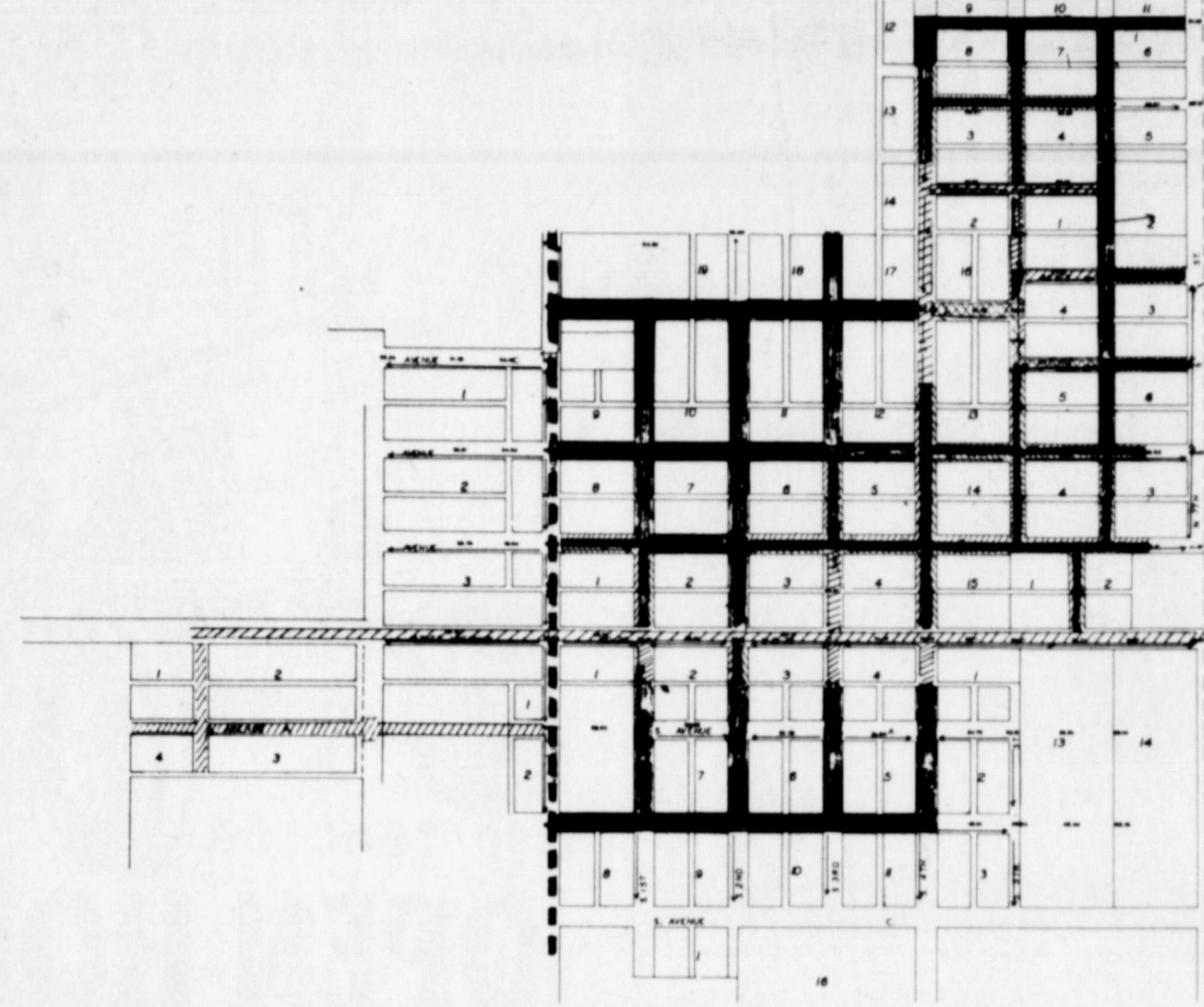

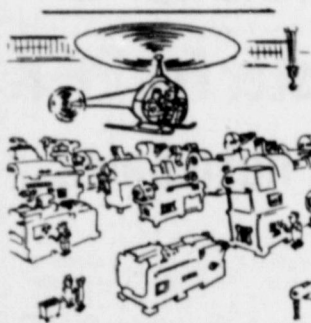

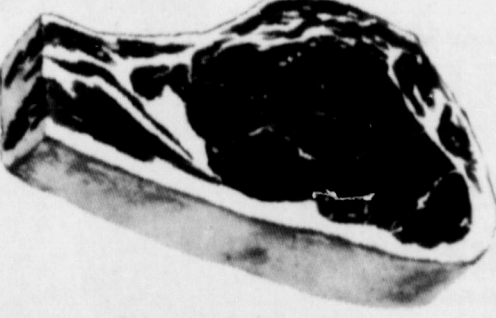

Portals (special)--"Optimism" probably best describes the attitude of football players at Eastern New Mexico University, heading into the second and final week of workouts before getting a taste of game action against the Sul Ross State Lobos September 17.

"I think we're going to be ready (for Sul Ross)," John Patterson declared. A 197-pound linebacker from Earth, Patterson observed that the Lobos from Alpine, Texas, will have the experience of one game under their belts as well as an extra week of practice before the meeting in Greyhound stadium. Another lineman who spent the summer getting into condition is George Harris, offensive guard from Pittsburgh, Pa. A trim 205 pounds this year after coming in at 240 a year ago, Harris explained, "I didn't overeat this summer and I spent a lot of time running."

How successful a season does Harris look for in 1966?

1967 Safety Inspection Now In Progress

Austin--Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety announced the 1967 vehicle inspection period has begun.

Garrison said that the new inspection period began on September 1 and will end on April 15, 1967 as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. The inspection period is the same as in previous years.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1967, each of the five and one half million Texas registered vehicles will have to secure the new green and white 1967 inspection sticker from one of the 5500 official inspection stations," he said.

Garrison pointed out that Texas inspection stations can be identified by the official vehicle inspection station sign displayed at each station.

Garrison suggested that if motorists have their vehicles inspected during the routine visits to garages for ordinary maintenance, the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection will be eliminated.

In announcing the new inspection period, the Public Safety Director pointed out that vehicle defects contributing to traffic accidents in Texas during 1965 were the fewest yet experienced since the inspection program began in 1951.

Goal for Farmers is Full Income Parity

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman continuing on his theme of increasing markets for grain sorghum and plans for reduction of Cotton surplus, said Thursday, "the administration's long range goal is to achieve full parity of income for the adequately sized family farming operation by 1970."

As guest speaker at the 10th annual Field Day of the High Plains Research Foundation, Freeman addressed a crowd of approximately 4,500 persons. Freeman told his listening audience that, "Improvements in net farm income won't be good enough until the Farmers of America get what they rightfully deserve. Full parity of income with their city cousins." This brought a round of applause, interrupting his address momentarily, then he added, "And they haven't gotten it yet."

Freeman stated that the milo outlook had brightened greatly by the increase in domestic use and exports and by the reduction of all feed grain surplus to a meaningful reserve level. Grain sorghum exports, Freeman said, in the current market season are almost 2 1/2 times greater than in the early 1960's. He assured grain producers that foreign buyers would continue to buy Texas grain for their feed needs. He went on to explain that as the present surplus decreases, an increase of export needs for sorghum will come directly from the producer and from other free market stocks, rather than from commodity credit cooperation holdings.

"In 1965," he said, "cash receipts and feed grain program benefits for grain sorghum producers in Texas topped the \$350 million mark, more than double the 1960 level."

"With the future of exports brighter than ever and with domestic use continuing to increase, farm income from grain sorghum promises to continue strong," he added.

"It extends to cotton the same type of price support and acreage diversion that has worked so effectively for wheat and feed grains," he said, adding that the potential surplus reduction "exceeded our most optimistic estimates when this

West Texans Plea for Inclusion In Water Board Study Plan

Virtually every West Texas County was represented, and appeared before the Texas Water Planning Board as it concluded hearings Friday in Lubbock to request that the West Texas Area be included in the state wide water study plan. The fight to get the West Texas and High Plains area included in the plan was spearheaded by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and members of the Plains Cotton Growers Association, who told board members, "without water, the productive West Texas area would die."

The Lubbock meeting ended the hearing that has been in progress for several months, as members of the Water Board covered each section of the state, compiling information of water needs of the states, in the attempt to reach a workable plan for state future water needs.

During the day-long meeting, Board members heard the water story from area citizens. John Ben Sheppard, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has or will adopt a dog-in-the-manger attitude, because we believe in a water plan, but we cannot and will not stand idly by and let out, shut out or treated like a step child. We will fight by every means at our command unless West Texas is included in a practical, far sighted and courageous manner.

"Our sincere interest in your deliberations and report extends not only to a fair share and municipal and industrial water supply to permit necessary development and expansion, but we strongly feel that in order to provide food and fiber for our future generations, it

is imperative that West Texas also have sufficient irrigation water.

Sheppard's comments on the stand of the WTCC were endorsed by almost every community at the meeting as representatives rose from their seats on the floor to indicate they were behind the Chamber body in encouraging the water study be extended to include the West Texas area.

Joe Pate, Jr., chairman of the Plains Cotton Growers water committee told the group, "The 25,000 member PCG organization considered water as the most priceless commodity on the Plains, and knew adequate water sources must be found, or developed to maintain the area's economy."

Pate continued his comments by stating that in 1964 the High Plains had 5 and 3/4 million acres under irrigation, and without supplemental water, it is expected to have only 2 1/2 million acres under irrigation by the year 2020--a decline of 3 1/4 million acres, a drop of almost 57 percent. Proof was soon forthcoming that the testimony of these witnesses and the presence of state representatives and senators was having telling effect upon the committee. Joe G. Moore, Executive Director of the Texas Water Development Board, announced Friday that new studies aimed at determining the feasibility of importing irrigation water into West Texas will be initiated as rapidly as available staff and funds will permit. Four alternative sources of water for the West Texas area will be investigated.

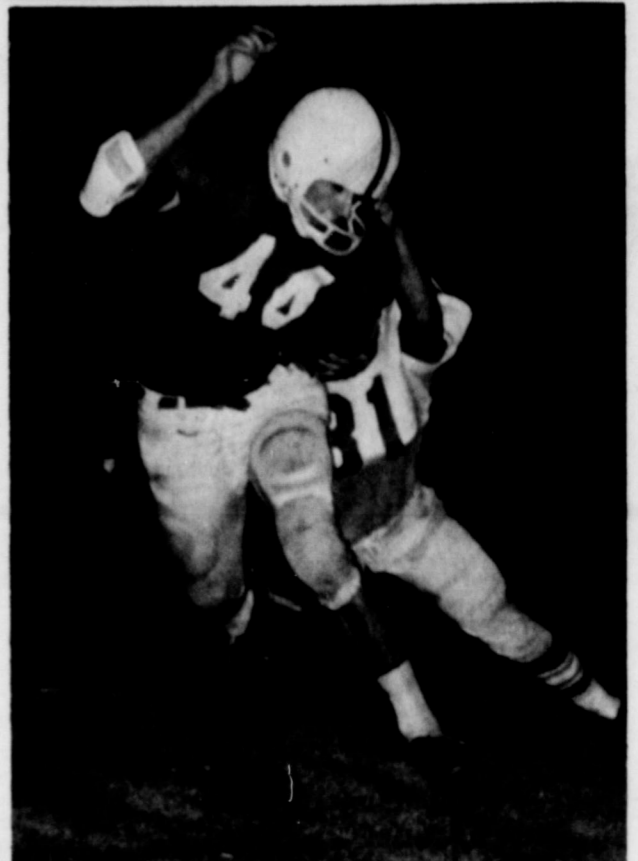

Texans Eye Soybeans As Additional Cash Crop

Halfway--Interest in soybeans, as an additional cash crop, has increased tremendously throughout Texas in 1966. In response to urgent requests from the cottonseed oil industry and other, the High Plains Research Foundation has expanded its soybean Farm Centered Research program throughout Texas.

Four varieties and eight experimental strains of soybeans have been planted by farmers in cooperation with foundation staff in this new State-wide program. The released varieties planted are the Hinn and Patterson, bred by the Foundation, along with the Hill and Clark 63. Eight experimental strains included in the tests were developed in the soybean breeding program at the High Plains Research Foundation. These twelve strains and varieties of soybeans were planted on both irrigated and dryland areas.

Thousands of veterans eligible for educational assistance will enroll in schools throughout Texas during the next few days according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office, Waco.

Coker advised eligible veterans to submit their applications immediately after they determine that they will be accepted by the school of their choice.

Veterans who are eligible for

this benefit must have served with the Armed Forces after January 31, 1955, and must have served on continuous active duty for a period of at least 181 days, any part of which was after January 31, 1955, and must have been discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable. A veteran who served less than 181 days may be eligible if he was discharged or released because of a service-connected disability.
