

Texas First Utility Rate Control Board

AUSTIN-State Representative Joe Allen of Baytown believes that his bill to establish the Texas Telephone Commission is gaining support from local city givernments across the state. House bill #27 would create Texas' first such utility commission to act as a rate control board for all telephone franchises in the state.

"in recent weeks I have talked to several mayors across Texas to get their reaction to the bill's potential effects. They believe that the small and medium size cities are at the mercy of the local franchise when the telephone company wants a rate hike. They simply cannot afford a court fight to get a reduced rate, and even if

they could, it would be physically impossible for them to gather the data and statistics tobe as well prepared in court actions as the phone company's representatives. Even more unfortunate is that a court fight is virtually the only method of opposing price increases, "Representative Allen stated.

The bill sets up a 3 man commission, appointed by the Governor, to review a proposed rate increase, at the option of the community involved. The measure also creates the office omer complaints of telephone service, and customer questions about phone regulations this franchise service." and charges. But it will give Texas communities and telephone customers the chance for equitable treatment the opportunity to realize utility control, and the right to recourse when faced with


