

The foregoing con-stitutional amendment shall be ubmitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment to permit mu-nicipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-sup-ported entities located with in hospital districts to par-ticipate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or op-eration of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services. "AGAINST the constitu-

tional amendment to permit municipalities, other politi-cal subdivisions, and statesupported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establish-ment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

Installment **Credit Use** Soars Upward

College Station -- Who uses installment credit? A popular re-ply is, "Who doesn't!" But ply is, "Who doesn't!" But Wanda Meyer, Extension home management specialist with Texas A&M University, reports figures indicating that some people are using it more than others.

Installment credit increased \$8 billion in 1965, according to the Survey Research Center at the University of Michigan. Mrs. Meyer explains that the major reason for this increase is a change in behavior on the part of people who can best af-ford to pay their debts. Early in 1965, only 32 percent of families with \$15,000 or

more annual income owed installment debt, and only 11 percent owed in excess of \$2,000 Early this year, 47 percent of this income group owed install-ment debt, and 19 percent owed in excess of \$2,000. Of those receiving \$3,000 income or less,

L. old owed installment debt, in contrast to 69 percent of those families in 1965. This drop in credit usage can be attributed mainly to the increase in the

Among other findings of the Michigan survey of consumer finances was that the median amount of consumer installment debt rose from \$780 in early 1965 to \$850 in early 1966 They also learned that the ratio of aggregate debt repayments to disposable personal income moved up only slightly from 1964 to 1965.





by Buddy C. Logsdon County Agent

Soil moisture should be adequate at the tasseling to silking stage to insure maximum corn yields, says Buddy Logsdon, Lamb County Agriculgural Agent. Actually, sufficient mois-ture should be available seven to ten days prior to tasseling and should be kept at or above 50 percent field capacity through the period of ear formation.

Furthermore, soil moisture is necessary throughout the growing season to prevent wilting, adds Logsdon. 
