VA Guaranteed Home Loans Exceed Nine Million Mark

Home loans guaranteed by the Veterans Administration have exceeded the nine million mark, Jack Coker, Veterans Administration Regional Director, reported today.

Of the 9,001,120 loans guaranteed by the VA, totaling \$119.7 billion, nearly 4, 8 million have been repaid in full. Coker added,

Since the GI home loan program began in 1944, veterans of World War II, Korea, post Korea and the Vietnam era have benefited from the more liberal financing terms offered by lenders on VA-guaranteed mortgages.

The VA operates three programs to assist eligible veterans to become homeowners, loan guaranty, direct loan and grants for specially adapted housing for severely disabled veterans.

Coker also reported the amount of loan VA will guarantee is limited only by the appraised value of the home and the capacity of the veteran to repay the loan on installments. Direct loans made by the VA, however, are subject to a maximum of \$25,000. In many instances veterans obtain guaranteed or direct loans without down payments.

Specially adapted housing grants may be made to cover not more than one-half of the cost of the dwelling and lot. with a maximum grant of \$25,000. A guaranteed or direct loan is available to finance the remaining cost.

Loans for the purpose of acquiring a single-wide mobile home cannot exceed cost or \$12,500. For a double-wide unit, the maximum loan is \$20,000, or \$27,000 for a double-wide unit and an un-. developed lot.



Beware Of Tularemia, Can Be Transmitted From Infected Animals

blic Health Veterinarian with Public Health Region 2, asks that the public be notified that human cases of Tularemia have occurred recently in the South Plains area. One of the cases. occurring in Lubbock, did result in death to the person in-

Tularemia is a disease that can be transmitted from infected wild animals to man. The contact with infected animals, usually rabbits, comes when the hunter handles or dresses the game he kills. Another source of infection for Tularemia is transmission by vectors, such as ticks or fleas, that can carry the disease from the infected animal to man.

The rabbit population is unusually high this year and many hunters will be adding rabbit stresses that hunters should be warned not to dress or handle Washington, D. C. these animals with bare hands.

Rubber or plastic gloves in good condition be used. The raw meat should not be handled without protection until it is thoroughly cooked. In addition, care should be taken to see that the raw meat is not exposed to other meats.

Tularemia causes symptoms of acute illness soon after exposure. There is a sudden onset of headache, chills, nausea vomiting and high temperature. Confirmed diagnosis can be made only through laboratory

Virtually every bank account (savings or checking) in the United States is insured against loss up to \$40,000 for each account by an agency of the federal government. The agency is called the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, or FDIC.

Funds paid into the insurance pool to protect depositors' accounts do not come from taxpayers' pockets. however. The FDIC pool is inanced by the banks them selves, who each year pay a certain percentage of funds into the FDIC.

The idea of banks pooling a portion of their funds is not new in this country. In 1819 the Suffolk Bank of Boston began redeeming the notes of other banks, so long as the bank issuing the notes had paid into a redemption fund like the FDIC pool) established by the Suffolk bank.

The FDIC, which was created after the bank holiday in the early 1930s, also serves as a part of the bank regulatory process, along with the Federal Reserve System. the Comptroller of the Currency and State Banking
