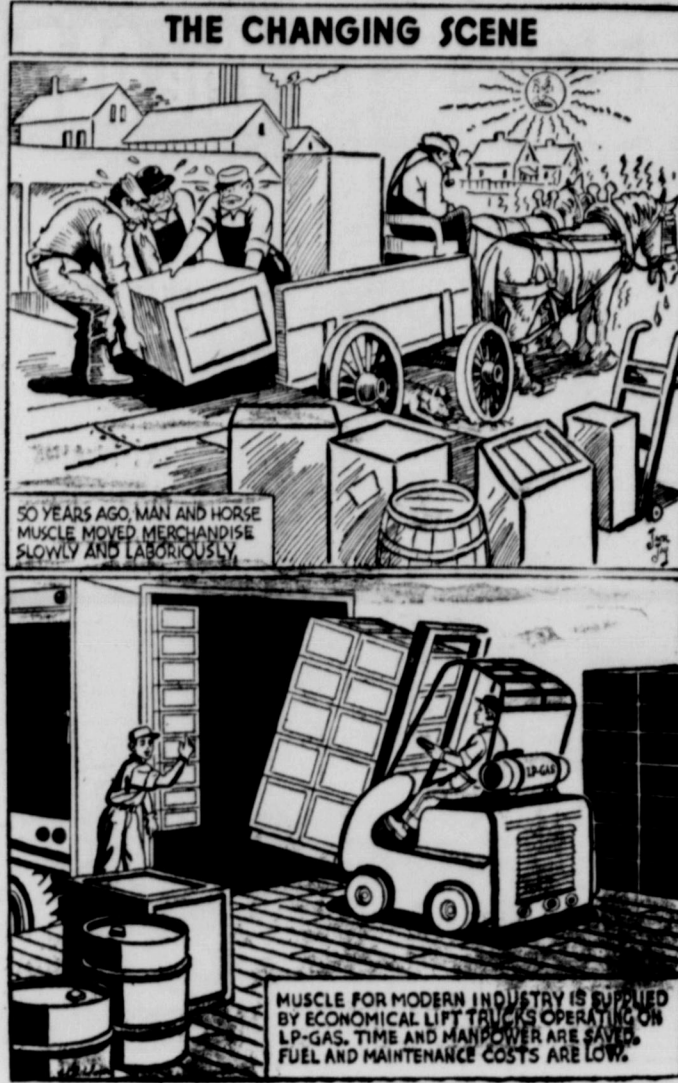

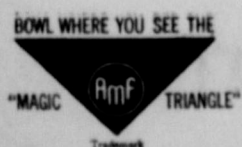



High School Yearbook Workshop August 14 - 18 At Texas Tech

Lubbock — Teenagers will learn new methods of publishing the ever-important high school yearbook at the third annual yearbook workshop August 14-18 at Texas Tech.

High schoolers from throughout the state will gather to hear lecturers from four well-known publishing companies present new ideas and tips on how to put some of them into practice.

"Lectures from specialists in their field and the practical work involved will add to the effectiveness of this year's workshops," says W. E. Garets, head of Texas Tech's journalism department.

H. H. Kesler, manager of the yearbook division of the Inter-Collegiate Press, in Kansas City, Mo., will start off the four day session on yearbooks with "Laying the Groundwork." He will also discuss the principles of good layout. To aid the student to better understand the procedures, there will be actual laboratory work in the preparation of a dummy. Kesler will be assisted by Bud Rasmussen, also of Inter-Collegiate Press.

Various aspects of yearbook photography will be discussed by Bruce Henington from the Henington Publishing Co., Wolfe City. Four color photography will be included. Dr. Otha Spencer, photography authority and head of the journalism department of East Texas State College, will speak on making photographs interesting.

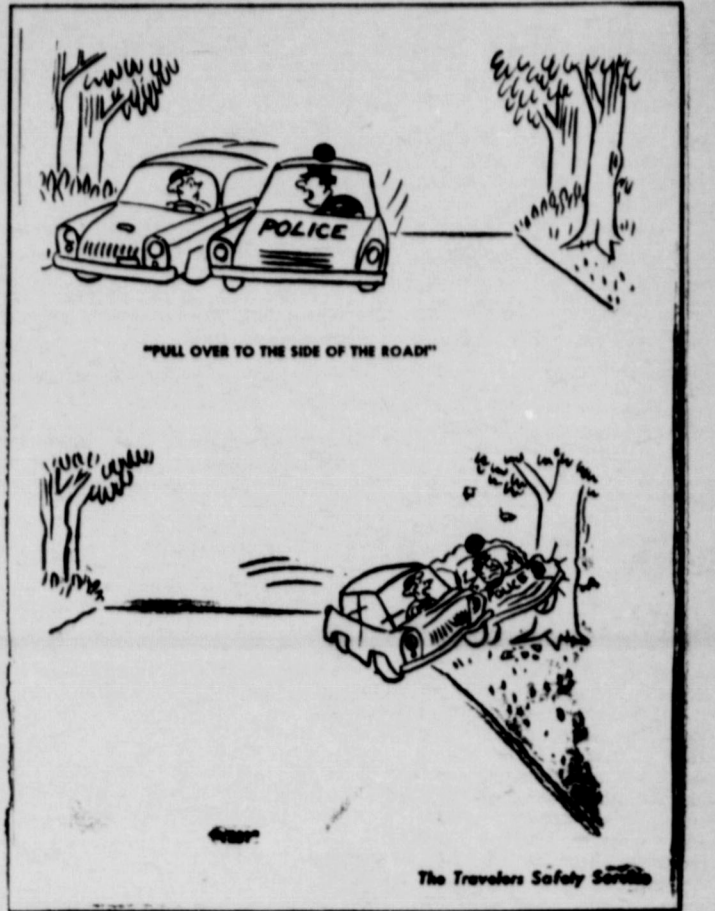
D-Eon Priest, executive vice-president and general manager of Colorpress, Inc. Austin, will discuss the five basic categories of yearbook copy. Priest will also advise the workshop participants on such topics as type faces, copy fitting, punctuation, and abbreviation.

The last day's program will be given by Charles Dolan, director of yearbook seminars for Taylor Publishing Co., Dallas. Understanding the publisher — his objectives, and requirements — and understanding the position of the yearbook staff will be included in his lectures. On the business side, he will discuss deadlines, deliveries and costs. "Covers — Function and Purpose" will close the lecture session.

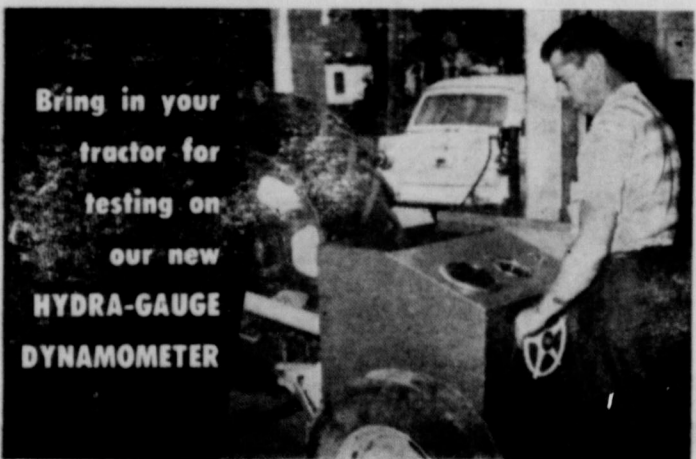

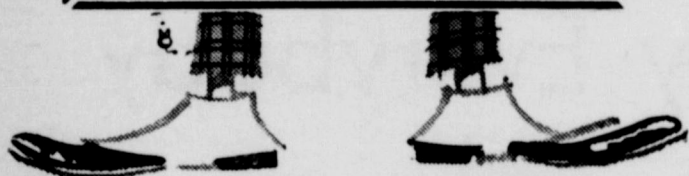

County Reaches 49.1% of Bond Sales Quota

"Savings Bonds sales through June 1960 totaled \$181,541," Mr. C. O. Stone, Chairman of Lamb County Savings Bonds Committee reported today. "Our county has now reached 49.1 percent of its 1960 goal of \$370,000. June sales were \$17,316."

Sales in Texas for the first six months of 1960 were \$180,671,012 which is 48.7 percent of the state goal.

"Never before have United States Savings Bonds been so attractive to investors and small savers alike," Mr. C. O. Stone, Chairman of the Lamb County Savings Bonds Committee, said today in commenting on the one-half per cent increase in interest rates on old and new Series E and H Savings Bonds.

June Accident Report Released

The Texas Department of Public Safety records show that the Highway Patrol investigated nine rural traffic accidents in Lamb County during June. This report comes from Sergeant D. S. Lawson, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

Property damage wrecks accounted for five of the total, personal injury for three and one fatal accident. These wrecks caused a total property damage of \$5,615.00 with four persons injured and one life lost.

Sergeant Lawson pointed out that this brings the total for the year in this county to three killed, nineteen injured and property damage in excess of \$24,700.00. This compares with none killed, twenty five injured, and property damage of \$29,975.00 during the first six months of 1959.

been a total of 784 fatal accidents in Texas," Sergeant Lawson said. "From these accidents 962 persons have died needlessly," he added.

During the summer months thousands of motorists are on the highways, and too many of them are intent on cramming as much activity as they can into one brief vacation, and the result is often tragedy. In appealing for increased vigilance to cut down accidents, the Sergeant cautioned vacationers to be on their guard against speeders, drinking drivers, and drivers who disregard traffic laws. Above all, he warned them to make sure they are not guilty of such offenses themselves.

Many vacationers get into trouble by not allowing enough time to cover the trip comfortably, the Sergeant pointed out. Then they try to make up time by driving too fast for conditions, by driving too far, or by disregarding traffic laws.

"Traffic accidents take no vacations," Sergeant Lawson said. Step up your vigilance in order to stay safe on the road, and enjoy your trip or vacation without an accident.

Charcoal Rot, Sorghum And Corn Disease

College Station. — Charcoal rot is a common disease of grain sorghum and corn in most areas. The fungus root rot causes more damage than head smut in many areas. Close to 100 percent infection may occur in susceptible selections or varieties. Losses are apt to be heaviest during years of little rainfall with dryland farming.

Damage is noticed during June and July in South Texas. The disease appears in north Texas during August and September.

Damage is easiest to detect when the plants are approaching maturity. Charcoal rot damage plants have poorly filled heads or ears with lightweight grain. Diseased stalks ripen and dry early.

Weakening of the stalks by the fungus, in many cases, causes them to lodge. Stalks are soft and discolored at the base with the pith disintegrated and shredded. Small pin-point, blackish, seed bodies (sclerotia) may be among the shredded pith.

Other crops affected by the disease are alfalfa, cotton, lespedeza, sugar beets, sweetpotatoes, watermelons, sunflowers, peppers, cowpeas (southern peas), beans and peas. Crops that have their seedling stages and those that mature in cool or rainy weather are not damaged seriously.

Abundant moisture from rain or irrigation water in the latter part of the growing season practically control the stem rot form. Crops appear to resist the disease in the period of growth when they have high vigor. Work is under way in an effort to develop resistant hybrids.

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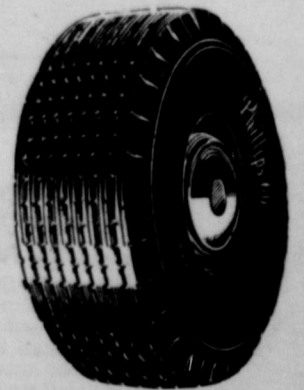

Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains
Research Foundation

The 1960 yield data from two wheat fertilizer tests were released by Delbert Langford, associate agronomist, of the High Plains Research Foundation. The two varieties used in the east were Early Triumph, a standard high yielding variety, and Tascosa, a new hard red winter variety with exceptional adaptability for the High Plains area.

The following observations were made in these tests: (1) nitrogen alone increased yield an average of 19.08 bushels per acre above no fertilizer; (2) phosphate alone gave an increase of 16.66 bushels per acre; and (3) potash in combination with nitrogen and phosphate did not increase yield.

While the phosphate alone was not the most profitable fertilizer application, this is the first time at the Foundation that phosphate alone has given a significant increase in yield. This indicates that as these Pullman clay loam soils are cropped heavily year after year, there is a greater need for phosphate fertilizer.

The average yield of the Tascosa variety in fertilized plots was 61.56 bushels per acre and the Early Triumph averaged 52.17.

The fertilizer treatment which produced the highest yield in the test was not the most profitable. The fertilizer treatment giving the highest average yield was 120 lbs. nitrogen and 60 lbs. phosphate. This returned \$23.39 per acre above the cost of the fertilizer, but with only 40 lbs. of nitrogen alone, the yield almost as high and the net return per acre was \$30.55.

This year's wheat fertilizer data at the High Plains Research Foundation are good indication of what results can be expected

July Rains Cause Delay In Cultivation And Much Damage To Crops

Rainfall during July, which ranged from six to near fifteen inches, has caused some shedding of farms in many fields of cotton. Such weather conditions have delayed cultivation as well as the application of insecticides in areas where insect infestation were sufficient to require control.

Thrips have ceased to be a problem in counties reporting, since all reports were of light populations except Mason County, which had medium infestations on cotton in some fields.

Fleahopper infestations increased in many fields in some localities, with rather heavy hatching following the heavy rains. Heaviest infestations were reported in eastern half of Lubbock County, Glasscock, Hockley and Lamb counties. Other counties reported light to medium infestations. Populations were heaviest on the earlier planted cotton. All cotton should be closely checked for fleahoppers and excessive loss of tiny

squares, which indicate damage by the insects.

Bollworms were reported in light infestations in Collingsworth, Glasscock, Lubbock, Midland and Terry counties. Medium infestations were found in Fisher, Jones and Mason counties. In most instances the populations were of recently deposited eggs, with occasional fields showing hatching. With favorable weather conditions for activity of this insect, fields should be closely watched for both eggs and damaging numbers of small worms.

Boll weevil infestations were reported sufficiently heavy in occasional fields. Garden webworms require control, along with grasshoppers, in Hale County. Grasshoppers damage some small cotton in Garza, Mason and Throckmorton counties.

For control recommendations please refer to the Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insect, pub-

lished by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Copies of this Guide may be picked up at the office of your County Agricultural Agent. The information used in this "Cotton Insect Situation" release is compiled from reports received from County Agents, Vocational Agricultural Teachers, personnel of Texas A & M College System, branches of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, commercial cotton inspectors, chemical companies and others. We hope

that everyone who does any field checking will send us a report of the situation as you find it.

Hot news seldom stays hot.

Beware of Tularemia

Be extra careful when you're cleaning your rabbits too. Use rubber gloves and don't touch the meat with your bare hands. If you do, then wash your hands quickly and thoroughly with alcohol.

Tularemia is transmitted to humans primarily by absorption, through cuts or punctures in the skin, while handling the raw meat of rabbits. The meat is safe to eat, after it has been thoroughly cooked, so the danger lies in preparing for the feast.

If you're a wise hunter you know to play safe in the field, with your weapon. So, play it just a hair safer when handling that hare.

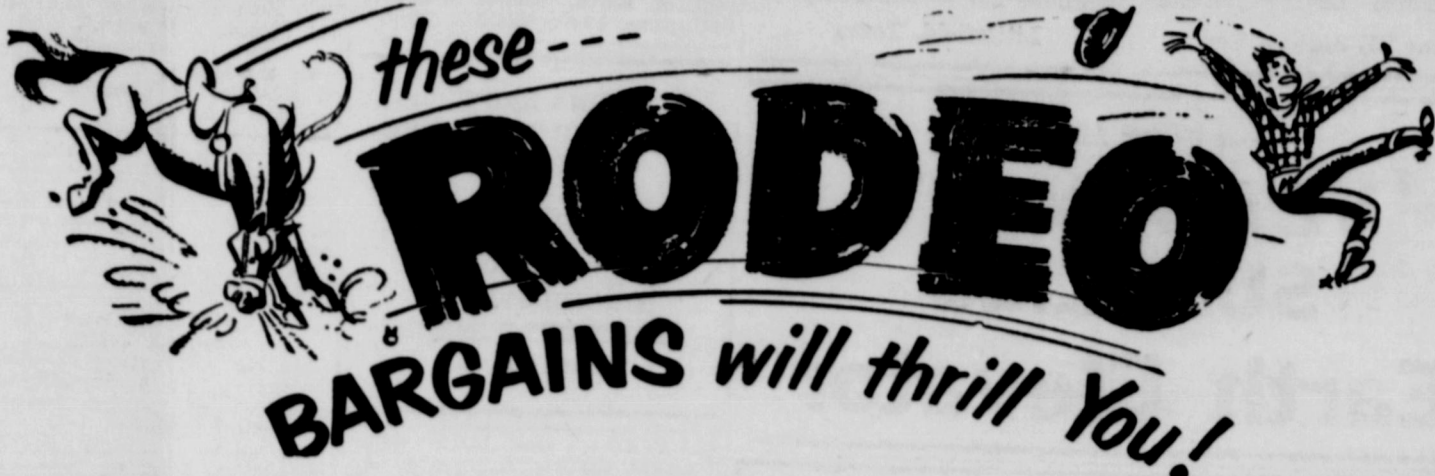

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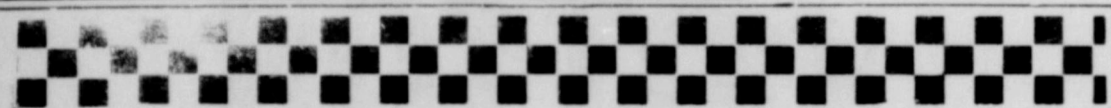
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
