## School To Purchase Lights And Busses

In the regular meeting of the Springlake-Earth School Board Monday, November 11 the board discussed the purchase of new lights for Wolverine Stadium and two new school buses along with other business on the agenda.

Looking at the month's enrollment figures the board noted an increase of fourteen students over last month. Total enrollment for this month is 896 students as opposed to 882 last month's enrollment at this time. The breakdown of this total enrollment shows 467 in Elementary, 158 in Junior High, 243 in High School and 29 in Special Education.

The board then decided to purchase new lights for Wolverine Stadium. The new lights will top 80 foot poles and are being purchased at a cost of approximately \$5,700. The necessary materials will be provided by Southwestern Public Service at wholesale cost. Dave Cavit, manager of the local SWPS, has agreed to donate the labor.

The new lighting facilities will be a nice addition for the field. Plans are to place the poles in the rear of the bleachers rather than in front as they now stand. The present lights and poles will be offered for sale.

In other action the board decided to buy two new school buses. The buses are to be purchased through the state allocation transportation fund. To be replaced are a 1959 Chevrolet, 54 passenger bus; and 1956 International, 72 passenger.

Last year on bids, the State Board of Control listed the following quotations for a 54 passenger bus; March-\$5,127, April-\$4,130; May-\$5,084; and June-\$5,225. During the same months last year the following bids were given for a 74 passenger bus; March-\$6,326; April-\$6,338; May \$6,326; June-\$6,370.

The board members also approved the hiring of Mrs. Robert Bridge as tax assessor-collector for the school. Mrs. Bridge will fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Mrs. Dallas Cly-

The board voted to buy new Cyclorama Curtains for the stage. The back curtains will be purchased from Waco Stage Equipment Company at a cost of \$460. Including installation the cost would have been \$560, but the board voted to install the curtains with school personnel.

In final action the members reviewed delinquent taxes and decided to postpone action.
