



## Springlake Wolverines Drop First Conference Game In Two Years To Dimmitt Bobcats There Friday Night

The roof fell in on the Springlake Wolverines at Dimmitt Friday night, as they lost their first conference game in almost two years.

Dimmitt took the initial kickoff with Don Mobley taking the ball on the 10 yard line and returning it to the 27. Bobby Brock failed to gain on the first play from scrimmage. Edgar Dennis picked up 2 yards on second down, and Alton Whitworth lacked only inches of getting a first down on the next play. Quarterback Mobley decided to gamble on fourth down, and Dennis got two yards to make the gamble pay off. Dennis then gained 8 yards on 2 plays and Brock got 5 more and a first down on the 33. On the following play Dwayne Loudder stole the ball for Springlake on the 32 yd line, and the Wolverines were on the offense for the first time.

Loudder took the ball for 2 yards on first down. Quarterback Rex Loftis fumbled the hand-back from center, but recovered the ball for a 1 yard loss. With third down and 9 yards to go, Loftis faded back and chunked a pass to Loudder, who took the ball at Dimmitt 39 yard stripe. He was behind all defenders, but lost his footing and fell as he caught the ball.

Loudder failed to gain on first down, and a backfield-in-motion penalty set the Wolverines back to the 44. Again Loftis took to the air, hitting Seymour Evans with a jump pass for 9 yards. Loudder lost 2 and gained 5, but fell short of a first down and the Bobcats took over on their own

26 yard line. Brock got two yards through the line, but a fumble on the following play returned the ball to Springlake's possession on the Bobcats 35.

Donnie Clayton picked up 4 yards and Loudder got a first down with two thrusts at the line good for 7 yards. Don Watson failed to gain. Jimmy Hadaway, who had replaced Loftis at quarterback, gained 3 yards on a keeper. A pass from Hadaway to Loudder was dropped on the goal line. Watson blasted at the line, but got only one yd to put the ball barely inside the 20, where Dimmitt took over.

Dennis stabbed at the Wolverine line for 5 yards as the first quarter ended, with the score standing at 0-0.

Brock opened the second quarter with a 17 yard romp for a first down on the 42. Dennis gained 3 yards and Whitworth gained 4 before Dimmitt was stopped for no gain and the Bobcats were forced to punt for the first time in the game. Dennis got off a booming punt from his own 41 yard line. Loudder fumbled the punt and fell on it at

Sensing a chance to gain an advantage, the Bobcats line stiffened. They threw Clayton for a 1 yard loss. Hadaway tried a keeper on second down, but was caught in the end zone for a safety, and Dimmitt was ahead 2-0.

Springlake kicked off from the 20 yard line following the safety. Dennis took the ball at the Bobcat 25 yard line and was tackled at the 38.

Dimmitt then started a drive which reached the Springlake 3

yard line before a 5 yard penalty for excessive time in the huddle took them to the 8. Brock could gain only 1, and the Wolverines took over on their own 7.

Clayton got 1 and 2 yards before Loudder crashed over tackle for 17 yards and a first down on the 27 yard marker. Clayton went into the line for 1 yard, and then Hadaway faded back to pass. He was crowded back to the 10 yard line before getting the ball away to end Max Neal. The ball fell incomplete, and the Wolverines were penalized five yards for passing to an illegal receiver. In a weird bit of calling, the referee gave back the 5 yards, but placed the ball on the 10 yard line rather than on the original line of scrimmage where it should have been. Facing third down and 26 yards to go, Hadaway again faded to pass. He hit Evans with a perfect throw, and the play carried all the way to the 50 yard line.

A 30 yard pass play from Hadaway to Loudder was nullified by an off-side penalty Loudder and Hadaway combined their efforts for a first down on the Bobcats 35. Two passes by Loftis fell incomplete, and the third was intercepted by Dennis on the 16 and returned to the 20.

Dennis broke over tackle and raced 61 yards to the Springlake 19 before Watson pulled him down from behind. Mobley got 6 yards on a keeper play as the half ended, with the Bobcats still out in front 2-0.

Joe Edd Wheat took the second half kickoff and was downed on the 14 yard line. Loudder and Watson drove for a first down on the 30 in 3 plays. A Loftis to Evans pass was good for 3 yards before a fumble gave Dimmitt the ball on the 31.

Mobley hit end Troy Stafford with a pass which carried to the 1 foot line, and Brock plunged over for the score. The extra point was missed, and the score was 8-0, Dimmitt.

Again Wheat took the kickoff, this time running it out to the 23 yard line. Watson lost 7 yards on a mix-up in the backfield. Clayton gained 11 yards and Loftis got 4 more, with fourth down and 2 yards to go, Hadaway made only 1 yard, and Dimmitt took over on the 32.

Dennis got a yard through the line. A pass from Brock got a first down on the 14. Dennis broke over tackle, cut to the right and crossed the goal line standing up. He then kicked the extra point, and Dimmitt led 15-0.

Hadaway took the ensuing

kickoff and was downed on the 20 yard stripe. Hadaway broke loose for a 5 yard run on a reverse to the Dimmitt 30 yard line. Two incomplete passes and a run failed to gain before Hadaway hit Loudder with an 18 yard pass for a first down on the 12. Again, however, the Bobcats defense stiffened and drive bogged down on the 9.

Dimmitt drove out to the 26 and Dennis punted to the Wolverine 17 yard line.

Springlake then drove 83 yards in 15 plays with a Hadaway to Evans pass good for the last 8 yards to the goal. Louder plunged over for the extra point to cut the Bobcat lead to 15-7.

Dimmitt took the following kickoff, and Stafford returned the ball to the 40. The Bobcats then drove 60 yards in 8 plays on the ground to score the clinching t.d. A pass from Mobley to Stafford was good for the extra point, and the score was 22-7, with a minute and 20 seconds of the game remaining.

Hadaway took the kickoff and returned it to the 40 yard line. The Wolverines tried desperately to score through the air completing one pass to Clayton for 5 yards, but their efforts backfired as Stafford intercepted a pass and time ran out with Dimmitt in possession of the ball.

The win definitely put Dimmitt in a favored position to win the conference 2-A crown, but they are by no means on the throne yet, since Amherst is also undefeated in district play.

Springlake takes on Amherst this week at home. A win for the Wolverines would leave the game between Amherst and Dimmitt next week. Springlake is on the spot this week, since they must win to stay in the race.

Anyway, as far as the fans are concerned, the game this week should be the best home game of the season for the Wolverines.

**TEXAS SPORTSMEN BUY 230,391 U. S. DUCK STAMPS**

AUSTIN — While Texans indulge in the annual waterfowl harvest, game management technicians are seeking the answer for the surge of interest which has sent the state to the top in the number of Federal duck stamps sold.

The United States Fish and Wildlife Service reports that Texas last year took the lead from California in the sale of duck stamps with a total of 230,391 stamps bought.

This represented an increase of 79,271 duck stamps sold to Texans and that is the figure that intrigues the wildlife people.

The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission suggested that the slump in native game population, such as quail from the historic drought, might have converted many upland game hunters to go hunting waterfowl.

## Springlake Wolverines Drop First Conference Game In Two Years To Dimmitt Bobcats There Friday Night

The roof fell in on the Springlake Wolverines at Dimmitt Friday night, as they lost their first conference game in almost two years.

Dimmitt took the initial kickoff with Don Mobley taking the ball on the 10 yard line and returning it to the 27. Bobby Brock failed to gain on the first play from scrimmage. Edgar Dennis picked up 2 yards on second down, and Alton Whitworth lacked only inches of getting a first down on the next play. Quarterback Mobley decided to gamble on fourth down, and Dennis got two yards to make the gamble pay off. Dennis then gained 3 yards on 2 plays and Brock got 5 more and a first down on the midfield stripe. Whitworth carried twice for 6 yards, and Dennis went 11 yards for a first down on the 33. On the following play Dwayne Loudder stole the ball for Springlake on the 32 yd line, and the Wolverines were on the offense for the first time.

Loudder took the ball for 2 yards on first down. Quarterback Rex Loftis fumbled the hand-back from center, but recovered the ball for a 1 yard loss. With third down and 9 yards to go, Loftis faded back and chunked a pass to Loudder, who took the ball at Dimmitt 39 yard stripe. He was behind all defenders, but lost his footing and fell as he caught the ball.

Loudder failed to gain on first down, and a backfield-in-motion penalty set the Wolverines back to the 44. Again Loftis took to the air, hitting Seymour Evans with a jump pass for 9 yards. Loudder lost 2 and gained 3, but fell short of a first down and the Bobcats took over on their own

26 yard line. Brock got two yards through the line, but a fumble on the following play returned the ball to Springlake's possession on the Bobcats 33.

Donnie Clayton picked up 4 yards and Loudder got a first down with two thrusts at the line good for 7 yards. Don Watson failed to gain. Jimmy Hadaway, who had replaced Loftis at quarterback, gained 3 yards on a keeper. A pass from Hadaway to Loudder was dropped on the goal line. Watson blasted at the line, but got only one yd to put the ball barely inside the 20, where Dimmitt took over.

Dennis stabbed at the Wolverine line for 5 yards as the first quarter ended, with the score standing at 0-0.

Brock opened the second quarter with a 17 yard romp for a first down on the 42. Dennis gained 3 yards and Whitworth gained 4 before Dimmitt was stopped for no gain and the Bobcats were forced to punt for the first time in the game. Dennis got off a booming punt from his own 41 yard line. Loudder fumbled the punt and fell on it at the 3 yard line.

Sensing a chance to gain an advantage, the Bobcats line stiffened. They threw Clayton for a 1 yard loss. Hadaway tried a keeper on second down, but was caught in the end zone for a safety, and Dimmitt was ahead 2-0.

Springlake kicked off from the 20 yard line following the safety. Dennis took the ball at the Bobcat 23 yard line and was tackled at the 38. Dimmitt then started a drive which reached the Springlake 3

yard line before a 5 yard penalty for excessive time in the huddle took them to the 8. Brock could gain only 1, and the Wolverines took over on their own 7.

Clayton got 1 and 2 yards before Loudder crashed over tackle for 17 yards and a first down on the 27 yard marker. Clayton went into the line for 1 yard, and then Hadaway faded back to pass. He was crowded back to the 10 yard line before getting the ball away to end Max Neal. The ball fell incomplete, and the Wolverines were penalized five yards for passing to an illegal receiver. In a weird bit of calling, the referee gave back the 3 yards, but placed the ball on the 10 yard line rather than on the original line of scrimmage where it should have been. Facing third down and 26 yards to go, Hadaway again faded to pass. He hit Evans with a perfect throw, and the play carried all the way to the 50 yard line.

A 30 yard pass play from Hadaway to Loudder was nullified by an off-side penalty. Loudder and Hadaway combined their efforts for a first down on the Bobcats 35. Two passes by Loftis fell incomplete, and the third was intercepted by Dennis on the 16 and returned to the 20.

Dennis broke over tackle and raced 61 yards to the Springlake 19 before Watson pulled him down from behind. Mobley got 6 yards on a keeper play as the half ended, with the Bobcats still out in front 2-0.

Joe Edd Wheat took the second half kickoff and was downed on the 14 yard line. Loudder and Watson drove for a first down on the 30 in 3 plays. A Loftis to Evans pass was good for 3 yards before a fumble gave Dimmitt the ball on the 31.

Mobley hit end Troy Stafford with a pass which carried to the 1 foot line, and Brock plunged over for the score. The extra point was missed, and the score was 8-0, Dimmitt.

Again Wheat took the kickoff, this time running it out to the 23 yard line. Watson lost 7 yards on a mix-up in the backfield. Clayton gained 11 yards and Loftis got 4 more with fourth down and 2 yds to go. Hadaway made only 1 yard, and Dimmitt took over on the 32.

Dennis got a yard through the line. A pass from Brock got a first down on the 14. Dennis broke over tackle, cut to the right and crossed the goal line standing up. He then kicked the extra point, and Dimmitt led 15-0. Hadaway took the ensuing

kickoff and was downed on the 20 yard stripe. Hadaway broke loose for a 5 yard run on a reverse to the Dimmitt 30 yard line. Two incomplete passes and a run failed to gain before Hadaway hit Loudder with an 18 yard pass for a first down on the 12. Again, however, the Bobcats defense stiffened and drive bogged down on the 9.

Dimmitt drove out to the 28 and Dennis punted to the Wolverine 17 yard line.

Springlake then drove 83 yards in 15 plays with a Hadaway to Evans pass good for the first 3 yards to the goal. Louger plunged over for the extra point to cut the Bobcat lead to 15-7.

Dimmitt took the following kickoff, and Stafford returned the ball to the 40. The Bobcats then drove 60 yards in 8 plays on the ground to score the clinching td. A pass from Mobley to Stafford was good for the extra point, and the score was 22-7, with a minute and 20 seconds of the game remaining.

Hadaway took the kickoff and returned it to the 40 yard line. The Wolverines tried desperately to score through the air completing one pass to Clayton for 5 yards, but their efforts backfired as Stafford intercepted a pass and time ran out with Dimmitt in possession of the ball.

The win definitely put Dimmitt in a favored position to win the conference 2-A crown, but they are by no means on the throne yet, since Amherst is also undefeated in district play.

Springlake takes on Amherst this week at home. A win for the Wolverines would leave the game between Amherst and Dimmitt next week. Springlake is on the spot this week, since they must win to stay in the race.

Anyway, as far as the fans are concerned, the game this week should be the best home game of the season for the Wolverines.
