Fire boys are asking all interested people to make a contribution toward helping to finance the purchase of this Portable Resuscitator, which is badly needed in this community. The cost is \$645, which is very little money in comparison to its usefulness to our fast moving community.

I for one am completely sold on this gadget, I have seen it in operation back in Oklahoma, when firemen there worked over my mother for over an hour following a severe heart attack.

Finally she was able to be placed in an ambulance and rushed to the hospital where she remained for approximately six weeks.

That was 10 years ago, my children have enjoyed having a loving grandmother these past ten years, and need I say more.

Two Crashes

Wednesday Total About \$1800 Loss

A grinding collision between two cars occurred Wednesday about noon at the intersection of Fir St. and Highway 70.

Driving a 1961 Mercury was Mrs. Avis Crawford, Springlake and the driver of the other car a 1961 Sunbeam coach was Capt. Lyon Armstrong, Walker Air Force Base at Roswell.

Mrs. Crawford was going south on Fir St. and attempted to make a left turn onto Highway 70, pulled out in front of Armstrong who was traveling west on Highway 70. The front of Armstrong's compact car struck the left side of the Crawford car.

Armstrong was injured and was taken to Dr. Holt's office where he received treatment. He was then transferred to Cannon Air Force Base Hospital for further treatment.

A ticket was issued to Mrs. Crawford for failure to yield right-of-way and Armstrong was issued a ticket for excessive speed.

Investigating the accident was Officer H. J. Jackson of the Highway Patrol from Littlefield, assisted by J. D. Mackey, Earth City Marshal. Damage to the two automobiles totaled approximately \$1200.

The second accident took place around noon also.

Jimmy Lynn Stockstill, student of Earth was involved in a one car accident three miles northwest of Earth on a dirt road.

Driving a car belonging to his mother, Mrs. Alma Stockstill, and going west on the country road, Jimmy lost control at a dip in the intersection, and the car turned over 1/2 time, ending up on its top facing north. The careening car clipped the edge of a telephone pole on the north side of the road.

Patrolman H. J. Jackson investigated and reports that excessive speed caused the accident, and that damage to the car was approximately \$600.

More Business Firms To Close This Year For Memorial Day

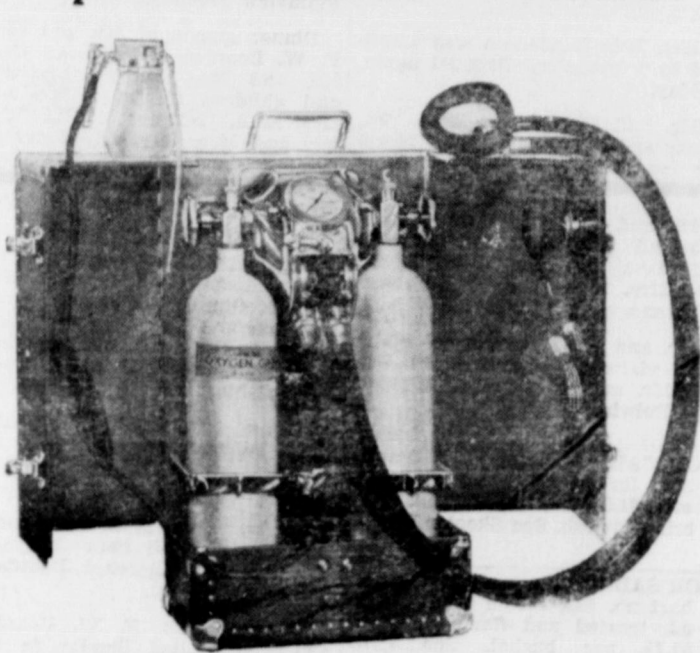
A number of local businesses will be closed for Memorial Day May 30.

Motorists Warned Of Driving Over Fire Hose, To Enforce Law

A number of motorists violated the law last week by driving across the fire hose which were under full pressure and connected to fire hydrants in the process of filling the swimming pool.

Severe damage to a fire hose can develop when automobiles are allowed to pass over them.

Firemen explained, a weak spot could develop in the fire hose and go unnoticed until later when under full pressure while putting out

a fire it could burst and hinder the firemen in the attempt in their attempt at putting out a blaze, causing further loss of property.

This act of passing over fire hose is a violation of the State Law, punishable by a fine of not less than \$50.

Since several drivers violated this law it has become necessary to enforce it. According to Deputy V. L. Smith Jr. this law will be enforced hereafter.

Due to Howard Cummings, finance chairman for Springlake being on vacation, a financial report from Spriglake was not available at press time.

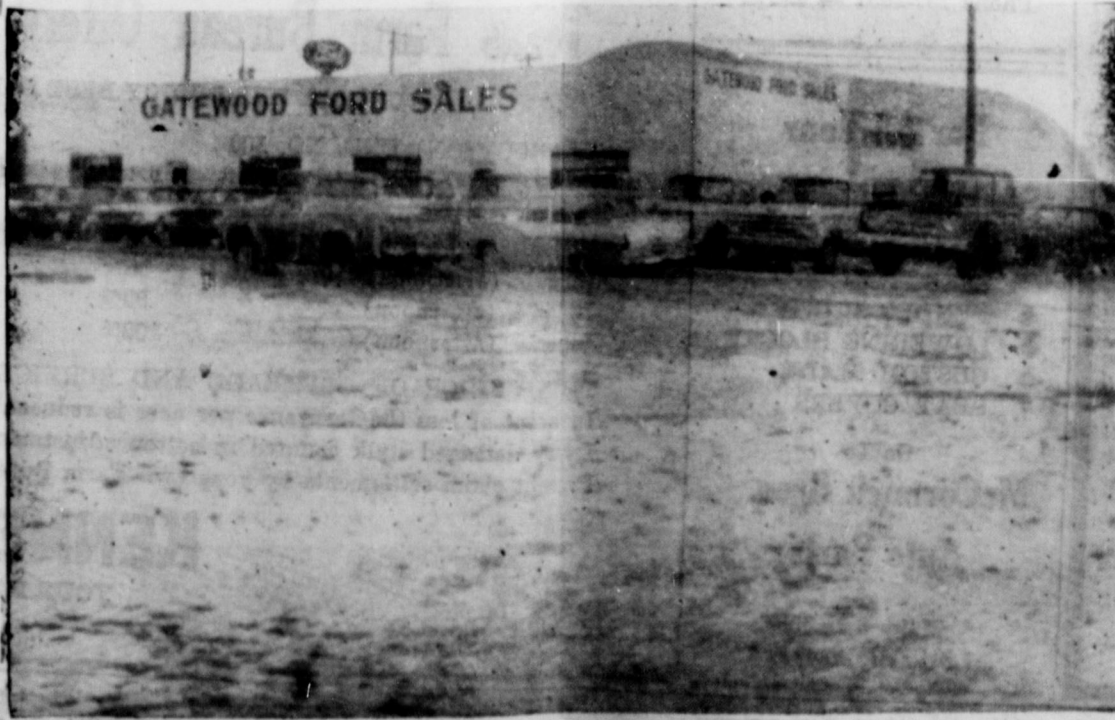

- 1/2 C oleo - melted
- 1 C thick buttermilk
- 2 t vanilla flavoring
- 1 t lemon flavoring

Combine sugar and flour. Beat eggs thoroughly and add sugar, flour mixture. Add melted oleo and buttermilk; mix well. Add flavorings.

Pour into chilled 9-inch unbaked pastry shell. Preheat oven and bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes; reduce temperature to 350 degrees and bake 35 minutes longer without opening door. After pie is cooled, a meringue may be added if desired.

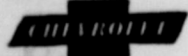

Dear Editor:

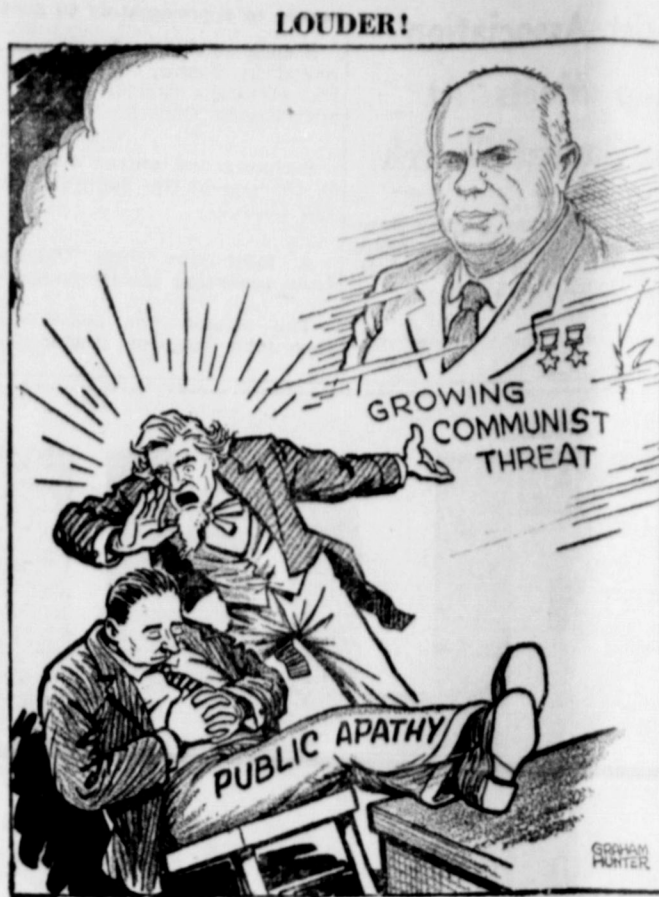
We thought your readers might be interested in hearing about our trip to the Democratic and the Republican Conventions in Littlefield Saturday, May 12.

Others may have attended a Democratic Convention, but for someone new it was an experience of utter amazement. It seems almost impossible to believe that the average person elected as del-

egate to a Democratic Convention could have so little voice in their very own County. Our husbands, John W. West and Allen Haley were duly elected delegates from Pleasant Valley to this convention.

We didn't realize that the convention would be so pre-arranged, if so we could have saved traveling 35 miles for this 25 minute convention (which included a 17 minute recess).

The only resolution presented and adopted were to vote the Unit Rule and to vote a straight Dem-



ocratic ticket. We were told that the resolutions sent in from the different precincts were ignored as they might be controversial!

Why do the precincts hold conventions if their delegates and their resolutions are ignored? And discussions will not be tolerated!

They stated the delegates were selected because they knew these particular people always voted a straight Democratic ticket and always would continue to do so; we wondered how they could possibly know this as we are supposed to have a secret ballot.

When the nominating and resolutions committees gave their reports they closed with a motion that their reports be accepted as read, a second was made without the chair recognizing any nominations or resolutions from the floor. Shouldn't all the delegates have a choice of whom they would prefer to speak for them at a State Convention?

It seemed that all Democrats in Lamb County were perfectly satisfied with all their party policies and didn't need to send a single resolution to the State Convention from the Lamb County people.

After feeling completely unnecessary and unappreciated at our

own convention it was such a pleasure to be so cordially welcomed as observers when we attended the Republican Convention.

Each of their delegates were sincerely welcomed and invited to speak their opinion, not one, but many times during the convention. Their County Convention lasted nearly an hour and a half too because everything had not been arranged and the committees had to meet there and make up their list of resolutions and nominees. And after the convention we had come from it was nearly unbelievable to have every resolution from the precincts presented and voted on one at a time and also to any others from the floor. Another thing was that every delegate was asked to fill in a slip of paper saying if they would be delegate to the State Convention. Again to our utter amazement every single delegate would have a chance to be selected. Also when the nominations committee gave their list of delegates and alternates the chairman asked for any other nominations from the floor.

The same thing with resolutions and suggestions from the delegates were actually used.
