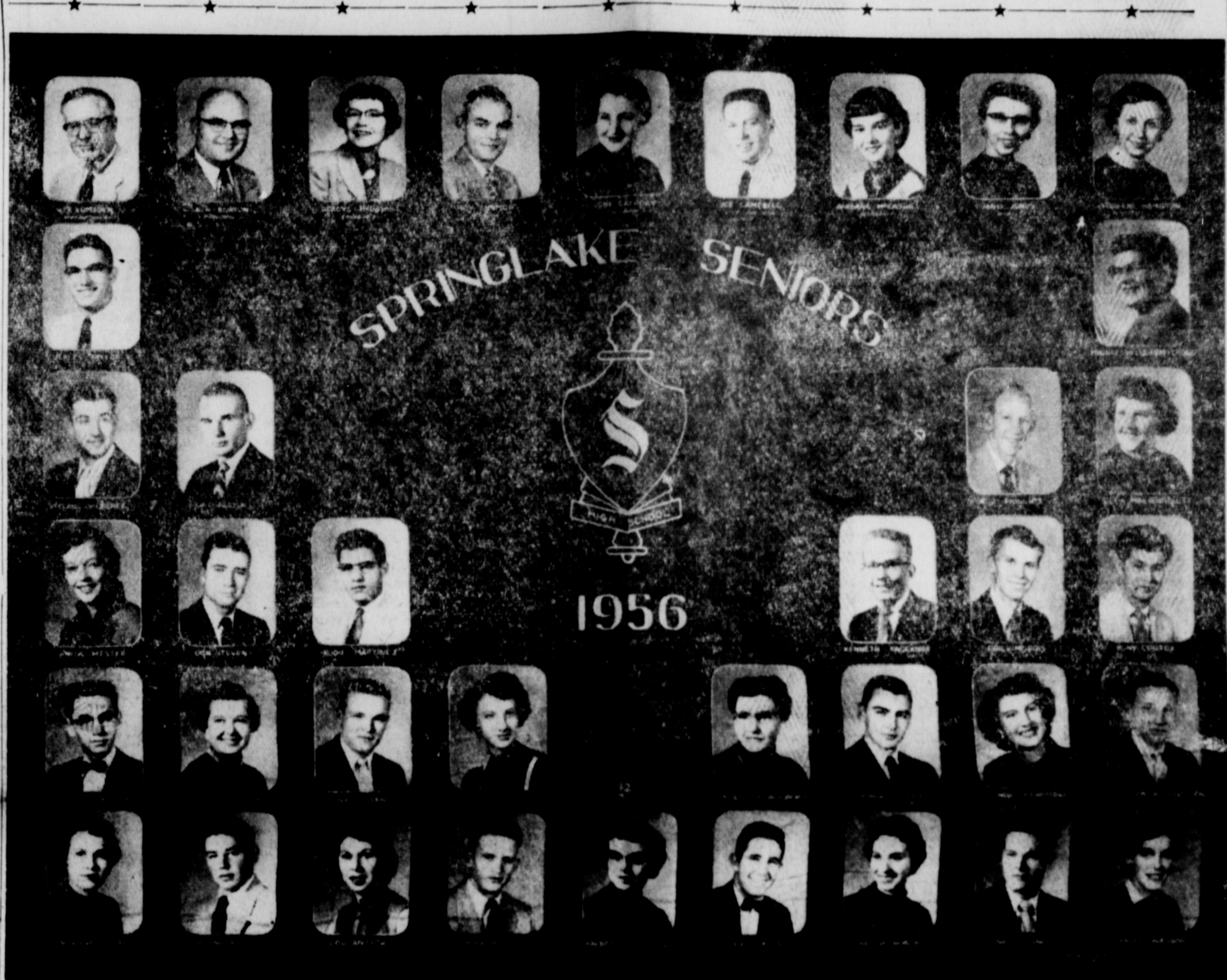

LOCAL MAN BURNS TO DEATH EARLY MONDAY MORNING

Henry Borden Doughty, 46, a retired dry cleaner, was found burned to death in his home here early Monday morning after Earth firemen extinguished a 5 o'clock raging fire which badly damaged the five-room house.

The victim was alone in the house, having parked his automobile in the driveway some time Sunday evening.

The charred body was found on the floor lying just inside the man's closed bedroom door as though he had attempted to escape the flames which originated in the bedroom.

Evidently the foam-rubber mattress upon which Mr. Doughty was sleeping had been smoldering several hours as many families north of the Doughty residence reported having detected a rubber burning odor in their homes at 1 a. m. and various times thereafter.

A traveling salesman spotted the flames licking out from under the roof as he drove along Highway 70 and reported the tragic incident to the sleeping little town.

Mr. Doughty shared his furnished home with Mr. and Mrs. Bernie Sarradet who were in Littlefield where Mr. Sarradet has been hospitalized & in a serious condition for several days. Sarradet is an auto salesman and he is Home Ec teacher in the local school.

Mr. Doughty had visited Sarradet in Littlefield Sunday afternoon and was seen in Earth late while operating Earth's only dry cleaning plant.

"Henry", as he was known to everyone, came here as a young man in 1926 when he began farming and later started his tailor shop after marriage.

Clothing of the Sarradet couple was almost all destroyed by the fire.

Funeral services were held at 4:30 p. m. Tuesday in the First Methodist Church here with Rev. Eugene Matthews, pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Hugh Blaylock of Friona and Rev. Cecil Meadows, pastor of the local Baptist Church.

Interment was in Springlake Cemetery under the direction of Lemons Funeral Home, Plainview.

Survivors include the two daughters, Mrs. Edwin O'Hair

and Mrs. Jack Angeley, both of Earth; the mother, Mrs. Janis Ter that day.

Doughty's wife, Edna, predeceased her husband in death almost two year ago. The couple married here in 1929 and reared two daughters, Jeanette and Wy-Doughty of Martha, Okla., and seven sisters, Mrs. Sam Cearley and Mrs. Kenneth Cowley, both of Earth, Mrs. R. S. Brown and Mrs. Lawrence Edwards, both of Tulsa, Okla., Mrs. Bill Graham and Mrs. Jack McNeely, both of McAllen; and four grandchildren.

Agriculture Man Gives New Ways Of Controlling Johnson Grass Problem

College Station has announced through Winters Fertilizer Company of Earth that H. E. Rea of Texas A&M has good news for seedsmen and farmers.
 He has developed a combination of cultural practices and herbicidal treatment which makes Johnson grass control not only possible, but practical.
 "Choose the practice or combination of practices which fits your field and your pocketbook", he says. Here are his recommendations:
 Scattered crumps — five per cent infestation or less; use crown-oiling in cotton and corn — half naphtha, half diesel oil and a squirt to each crown, before grass is six inches tall.
 Large spots—six to 10 per cent infestation; use dalapon, spotting in cotton or dalapon, tea spotting in cotton and sorghums. For dalapon spotting in cotton, use 15 pounds dalapon, one and one-half pounds of dish-washing detergent and 75 gallons of water per acre. 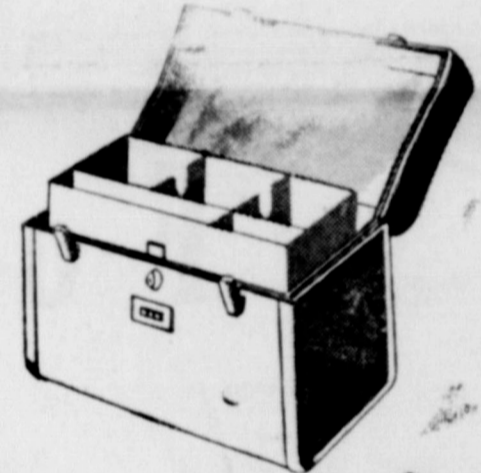

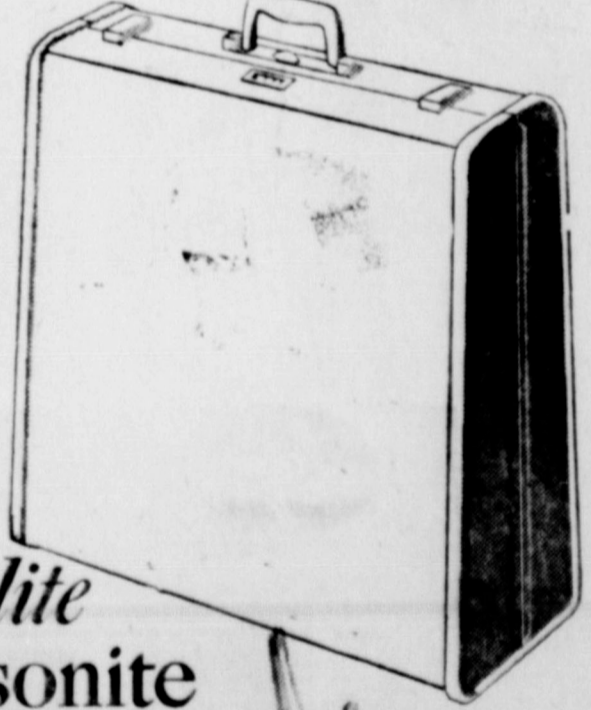
