## **Company Outlines Plan for Minorities**

The Quaker Oats Company has announced plans to provide 476 additional jobs worth \$4 million in annual wages for non-whites by 1976.

The new jobs, which will range from executive, managerial and scientific positions to assembly line jobs, will raise its minorities payroll from \$17 million to \$21 million annually. Quaker employs some 18,000 persons at 34 major plants, of whom approximately 2,000 are

blacks and other minorities. The Company, widely diversified in food, chemical, toy production and a restaurant chain, carries about \$14 million in insurance with black companies and will add another \$7 million by 1976.

The new plan includes some \$2 million in construction that will go to black or non-white firms, and \$702,000 annually to go to minority-run advertising firms.

# **Parking Ticket**

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that his office is looking into local handling of the state oriminal justice tax, including reports that some courts mistakenly put the \$2.50 tax on parking tickets. The tax, levied by the Legislature in 1971 to support the Criminal Justice Council, covers only moving traffic violation Pledges are Tempie McClennen, convictions, bond forfeitures Bullock said that taxes wrongly put on parking tickets are subject to refund to people who paid the tickets but that the burden for all refunds rests on the city and county courts which levied the tax by mistake. The state, in turn, will reimburse the local courts upon proof that a refund was actually paid the ticket holder, Bullock Hobbs, N. M., and Susan Davis, said. Refunds to cities and counties will be in the form of credits on their next quarterly


> tax report. Bullock said his review of local handling of the tax started following reports in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram that North Richland Hills charges the tax on parking tickets. Similar situations have since been found in other towns but apparently no large cities are involved.

The reports filed with the Comptroller by local officials show only the number of total convictions and amount of tax collected. There is no break-Taxes are handled by city officials for municipal courts and

by county treasurers for justice of the peace, county and district courts. The city or county gets to keep a five per cent handling fee. The tax raises about \$6 million a year for the Criminal

Once called lumbago, back pain is often caused by poor posture, obesity, ill-fitting or inappropriate shoes, a sedentary life, overly strenuous work, or participating in sports. It may also be due to disease not directly relating to the back or to injury or strain.

Low back pain may occur at any age but it seems to bother middle-aged persons most. It occurs in both sexes and in all races, and is more common among people who do work that requires stooping or lifting. Good posture of the entire body is important in preventing low back pain.

Sit with head, shoulders and trunk erect. When standing, the spine should be stright. spine should be straight. Not the military "ramrod" posture, but straight.

A soft, saggy bed and low, oft chairs contribute to backache. Chairs, ideally, should be firm, straight and have the contour of a normal back. A low-heeled shoe is best for

standing or walking. Highheeled shoes tend to throw the posture off balance and increase strain on the lower back. Loafers, ballet slippers and sneakers also may lead to backache if worn extensively.

In lifting heavy objects, keep the back straight and lift with knees and thigh muscles, rather than bending over and straining the spine.

Like many other ailments, backaches may be aggravated by emotional tension or anxiety. Treatment of backache varies with the cause. When it's due to strain, usually rest, heat and a pain reliever will help. Massage, used in moderation, may help relieve discomfort. Your doctor also may recommend exercises to strengthen the muscles of the back and improve posture.

# Acne L'an Be ireate d

Acne is a common skin condition that afflicts most people during the teen years, sometimes into the 20s.

The Texas Medical Association points out that something can done about acne. Waiting "outgrow" acne can be a to serious mistake. Treatment can improve appearance and minimize the problem of permanent scars.

Acne consists of blackheads, whiteheads, pimples and sometimes small boils. It appears most often on the face, but often also shows up on the back, chest, shoulders and neck.

Even though treatment includes washing frequently with mild soap and warm water, acne is not a disease of dirt. It begins under the skin, not on top of it. Acne also is not primarily a dietary disease, but some patients find that certain foods, particularly chocolate and fats, make their acne worse. However, following the strictest diet will not, by itself, clear the skin.

Lotions and creams available at the drugstore may help somewhat. It's important to read the directions on the label and follow them carefully. If the skin becomes irritated, stop using the lotion.

Medicated preparations are available to cover the blemishes. Non-oily cosmetics usually are safer. All cosmetics should be removed at bedtime.

If acne persists despite good cleaning and proper use of lotions and creams, the physician may be able to help. He may prescribe a preparation to apply

to the skin to reduce oiliness

and produce mild peeling. He may open the inflamed lesions and remove some of the blackheads. He most certainly will warn against picking, scratching,

perienced more often in school situations, the other forms of lice also are prevalent in our society.

While lack of cleanlinest may contribute to the spread of lice. it is possible for anyone to become infested.

Crab lice are very sluggish and dependent on man, dying within 24 hours of removal from the host. An infestation will spread slowly through a group of individuals such a ship's crew or commune residents. They are spread chiefly by sexual contact, but often are acquired by such other means as infested toilet seats or beds and by close personal contact. Body lice infest the clothing

of man, particularly undergarments next to the skin, They are also known to wander about extensively. The habit of living mainly on clothing, and traveling to the skin for nourishment, has restricted body lice in civilized communities to a small minority of people who seldom wash or change their clothes. All forms of lice may be found on clothing, however. The head louse attaches its nits (or eggs) to human hair. the nits resembling a stubby branch. The nit is cemented at an oblique angle, and this is helpful in distinguishing it from foreign substances in the hair. The eggs, incubated by body heat, hatch in about a week. The louse nymphs undergo three growth states requiring eight to nine days. Sexual maturity is reached in approximately two weeks.

While the presence of lice may be noted by the itching, the first visible signs of infestation may be the nits attached to the hair. Head lice and their nits usually are found in the hair behind the ears and along the nape of the neck. The eggs may be seen in clusters along the hair. However, it's possible that some other foreign substance such as globules of hair spray may be confused with nits. This has happened. Also, some investigators have observed that these nodules, which will slip up and down on the hair shaft. are mistaken for nits. State Health Department auth-

case. They resist water and ordinary soap and water.

Bathing or washing your hair at temperatures you can tolerate won't kill out the head lice. Some may wash off, however, but the nits will stay alive and

hatch out. Killing off head lice may turn into a family affair. If one person has head lice, the entire family needs to be treated at the same time. To rid household articles of lice, clothing, bedding, towels and washcloths should be laundered frequently in hot water. Washable head gear also should be laundered at the same time. Combs and other hair-styling articles need thorough and fre-

quent cleaning, and the home should receive a thorough vaccuuming, including the bathroom. Personal hygiene, frequent

bathing and shampooing of hair are very important in preventing the establishment or re-establishment of lice. But if you're infested, you'll

need a louse-killing insecticide shampoo to rid yourself of them. These are available at drug stores. Your family physician may prescribe one, or you may receive the names of these products from your school nurse or public health clinic. Most drug stores have two or three brands in lotion, cream, gel or shampoo form.

It is important in treatment to follow the directions closely and continue the treatment for the prescribed time. Remember, you're dealing not only with lice but their eggs as well. Dead nits may be removed from the hair with a fine comb following

proper treatment, which dissolves the tough cement binding the nit to the hair. In a bulletin, "Twenty-three Most Frequently Asked Questions About Lice," the State Health Department gives some valuable hints on dealing with lice. For instance, it states that lice seldom live longer than 48 hours

'75 License Plates "Good For 5 Years

A total of 35, 096 sets of 1975 license plates are stored at the Lamb County Courthouse awaiting distribution starting February 1 of the new year. And when you get your 1975

plate and number, you'll keep it for five years unless you change cars. The coming year is the first year of the five-year license plate plan.

The 1975 plates are the usual size. But for the next four years, motorists will receive small plastic-type stickers instead of new license plates. Each year one of the stickers will be affixed to the corner of the original plate.

The plan is an economy move, but not for drivers. Those little plastic stickers will still cost as

much as a new plate. Tax assessor-collector Herbert Dunn said it is estimated that Texas will save about \$3 million a year due to the stickers plus the fact that the plan will mean additonal state revenue. This is because Texas has contracted to make license plates for other states since Texas plates will not have to be manufactured during the four-year period.







Along with the growing concern about the safety of drink-

> ing water, said Marx, are reports that chlorination of water supplies may be a source of hazardous compounds. Chlorine destroys bacteria, such as those causing cholera and typhoid, but it may also react with hydrocarbons in the water to form their chlorinated derivatives. These derivatives are generally thought to be more carcinogenic than the parent hydrocarbons. Russell Train, administrator of the EPA, has ordered a nationwide survey of water supplies to be conducted in several cities and preliminary results should e available in three to five months. In the second phase of the EPA study, investigators will attempt to discover and eliminate sources of contamination and remove existing contaminants from water supplies. Evaluating the seriousness of the problem will be difficult. At present, compounds are screened for their carcinogenicity in animals, but their effect on man is uncertain. An additional complication is whether or not there is a threshold concentration below which a carcinogen has no effect. Further, chemicals in mixtures may interact with one another to enchance or diminish their capacity to cause cancer. Des-

pite these uncertainties, Marx explains, most investigators

would prefer to minimize or

eliminate human exposure.


