THE FIRST WORLD WAR

On April 2, 1917 the two houses of Congress met for a joint session in Washington, D. C. They were to receive a message from Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States.

For two and one half years a great war raged in Europe. German vessels sank American ships. German spies blew up American factories. The German government tried to secure the promise of support from Mexico in the event of a war with the United States. The American people had wanted to stay out of the conflict, but they came to believe that they must defend their rights. On April 6, 1917 Congress declared war on Germany. In December, 1917, the United States went to war with Austria and Hungary.

The causes of the war were that the nations of Europe had long been in a great race. Each was trying to secure more territory, trade, markets and raw materials.

On August 4, 1914, American neutrality was proclaimed. But as the months passed, it became harder to remain neutral. Britain stopped American ships and seized their cargoes. In this action Britain was breaking the International Law. The Germans also broke it.

President Wilson saw that the U. S. must defend its right to freedom of the seas. The first need of the United States after declaring war was to raise and arm troops and raise money. To prepare for war the Selective Service Act was passed, army camps were built, women made bandages and dressings. Congress passed a series of stern laws.

In June, 1917 an army reached France. The first American troops took their place in the battle line in October, 1917. In March, 1918, the last great German drive began. On May 25 1918 an American division captured the town of Cantigny. On July 18, 1918, General Foch started the drive that was to break the power of the Germans. On September 29 two American divisions swept through the strong German line. On September 16 the battle was over. November found the Germans facing defeat. On November 6, the German government asked for an agreement to end the fighting. President Wilson went to Europe to make the peace treaty.

By taking part in World War I, the United States established itself as one of the great powers of the world. It also became involved in closer relations with other countries than it had done

before, yet in spite of the international problems, the chief concern of the United States was its own internal development. The American people were fitting themselves to live in a new age.
