

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


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Extension Announces Cotton Insect Reporting Plans For State

College Station- Better and more complete reporting of the cotton insect situation in Texas is the objective of the 1966 insect survey program,

For the purpose of reporting, the state has been divided into six areas, said Joe Rothe, state agricultural agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He added that the Service's area entomologists will serve as coordinators for the

program, Don Rummel, Lubbock, will Serve the High Plains area; Emory Boring, Vernon, the Rolling Plains; H. A. Turney, Denton, Blacklands, F. W. Parker, College Station, will coordinate the insect survey work in East and Central Texas; J. A. Deer, Weslaco, will do the same in South Texas and Charles Neeb, Fort Stockton, in the Trans-Pecos area.

Rothe added that each of the coordinators will make a week ly cotton insect situation report for his area for release on Tuesday of each week, He will also report to the state headquarters at College Station and a statewide report will be prepared,

The state agricultural agent said county agents have coop-erators in the counties who keepa close check on the cotton insect situation and report their findings to him, county reports are the basis for the area summaries and the

"We are attempting to make the reporting system more effective so that cotton producers can know with the least possible delay just what the insect situation is and where infestations are spreading," Rothe

The accessories actually amount to extra insurance. They can be bought as separate insurance, but family financial experts point out that money can be saved by purchasing a package -- a basic policy, plus extras, According to the Institute of Life Insurance, there are a number of typical areas a family might guard with a life insurance extra:

For example, a \$20,000 mortgage payable over 20 years can be insured with a decreasing term clause added to a basic policy. The benefit schedule for this type of extra is arranged to equal the unpaid balance on the mortgage in any given year. Should the omeowner die before the mort gage is paid, the insurance will provide his family with free and clear ownership of

A double indemnity clause protects against accidental death. In the event of fatal accident to the policy holder, iting with her sister and family, the clause would provide his

family with at least twice the face amount of his basic pol-

Another typical extra might provide for premiums to be waived when the bread-winner cannot work, Still another extra would provide for premiums to be paid from the cash values of a policy, should a payment be missed for any reason. This clause, of course, could apply only to a perma-nent policy which accumulates cash reserves.

One accessory is used quite frequently by people with growing families. It provides for extra monthly income during the time the children are still at home by attaching a de-creasing term policy to the basic insurance.

The simplest way to buy an extra protection is to have it it included when you buy your basic policy, sometimes after a medical exam,

Women Earn Fifth Of **Nation's Income**

College Station -- What is the worth of womanpower on jobs in the United States today? Women earn about one-fifth of the nation's income in the form of wages and salaries and from self-employment, says A&M Home Management Specialist Mrs. Doris Myers Their total earnings are esti-mated at about \$60 million, Of the over 25 million workwomen, the Department of Labor reports over 4,5 mil-lion were "professional workers, managers, officials and proprietors," Nevertheless, only 144,000 women in our country earn \$10,000 or more. Incidentally, the Social Security numbers at the end of 1964. Only 53,900,000, however, had earnings credited to their accounts,

Six out of 10 women have life insurance and altogether they owned policies amounting to about \$130 billion at the end of 1965. This ownership figure includes all women, whether full-time homemakers, employed, self-employed, or

Working women who have their own individual policies and annuties use them for the double purpose of protecting their dependents while build-ing funds for their own future. Working women also share increasingly in group life in-surance protection for their families, Present indications are that women own approximately \$40 billion of group life insurance,

In addition, women's contri-butions to business and industry are being recognized by the increasing amount of key-man and other business insurance on the lives of women, Several million working wo men are among the nearly 35 million workers belonging to various kinds of pension and retirement programs, exclusive of Social Security. Over half of non-farm workers are now enrolled in such retirement plans,

Wasting Irrigation Tail Water Comes to Law Enforcement Halt

practice as necessary as life itself. Many farmers in the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District have done an excellent job in con-serving water. Many others have failed to make any attempt at all to conserve water.
The day of habitually let-

ting irrigation tail water run down country road ditches is about over for farmers within the District.

The Board of Directors of the District has instructed the District personnel to eliminate, by one means or another, the loss of irrigation tail wa-

Several notices to stop wasting water have been issued in the area during the past few days. Court injunctions have been served to several land owners and tenants. If after receiving a notice to stop wasting water, a farmer continues to let water pour out of his fields, a court injunction will be served. Many have been given warning in previous years, but will not be warned

again. Studies in the area where tail water was escaping from the land, reveal that a quarter section will lose an average of 37 acre feet of water during the

irrigation season. This could easily irrigate about 18 acres of land for the entire irrigation

Valuable top soil is also lost when irrigation tail water is allowed to fill bar ditches and

If you are allowing your tail water to escape from property you own or control, you should begin now to make plans to eliminate this waste. You too, will soon receive a notice and if compliance is disrecarded, a court injunction will follow. The Water District is much more interested in motivating a desire in the minds and hearts of high plains land owners to want to conserve their life-giving resource than it is in law enforcement.

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
