Cancer Crusade Now In Progress County Goal \$3300

The National drive to raise funds to fight Cancer is now in progress and will continue until May 1.

Lamb County's quota is \$3300. The national goal is \$30,000,000. Mrs. C. W. Terry, Earth and Ralph Rudd, Springlake are local chairmen for the drive. Dr. D. J. Stafford, Littlefield, is county chairman.

This Cancer Crusade is conducted each spring, reaching a climax in April, which is designated Cancer Control Month by the President.

The theme is "Fight Cancer with a Checkup, and a Check." A checkup to protect you and your family, a check to help others. Some 2,000,000 volunteers join in this crusade over the United States, Alaska and the District of Columbia. More than 10,000 physicians and dentists serve Divisions as volunteers.

If cancer had been conquered only a dozen years ago, nearly 2,500,000 Americans would not have died. Last year 250,000 Americans died of cancer.

There are 800,000 Americans living who have been saved from cancer.

They are alive five years after treatment. An additional 700,000, treated within the last five years, will live to enter the ranks of those that are called saved. This means that today there are 1,500,000 Americans actually saved from Cancer, although 700,000 will not be formally counted until five years after treatment.

Here is how the money raised last year is being spent: 25 percent for research, 3 percent for medical grants and fellowships, 12 percent for professional and public education, service to cancer patients, statistical research, administration, fund-raising, etc., and 60 percent to the work of 60 divisions and 3,000 units throughout the 48 states and Alaska. It underwrites a great education program, utilizing every modern technique for influencing public attitudes.

The local chairman urges everyone to give something. Even though the amount be small, it is needed and will be used in this crusade to combat cancer.

City Paving Project To Get Underway In Near Future

scene is typical of all the City Streets after a shower. It was snapped on the corner of Fir Drive and 3rd St. Transportation is about at a standstill after each rain, except on our few paved streets.

City officials took action in a called meeting Tuesday to begin a paving project for the City of Earth.

Signing of the agreement forms is expected to begin almost immediately. City officials agreed to kick off this project and approved printed agreement forms for signatures of all property owners of Earth.

The directors of the Earth Chamber of Commerce is expected to call a meeting momentarily to begin canvassing the City's property owners for their signatures in connection with the Paving Project.

The Chamber is eager to start the ball rolling on this long overdue paving project for our city.

A discussion was held on the engineering, financing and contracts for this paving and improvements in the City. The parking problems on the Amherst Highway north of the caution light were also discussed.

The decision was reached to disperse with the services of a night watchman for the City. A. L. Kelly, who is now employed in that capacity, will receive thirty days notice of this action.

Effective June 1, hours will be assigned to A. E. Camp, City Marshal, subject to the approval of the council.

It was also voted to open the City dump grounds to the public once each month, with the first Thursday being designated.

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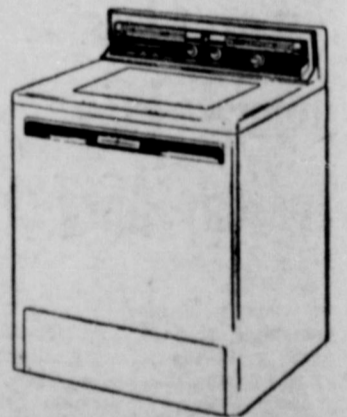

Fifteen To Take Scholarship Tests Tuesday at School

More than 15 students at the Springlake High School plan to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, John Lawrence principal announced today. The test will be administered at the High School at 9 a.m. Tuesday, April 29.

An estimated \$5 million in Merit Scholarships and other awards are at stake in the National competition, now beginning its fourth year. Some \$12 million in Merit Scholarships have been awarded

in the first three years of the program.

The National Merit Qualifying Test is a three hour measure of educational growth and aptitude. Emphasis is on broad intellectual skills and on understanding and ability to use what has been learned, rather than on sheer knowledge of facts.

The test results will be available at the beginning of the senior year, in time for use by seniors and their class advisors. The scores may also be used in many high schools to help students make decisions about college and the most appropriate courses to major in.

The test results will enable students to compare their score with other students across the nation.

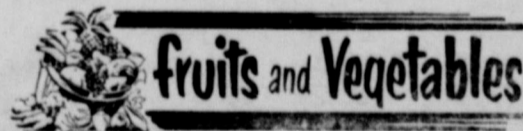

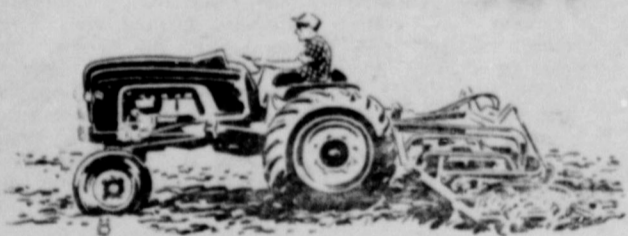
