No Candidates Have Filed For City Posts

Approximately 25 men in the area were present at a called meeting Saturday night in the Earth Community Room at 7:30.

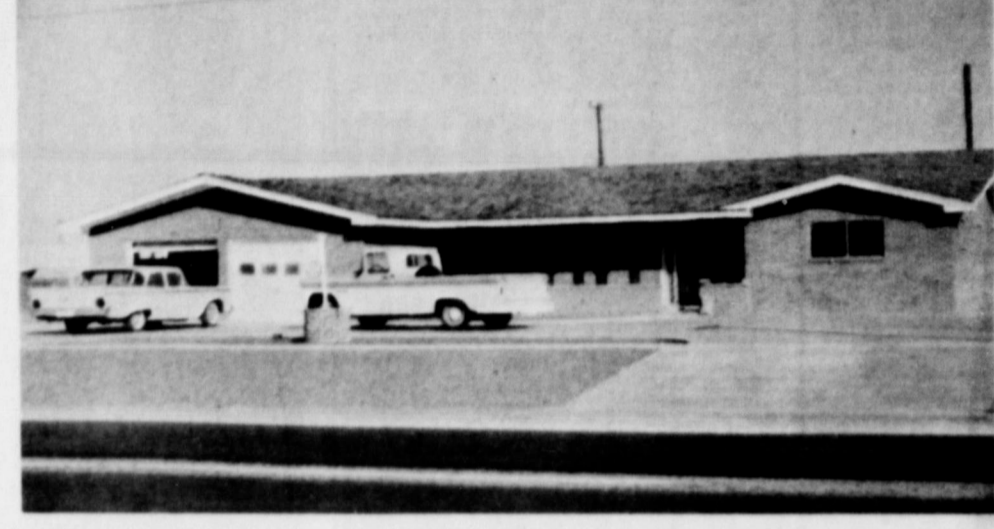
Purpose of the meeting was to discuss the possibility of drafting V. J. Smith, Jr. as a candidate for sheriff in the forthcoming election.

1963 Worst Year In Traffic History For Accidents

"Old man 1963" has quietly slipped away into the past forever. His evident scenes, however, will remain with us till the end of time. Due to the scars left beside the roadway, and the hospitals, at the morgue and in the cemeteries the year 1963 will be remembered as the worst year in traffic history.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 16 accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of December according to Sergeant D. A. Lawson, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the calendar year 1963 shows a total of 129 crashes resulting in 7 persons killed, 84 injured and an estimated property damage of \$101,006.00.

"When the final reports are tabulated we will find that more people were killed in Texas traffic accidents during 1963 than in any previous year"

The Sergeant stated, The final count is expected to be about ten per cent more than the 2,421 traffic deaths of 1962.

The Patrol Supervisor reminded about all motorists to think about the more than 5,000 people that have been killed in Texas traffic accidents in the last 2 years, and to join the drive to reverse this alarming trend of death by strict observance of the traffic laws and rules of safe driving.

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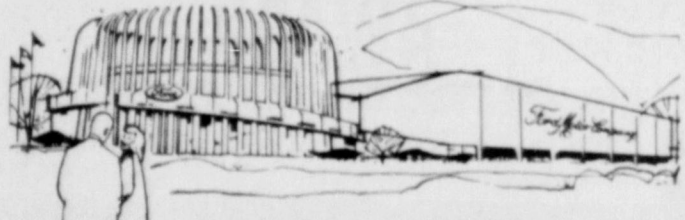

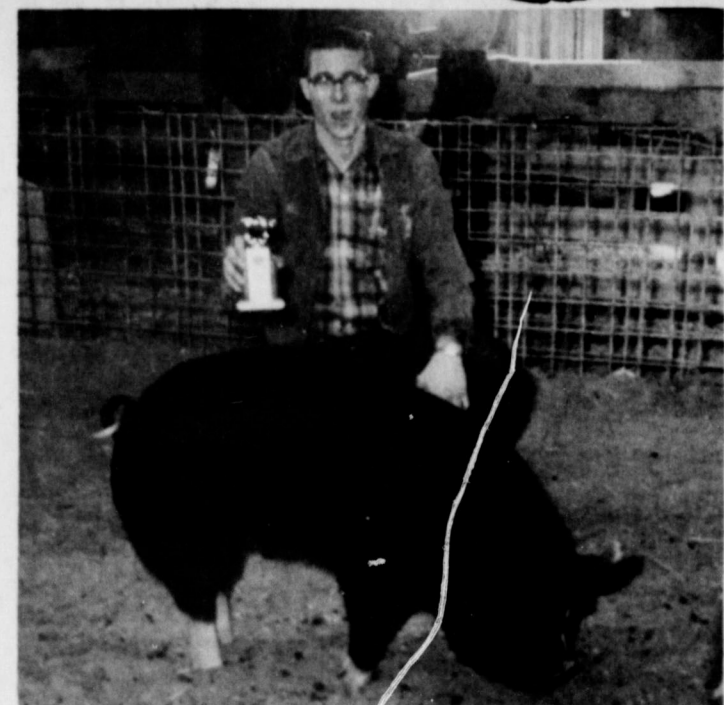

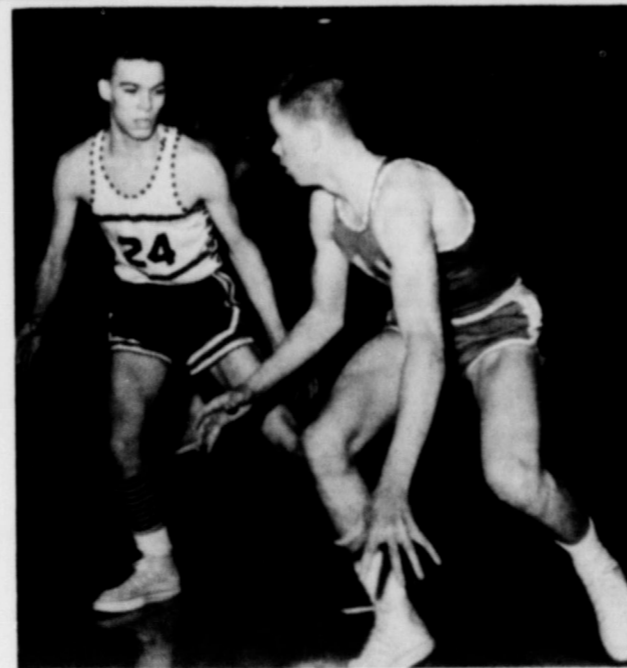

Nearly \$200,000 has been paid to Lamb County farmers so far this season by USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation to cover crop losses caused by hail and excessive moisture in June and July.

In announcing the figure today, FCIC Texas-New Mexico State Director Ben A. Jordan, Jr. added that to date three quarters of all claims filed in the county have been paid. Advanced reports indicate that the total figure may reach \$250,000 Jordan said. This is money that would have been lost to the economy of the area if these farmers had not been wise enough to protect their crop investment through Federal Crop Insurance, and that such money lost to an area can cause tremendous hardship to everyone, farmers, businessmen, storekeepers, and everyone holding a job of any kind. We can only hope that more insurable farmers will become policyholders.

He added, FCIC representatives are accepting applications now in this county for a limited time to cover the 1964 cotton and grain sorghum crops, and that information is available at the FCIC district office in Lubbock.

The state director also said that the biggest values in crop insurance are constant protection and constant peace of mind.
