



current cotton program has made the national allotment meaningless anyway, so its size alone should be no argument against this approach, However, with a 23, 1 million acre allotment farmers would be diverting over 9 million acres instead of the 4, 85 million acres

diverted this year. And if the diversion rate were left unchanged, a sig-

nificant increase in the cost of the program would occur.

If the payment rate were reduced, farmer acreage choices would no longer be predictable.

And this is only one of many complications that arise in considering this or the other alter-

So it is still anybody's guess as to what changes will be made to increase production. Only two things are for certain. First, there will be a lot of head scratching and wrangling before the decision is made. Second, whatever the decision, it won't be to the liking of all cotton belt areas or to all segments of the industry.





## Fed Cattle In Texas 14% Above Year Ago

Cattle being fed for slaughter market in Texas, on July 1, to-taled 584,000 head, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock

reporting service.
This is 14 percent above the 512,000 head on feed this same time a year ago, and one per-cent above the 581,000 head on feed a month earlier, on June 1. However, the percentage fell 11 percent below the April figure of 653,000 head.

There are at present 277 "large" feed lots in the state. These 277 feed lots have a combined capacity of 1,890,625

However, on July 1 only 195 of the lots had cattle on feed, These held 550,000 cattle, showing about 50% occupancy.
The "small" feed lots held 34,000 head, which is 6 percent of the total number on feed on

Steers accounted for 305,000 of the cattle on feed. Heifers represented 278,000 head and 584,000 on feed, the weight distribution us as follows: 21 35 percent 500-699 pounds; 27 during June.

A statement by the Commission said: "Mr. Greer's long association with highway matters -- particularly at the nation al level--makes it imperative that we have the benefit of his experience in the critical months ahead.

"This is a period of great change, Highways will play an important role in development of the new Department of Transportation, Highway programs to follow completion of the Interstate Highway system are being formulated. Legislation affecting every highway department and every highway program throughout the nation




