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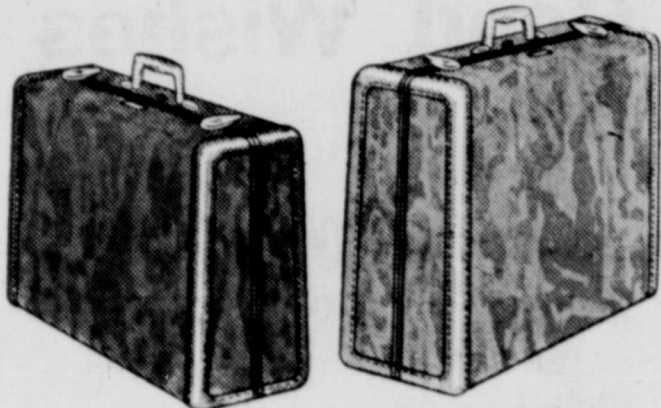

Before You Retire Make Inquiry For S. S. Payments Early

One of the goals of the Social Security Administration is to pay benefits as promptly as possible to those persons entitled to payments, John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock office stated today.

To do this, Hutton said, it is necessary for the person claiming benefits to make inquiry for payments at his local social security office. A worker should inquire for payments before he retires if he knows he will be retiring on a certain date. This will give the Social Security Administration and the person claiming benefits time to get the information and evidence

together to establish his rights to the payments before the time his first check is due.

Generally, evidence will be required to prove the age of the retired person and the age of his wife. This may be a birth certificate or other record of age that is old and reliable. Also, evidence of the worker's earnings in the taxable year that ended before he plans to retire is necessary. This may be a copy of the income tax return for self-employed persons or the W-2 forms for wage earners.

Mr. Hutton again stressed that for prompt payment of your first social security check "inquire before you retire" at your Lubbock social security office.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Earth on May 13, 1959 at 1:00 p.m. at the Citizens State Bank.

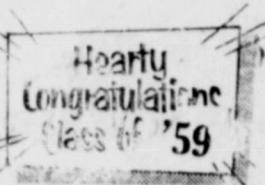

The farmers of Lamb County carried out ACP practices on their farms in 1958 for a total of \$153,319.54 assistance from the Federal Government. The amount was paid to 860 farmers in the county who carried out one of more of the Conservation methods. The fol-

- A-2—Establishment of a permanent vegetable cover for soil protection - 87.0 acres - \$383.00.

- C-4—Constructing terraces to detain or control the flow of water - 97,129 feet - \$1700.00.
- C-5—Constructing diversion terraces to intercept runoff and divert excess water to protected outlets - 14,614 feet - \$731.00.

C-12—Reorganizing farm irrigation systems to conserve water and prevent erosion - 5,482 acres - \$61,319.00.

C-13—Leveling land for more efficient use of irrigation water to prevent erosion 76.0 acres - \$1822.

D-1—Establishing winter legumes - 198 acres - \$201.00.

D-2—Establishing summer legumes - 1,264 acres - \$865.00.

E-3a—Surfacing subsoil - 16,919.0 acres - \$35,753.00.

E-3b—Listing and chiseling - 49887.0 acres - \$24,943.00.

E-3c—Control of Bindweed - 12.0 acres - \$1770.00.

F-10—Application of cotton burrs - 5734.0 acres - \$17,202.00.

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Announce Program For More And Better Profits In Swine

College Station—"Good profits can be realized by Texas swine producers in 1959 if their operations are made more efficient and grain prices remain favorable," said T. D. Tanksley, Jr., extension animal husbandman, in commenting on the program for the upcoming Swine Short Course scheduled for Texas A & M College, April 6-7.

The specialist said that swine production in Texas in 1958 was 35 percent higher than in 1957—this is much higher than the national increase—but despite a forecast of much lower prices this fall, he believed that more efficient production of faster growing, meatier hogs would bring growers some profits. Major emphasis has been directed toward these production objectives on the short course program.

Two nationally known swine experts, Dr. J. L. Lush, geneticist, Iowa State College and Dr. C. E. Barnhart, professor in charge of swine, University of Kentucky, head the list of speakers. The geneticist will discuss the most practical breeding program for commercial swine producers. Dr. Barnhart will discuss the feeding and management of sows and gilts during gestation and also the care of sows and pigs from farrowing to weaning. The breeding at the University of Kentucky is one of the outstanding college herds in the nation.

The first sale of production tested boars in the southwest will be held as a part of the short course program. It will be held at the A&M Beef Cattle Center, beginning at 7:30 p.m. on April 6. Eight breeds will be represented in the sale. Hampshire, Duroc, Poland China, Spotted Poland China, Tamworth, Yorkshire and Montana No. 1.

On the afternoon of April 6, the Texas Swine Breeders Association will hold its annual meeting.

Tanksley said that local county agents and teachers of vocational agriculture can supply detailed information on the short course.

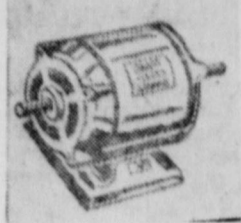
