Research information now in dicates that a good hen may have a bad month yet still come back to high production at less cost than it would take to fill her cage with a replacement. A culling experiment was conducted in the cage layer unit at the Ralston Purina Resarch Farm near Gray Summit, Missouri, involving 2000 birds The cages were all filled at the same time with pullets grown in the same flocks. The birds were of a heavy producing strain. After they had been in production two months, 1000 were culled under the 14-day system, while no cullall the minerals and vitamins ing was done in the other 1000. needed to make a fine, healthy

group for the first several months of production. In other words, it appeared that good layers might drop below 50 per cent production for 14 days, but come back to good production inside of 28 days.

This culling work, which is still continuing, emphasizes that good culling is still vital to egg profits. It has also resulted in Purina's recommendation to cull birds that drop below 50 per cent production for at least 28 days, rather than 14. Even then a previous record of extra days grace for the hen.


